

### HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

N CONNECTION WITH

## Crescent Street Church, Montreal

(FORMERLY FREE CHURCH, COTÉ STREET.)

- The Congregation owes its origin to the deep interest which some individuals had in the struggles of the Free Church party in Scotland, and who met together to advance Free Church principles. They were called the Free Church Committee. The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.
- 1844.—January 10. First Meeting of Free Church Committee. Invitation sent to Rev. Dr. Cusningham, then in the United States, to come to Montreal.
  - Arrival of Dr. Burns, of Paisley, the First Deputy from the Free Church.
  - May.—A call for a Minister sent to the Free Church Colonial Committee, with promise of adequate support. A call sent to Rev. W. C. Burns at the same time to come out as an Evangelist.
- \*\* End of summer.—REV. MR. KING, of Glasgow, and REV. MR. MacNaughtan, of Paisley, Deputies from the Free Church arrived. REV. W. C. BURNS, arrived about the same time and preached in St. Gabriel Street Church.
- 1845.—The Rev. J. Bonar, of Larbert, arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Church till a temporary wooden church was erected on Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May inducted the first elders, viz: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
  - The Rev. W. Arnor, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and supplied the pulpit till the end of September.
  - The Rev. A. N. Somerville, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
  - The Rev. W. C. Burns, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.

- " The REV. R. BREMNER, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.—The REV. J. PATTERSON, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849.—The REV. J. LEWIS, of Leith, ministered from April to August.
  - " The Rev. J. C. Burns, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850"
  - " -The Rev. J. C. F. IRBAIRN, of Allanton, ministered from August to October, 1850.

During the past year there were registered 11 marriages, 33 baptisms, 21 burials. The number of communicants on the roll is 643.

Sickness and death have been very busy among us. I do not remember any year when there has been so much trouble and sorrow. Young and old have been called hence; some after a long period of weakness and some at a moment's notice. What do these things mean? It was in January of last year that I pointed out to you the Holy Spirit's answer to that question. Let us consider it again in the light of all the sorrow and bereavement we have come through. All these troubles are for our training; "God dealeth with you as with sons, for what son is there whom his Father chasteneth not? But if ye are without chastening, whereof all have been made partakers, then are ye bastards and not sons. Furthermore, we had the fathers of our flesh to chasten us, and we gave them reverence; shall we not much rather be in subjection unto the Father of spirits and live? For they verily for a few days chastened us as seemed good to them: but He for our profit that we may be partakers of His holmess. All chastening seemeth for the present not to be joyous but grievous: yet, afterward it yieldeth peaceable fruit unto them that have been exercised thereby, even the fruit of righteousness; wherefore lift up the hands that hang down, and the palsied knees, and make straight paths for your feet, that that which is lame be not turned out of the way but rather be healed." Heb: xii. 7-13 R. V.

As God has sent us so much sorrow let us show to all that we have learned the lessons He would teach us. Let new life and vigour fill our souls. Have your hands been hanging helplessly by your side? Lift them up; work more vigorously and skilfully than you have ever done. Have your knees been knocking together? Let the assurance of God's care send a new thrill of life through them so that you may run more swiftly the race set before you. And, above all, use this restored strength in the way God commands: "Make straight paths for your feet." In your path through life let there be no turning aside to the right hand or to the left, through fear or favour. Let not the frown of the world drive you from the path of Christian consistency; let not its smile tempt you to wander. Go straight on no matter what the consequences, for thus you will do good to yourselves and others.

Nothing has a worse influence on others than a hesitating, vacillating, tortuous walk on the part of Christians; whereas a consistent, straightforward, out and out Christian life is the best help we can give to any, especially to such as are weak in the faith and who limp along the path

of Christian service with difficulty and pain.

If all the congregation by their united Christian walk trod a plain beaten path, the lame ones though halting would find it easier to keep in it than to wander from it, and by and bye their lameness would be cured; but if the tracks we make are crooked and confused, and there is no plain beaten path, these halting ones will get more and more perplexed, more and more fatigued, more and more lame.

