## BOY OF 13 CARRIED ON SYSTEMATIC PILFERING

Selling Needles as a Blind, His Thefts of Purse and Chatelaines Have Been Many.

A clever thieving campaign has been carried on by a young lad named Steven Prince, 19 Spadina-avenue, for the last couple of months. He was arrested yesterday morning by Detective Mackie, and is now at Plantyter Park Industrial School awaiting trial next Monday. His system of robbery was a novel one, also not altogether unknown to the police. With a small pack containing needles and pins, he called at the back doors of the houses in the neighborhood. If no one was about, Prince would steal in quietly, look around, and whatever could be conveniently tucked into his pockets, that was of value, would disappear. If by chance he was suddenly confronted with an inmate, he would with all the innocence of childhood offer his pins and needles for sale. His thefts, however, consisted mainly of purses and chatelaines.

In the court yesterday morning he admitted to stealing nine of these. There are some fifteen more cases of purses missing which the police are of opinion he is responsible for. The amounts contained in the chatelaines and purses already missed range from 75c to \$18.

The following residents are among those who were victims of this thieving crook: John Cresie, 256 Bellwoods-avenue, purse containing 75c; Mrs. Dunham, 44 Brunel-avenue, chatelaine containing \$18, and Mrs. E. J. Roberts, 430 Euclid-avenue, purse containing \$12.50.

An effort is being made by the police to secure a list of all the robberies of this nature that have occurred lately in the vicinity and they will confront young Prince with the offences.

## NEW PAPER MILLS.

Sturgeon Falls Paper Co. at Last Gets to Work.

Sturgeon Falls, Oct. 26.—(Special.)—The Sturgeon Falls Paper Co.'s paper mill, which has been in course of construction here for the past six years, commenced operations this morning. A trial run was made on the machinery, and the mill is now in full operation. The mill is the first in Ontario to be equipped with its own pulp and paper at one mill. The supply is largely spoken for by American newspapers, and the product will nearly all be exported to the United States. Some of the raw pulp may also be exported. On Saturday the employees entered the mill and spent the evening in conviviality. About 400 men are expected and 50 tons of papers will be manufactured daily.
