

Their action came as a big surprise to the local officials, who were not expecting such a move. The announcement was not altogether expected by the men themselves, although it was known that something would be done this week. The committee have been in Montreal for the past three days endeavoring to arrive at an amicable arrangement with General Manager Hays, but never were the prospects bright for a speedy settlement.

Prior to meeting Mr. Hays, the committee some time ago conferred with General Superintendent McGulgan, but that official, so the men say, only "joilled" them along. When it was seen that no requests would be recognized by Mr. McGulgan, the committee resolved to wait on Mr. Hays. The interviews with the general manager were not satisfactory, and the committee deemed it advisable to call the men out.



DISHONEST FRUIT PACKING. Exception has been taken to some re marks recently made by The World in reference to the sale of dishonestly packed apples in the British market. The World threw the responsibility entirely on the shoulders of the apple growers. In this we were hardly fair to the latter. It is to a arge extent the practice of the trade for the shipper to purchase the fruit on the trees. The responsibility of the shipment, therefore, rests to a large extent upon the shipper, and not with the farmer. While this is the custom in the apple trade, it is, nevertheless, a fact that the fruit growers of this country are more or less addicted to that is, of exposing a superior grade of fruit on the top, with the intention of deceiving purchasers. No matter where this kind of trickery exists it should be exposed. Fruit growers do not realize how much they injure their business by abusing the confidence of their patrons. There is no noney in the practice. On the contrary, it entalis a great loss on the growers. The sales of fruit would be larger if absolute honesty characterized the packing, and people would be inclined to pay higher prices if they were satisfied of the character of the goods offered for sale. In regard to the packing of apples for the English market, there is no doubt that dishonest methods prevail, and that the business has already been injured to a considerable extent. If the farmers are not responsible for the packing of the apples, it is greatly in their interests that the practice com plained of by the Minister of Agriculture should be stopped. The apple growers will white or ecru, and the English business ruined if they allow the shippers to pack the fruit dishonestly. If it is possible to do so, and we do not see why it is not, the Government should introduce some legislative machin ery that will protect the export apple trade