Inconsistency and vacillation in the general body of the Church, and especially among the leaders, creates great difficulties for the young and weak and inexperienced—the lame as they are here called. This lameness becomes dislocation and they perish from the way; whereas if we are all careful to go in the same straight path they would soon be restored to soundness. We should be like snow shoers in their tramps. They send one of their best men ahead to pick the path, and others follow carefully in his foot-

steps; thus, even when the snow is deep those who are but beginners find it easy to follow in the rear. But if each snow shoer went as he pleased, and one walked one way and another another it would be very hard work for the stumbling novice, and we would not be surprised if he came to grief.

Now we have a good leader who has broken up the path before us—Jesus, the author and finisher of faith—and for our own good and the good of the weakest we

should keep in His footsteps.

What kind of track are we making? Is it a straight one? Are we constantly following Jesus through good report and through bad report; up hill and down dale; trying to put down our feet where He has trod? Or are we going our own way, following the fleeting fashions and customs and pleasures of the world, seeking to avoid every hill of difficulty, halting between two opinions—to-day serving God, to-morrow hand and glove with the world?

Well, if our track is crooked, inconsistent, wavering, we are hindering those who are weak; but if we are making straight paths for our feet we are helping all the lame.

Brethren, let us keep together in our spiritual customs and habits. Let all men see that we walk in the same way. Let us take heed how we diverge in any degree from the straight path, for we may thus do great injury to the weak and wavering; whereas if our walk is firm and unanimous, in the right direction, following Jesus only, we shall help all that are feeble; the lame will not be dislocated, but rather healed; and thus the song of the true pilgrims will be realized:

So they from strength unwearied go Still forward unto strength; Until in Zion they appear Before the Lord at length.

## Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31st DEC., 1897.

The Court, in submitting the report of their steward-ship for the year, have been enabled to maintain the allot-ments to the several schemes and calls upon them, and although the amount at their disposal has been quite up to the record of the former year, it is hoped our people will devise still better things for the ensuing year, enabling them to maintain the position of the congregation in carrying out the work they have undertaken. This end could be better reached if the weekly offerings could be brought up to the minimum of \$200 weekly, aided by the general adoption of the weekly envelope.

#### WEEKLY OFFERINGS.

The receipts, ordinary and special, for the year amount to \$10,305.12, of which \$8,213.80 was received by envelope, \$1,383.67 by open collection, and \$708.35 by special contribution, showing a decrease of \$103.55 in comparison

with former year. The weekly average of envelope and open plate for the year is \$184.56, as against \$189.44 for If we include the special contributions of \$708.35 with the weekly envelopes and open collection, such would make the weekly average \$198.19.

The usual Thanksgiving collection on behalf of the Montreal General Hospital was taken on that day, amounting to \$157.12, and the special collection on 21st Feb. on behalf of the India Famine Fund, met with a generous

response of \$543.37.

#### PEW RENTS.

The receipts from this source for the year amounted to \$4,709.50, being an increase of \$172.28 over former year. After allowing for the current expenses chargeable to this account, it leaves a credit balance of \$165.73 to be carried forward.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS, CHINA.

The Court have ben enabled to provide for the past year the salary of Dr. McClure, our foreign missionary, but it is doubtful whether they will be able to continue his support in full, unless a larger revenue for this purpose is received. With this stated charge upon the revenue, the Court feels itself unable to respond in a greater measure to the calls for Home Missions.

### ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1897.

In submitting the Sabbath School report for the year 1897 we desire to express our gratitude to God for His loving care and goodness to us during the past year, and continue to look to Him for blessing.

Our numbers are as follows:

#### BIBLE CLASSES.

The various Bible Classes of the school have been continued with well sustained interest and attendance.

We look to these classes to supply the vacancies that occur in our teaching staff.

#### CHINESE CLASS.

On this department Mr. Cockfield, the superintendent, reports as follows:—

#### CHINESE SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Our Chinese work has continued with increasing interest latterly. The scholars are not only making good progress in our language, but towards the Christian life. One is now an earnest Christian of excellent influence, and several show an increasing interest in spiritual things, looking towards a public profession of their faith in Christ.

The average attendance of scholars has been 13, of teachers 14; collections for the year, \$46.55, assigned to China missions; the collection at the Christmas entertainment amounted to \$48.80, and was assigned to the same cause.

