



END IT. NOT MEND IT.

The street railway situation must be "mended or ended." Every one is agreed as to that. We cannot permit our streets for the next 12 years to be absolutely controlled by a private corporation which may build new lines when and where it pleases, and which cannot be required to build them anywhere else. Can the situation be mended?

Certainly it is not to be mended by litigation. It is rhetorical to threaten to carry our case "to the foot of the throne," but, in plain English, this means merely another appeal to the privy council. Will any lawyer give it as his opinion that anything is to be gained by another appeal? The lords have already decided the point. We criticised the Ontario Railway Board for putting on the airs of a court and deciding between the city and the railway company according to the strict, hard letter of the law, but, after all, the opinion delivered by the board was taken almost bodily from the opinion of the privy council. Surely there is no thorofare for Toronto along the road of litigation.

In what other way can the situation be mended? Sir James Whitney has promised that his government will pass any needed legislation. But surely the city does not expect the prime minister to sit down and draft the bill with his own hand. Again we ask, not captiously, what legislation will the city request? Can such legislation deprive the street railway company of its present contract right to build when and where it pleases, and subject it to a liability not in the contract, to wit, to build when and where it may be directed? Its contract, as construed by the highest court in the empire and by the railway board of this province, has a certain meaning, and therefore possesses a certain value. To take from the company valuable rights, requires some compensation. We are reminded that the legislature has power to take from John Smith his house and give it to John Jones. But this is verbal fencing. Many things can be done, but, as a matter of fact, will the legislature take away property rights without compensation? Will it, for example, reduce the street railway franchise from 30 to 20 years without compensation? To mend the street railway situation in Toronto by legislation means a partial expropriation of the franchise of the Toronto Railway Company. How can anything of moment from the city's standpoint be accomplished unless the company be deprived of certain rights which it now possesses? In short, we will get from the government nothing, unless it be by way of partial or entire expropriation.

We believe the time has come when the citizens of Toronto should look this situation in the face and try to get at the hard facts. If we have no assurance of success from continued litigation, if the promised relief by the legislature is either to be, like last winter's attempt, a fiasco, or to result in a partial expropriation of the street railway company's franchise, then would it not be better to end the whole trouble, to recover the franchise and to own and operate the railway as a public utility? This can be done either by expropriating the system or by acquiring the capital stock of the company.

It is objected that \$6,000,000 of the \$8,000,000 of stock is "water." Whatever it may be, it stands for the value of the franchise, at least, because all the money raised by bond issues and the other \$2,000,-000 of stock is represented by tangible assets. We believe this franchise is worth \$6,000,000, to any purchaser, including the City of Toronto. It is wrong and foolish to tell the people that if they submit to present conditions until 1921, then the city can take over the street railway without paying a dollar. The physical plant of the company, including real estate, rapidly rising in value, is worth to-day \$5,000,000. By 1921 the city may find that it will have much more than \$5,000,000 to pay, if it to take over the street railway at that ti



POLICE BENEFIT FUND IS TICKLISH PROBLEM

"Old" and "Young" Members of Force Have Differing Opinions-Means Much to Organization.

time over the elections of the police benefit fund committee. This "fund" has been a mighty sore spot for many years among members of the force. The fight that is now on is practically between the "old" and "young" mem-bers. The committee is elected an-nually and consists of one inspector, one sergeant and a man from each division. Heretofore it has been the custom for the inspectors to choos one of their own number and allow

custom for the inspectors to choose one of their own number and allow him to be elected by acclamation. Each of the members of the boar dis elected by the force as a body.

On Monday the inspectors decided upon Inspector Stephen as their representative. The young men, however, decided upon a representative of their own and chose Inspector Duncan as the fit and proper person to look after their interests. Inspector Duncan decided to become their candidate. When Inspector Stephen heard this yesterday he resigned, and up to date Duncan is the man.

The "fund" for some time has been in bad shape. That is, it was not strong enough to permit the retiring of a large number of men who are entitled to their pensions, altho their retirement would have been for the betterment of the force. The city council has agreed to come to the rescue of the fund to the extent of \$10,000, providing the proper legislation is grant-

viding the proper legislation is grant-ed. This sum is being granted for the purpose of allowing the police commis-sioners to retire about 25 members of

Going back to ancient history, when the older members of the force joined, the rule was, or was afterwards amended, to the effect that a member could retire after a service of twentyfive years and draw as a pension half the salary he was receiving after hav-ing served 20 years. In 1894 this rule was again amended, making the time of service thirty years, and the pen-sion to be fixed at the 25 years' service. Most of the "young" men on the force came in under the latter con-

As stated before, if the \$10,000 city As stated before, if the \$10,000 city grant goes thru, some 25 men and officers will be instructed to get their pension chaques from the city treasurer. Now there is not much secret as to who these will be, and this is where this special bone of contention The older members, who should have

been resting, or filling other positions, were not retired, altho some of them were more than anxious to break away. They have been paying into the "fund" right along, but their pension year than it would have been so years ago, but they have been drawing pay, some of them increased pay, in the meantime. These contend that when they leave the force their pension should be graded by the pay they are receiving at the time of their saying good by. To this the "young" ing good-by. To this the "young" men strenuously object, claiming that this proposition if carried thru would cut too much into the "fund."