In view of Crescent Street Church having such large China interests it was most fitting that the entertainment should be held in our church. This unique and successful entertainment took place on the 28th December last, and filled our rooms to overflowing with many Chinese and interested friends and teachers.

An interesting feature in connection therewith was the commemoration of the 90th anniversary of China missions. Rev. Dr. Morrison, the pioneer Protestant missionary, having arrived at Macao, China, in 1807; this was set forth by the Morrison memorial tickets, showing an excellent photograph of Dr. Morrison, with his native assistants, earnestly engaged in translating the Bible into Chinese, and by the introductory remarks of the chairman, Rev. Dr. Mackay, in his review of early China missions.

It may also be recalled that about 50 years ago this church called the Rev. W. C. Burns, who went later as a missionary to that same locality, from which we have now some 15,000 Chinese in Canada.

The programme, consisting largely of Scripture readings and Gospel songs by the scholars, proceeded very satisfactorily, and revealed faithful teaching. The parts taken by the little boy and Mrs. Lee, a Chinese lady, created

special interest. Assistance was also given by the choir and

by several ladies and gentlemen.

Among those present were Principal MacVicar, Dr. Barclay, Dr. Campbell, Rev. Messrs. Mowatt, Fleck, Patterson and George, several of whom offered congratulatory remarks at the close.

The scholars were served with light refreshments, in the lecture room, by the teachers, and gave hearty appreciation of all this expression of Christian interest in their welfare.

In connection with these papers the scholars were requested to bring them to the school, after being read, and a box of them were shipped to Mr. Campbell, one of our students, in charge of a lumber district, and Mr. Campbell gave us an account of the great use they had been to him in his work.

### THANKSGIVING DAY OFFERING.

A hearty response was made by the scholars for books, toys, etc., and the gifts so sent in were distributed, as usual, amongst the children in the hospitals, Creche, and Hervey Institute.

#### FINANCES.

The expenses of the school have been kept as low as possible, in view of the reduced grant from the Deacons' Court, but notwithstanding careful economy during the year, the expenses exceed the grant by \$24.34.

#### BAND OF HOPE.

The Band of Hope Society resumed its meetings on October 15th, which are held every three weeks. An interesting programme and an address on temperance principles are given at each meeting. The attendance has been very satisfactory, and we trust the meetings will be found profitable as well as entertaining.

## Mazareth Street Mission.

In seeking to present a report for the past year, we feel the difficulty of giving an adequate idea of the work done. The fact that there is no membership, in the strict sense of the term, and the floating character of the population, make it quite impossible to tabulate the results, yet so far as they can be definitely stated, they are quite gratifying.

The Sabbath evening meeting, which forms the chief feature of the work, is well attended, and the quiet, serious attention which the people give throughout the entire service, leads us to hope that the seed is not being sown in vain.

The average attendance for the winter months is about 60.

The weekly prayer meeting has been especially encouraging, and shows a marked increase, the average attendance for the winter months being about 30. On the first Thursday of each month the prayer meeting takes the form of a missionary meeting, at which we endeavor to give the people some information regarding the physical characteristics of the various countries which are the scenes of missionary labours, as well as short biographical sketches of some of the great missionaries, while also seeking to arouse their interest in the work being accomplished at the present time. We have also been favored with reports from students of the College, regarding the work being done in the mission fields of our own Northwest, and elsewhere in Canada.

As might naturally be expected, considerable visiting is necessary to keep in touch with the people and hold them together. The opportunity thus gained for personal dealing with such members of the families as do not come to divine service is improved.

Our thanks are due to friends in Crescent street congregation, through whom we have been enabled to relieve the wants of some of our deserving poor. Through their kindness, parcels of clothing have been distributed, and

Christmas dinners provided for those who had been most faithful in their attendance at our meetings.

We are glad to say that since entering upon the work there has been very little sickness, and so we have not been called upon to make many visits to such as are suffering, and only two deaths have occurred during the year.

The work thus outlined goes on quietly. Your missionaries feel encouraged by the general interest manifested, and have no doubt that an influence for good is going out from the mission which will bring forth fruit to the honour of the Master.

The sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25) with large parcels of new and partly worn clothing were given to Nazareth Street Sunday-school Mission, per Mr. James Ross.

The needs of Mina Moore, the young girl assigned to our care in the Mackay institute, were met in April and again in November.

Madame Coté and Miss McSween, workers in connection with the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society, received parcels of clothing for distribution among the deserving poor.

The Hervey Institute, the work of the Rev. Mr. Bouchard, of Joliette, P.Q., and some poor families among the

Jews in our city were also remembered.

Special subscriptions were solicited and received, under the auspices of this Society, for furnishing a room in the Y. W. C. A. Building, and for the work of the Industrial Rooms Bazaar Fund.

We have to acknowledge, with warm thanks, large parcels of new clothing from Mr. D. Morrice and Mrs. Redpath, as well as warm clothing sent in by members of the congregation. Much of this warm clothing, we have reason to know, has been a great boon to those to whom it was given.

Another year has passed over our society, and we cannot but feel that, although our numbers have not increased, our knowledge of and interest in missions has been

strengthened and stimulated by our gathering together. Although the average attendance remains about the same, yet we are pleased to note several new faces at our meetings from time to time, and we hope that as the interest spreads the attendance will increase.

The average attendance for last year was 35. We have met on the first Fridays in the month, except during the summer.

At our monthly meetings in the spring we heard letters and papers from Manchuria, Neemuch and Central India, and from Honan, China, so keeping in touch with the foreign field. The Northwest was also brought before our notice, and the city work was not forgotten, as we listened to reports from Nurse and Bible woman. We also helped the Y. W. C. A. in their work of furnishing.

Since resuming our work this season we have been much interested in Honan, China, and feel that God has been specially leading us in this direction.

At our first meeting in September the need of Dr. Mc-Clure for a hospital, and also a good home for himself and family, was brought before us. The ladies of our society undertook to raise funds for the hospital anyway, and to do as much as possible towards the house.

An appeal was made to the congregation, and a most hearty and generous response was met with. By November Dr. Mackay was able to write and tell the Foreign Missionary secretary to go on with the work.

Since then the whole amount asked for (\$2,500) has been subscribed. This outside our ordinary subscriptions.

The treasurer reports the contributions to amount to \$407.00, \$200,00 of which goes towards support of city work, \$50 to home missions, and the remaining \$157.00 to be added to our contributions towards Dr. McClure's house.

The sewing class, held at Nazareth street on Wednesday afternoon, was carried on with much profit last winter. Fourteen young ladies of the congregation were very faithful in their attendance. At the close of the class in April the work done by the children was on view, and the ladies who availed themselves of this opportunity of visiting the Mission were much pleased with the work done. Especially good was some of the darning done by the elder girls.

The class has been opened again this year with an attendance of about 50 children, and the same methods are being used as were found so satisfactory last year. The work is not easy, and great credit is due to the young ladies who give up their Wednesday afternoons to this work.

## Memoranda.

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Public Worship on Sabbath commences at 11 o'clock A.M. and 7 o'clock P.M.

Sabbath Morning Prayer Meeting in the Library at 10.15 o'clock.

Weekly Prayer Meeting in the Lecture Room every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

SABBATH SCHOOL AND BIBLE CLASSES meet every Sabbath afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Teachers' meeting for business is held on second Thursday of each month.

The Sacrament of Baptism is dispensed at the forenoon service on the first Sabbath of each month. Applicants must give notice to the Minister during previous week.

THE ELDERS visit their districts quarterly and distribute cards for the Communion. Any who may not receive their cards from the Elders, can get them at the close of the Friday Preparatory Service, or from the Elders at the door on Communion Sabbath morning. When members change their residence, immediate notice should be given to the Elder of the district or to the Minister.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper is dispensed on the second Sabbath of March, last Sabbath of May, first Sabbath of October, and second Sabbath of December.

THE STATED MONTHLY MEETING OF THE DEACONS' COURT is held on the first Monday of each month, and the monthly meeting of Session immediately thereafter.

The Ladies' Visiting and Aid Society meets once a week during the working season. All the ladies of the Church are members of this Society.

THE MISSION BAND meets fortnightly on Thursday, at 4 P.M., during the winter season.

The Ladies' Auxillary of the Woman's Missionary Society meets on the first Friday of every month, in the Library, at 3 o'clock.
