ESTIMATES FOR Hon. G. W. Ross

Call for Expenditure of \$7,-623,745.66 - New Items Are for Wing to Buildings, Government House and Central Prison.

Under the new fiscal system, by which the financial year ends on Oct. 31. it is necessary, if there is to be any money to run the province oetween that date and the time of the opening of the house, for the legislature to pass the main estimates almost a year ahead of the time when they will need to be expended. In accordance with this necessity, Hon. Col. Matheson yesterday brought down the main estimates for the year ending Oct. 31, 1911, which were passed thru committee of supply the same after-

The esimates call for an expenditure of \$7,623,745.66, of which \$6,969,845.66 is current expenditure, \$535,900 on capital account, and \$118,000 for other pur-

A grant of \$50,000 is made towards a rovincial museum. For the hydro-electric commission a further expenditure of \$200,000 on capital account is authorized. New Government House.

For the new Government House \$100,000 was voted; for the new wing of the parliament buildings \$200,000. and for the new provincial prison \$50,-

few changes are noted in the salary items over the year 1910, as nearly all the increases were included in the supplementary estimates.
Under salaries and contingencies there are decreases from \$138,935 to \$137,900 in the department of lands, morests and mines; from \$177,765 to \$173,345 in the provincial secretary's department and an increase in the department and an increase in the department of agriculture from \$61.610 to \$62.010. 

OTTAWA, March 7 .- (Special.) -- Another sensation has developed in connection with the committee investigat ing the Lumsden charges.

The bombshell will be exploded to morrow morning, when the committee meets, and it is that Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., who was appointed by the government majority at its meeting on Friday, to prosecute the enquiry, is disqualified from undertaking those duties by reason of having given a written opinion at the time of the Hodgins enquiry two years ago, which opinion was strongly against the truth of the charges made by the major, and therefore in favor of the contractors.

E. M. Macdonald had the assurance of Mr. Nesbitt several days ago that he would act as counsel if appointed by the committee, and on that understanding his name was submitted, and the appointment confirmed by Messrs. Geoffrion, Clark, Macdonald and Wil-



PLAYED FOR 17 YEARS

Since 1903 - Hockey

MONTREAL, March 7.—It was in 1893 that Lord Stanley donated a silver trophy cup to be representative of the best hockey played in the Dominion. It has ever since been sought after by teams from Nova Scotia to the Yukon, and is now once more booked for a return to Montreal.

The date of St. Patrick's Day, 1902, is well remembered by Montrealers, in the Montreal and the Montreal

The date of St. Patrick's Day, 1902, is well remembered by Montrealers, when Montreal defeated Victoria of Winnipeg, and started home with the cup. It was on that trip that the team was named "the little men of iron." They were the nucleus of the present Wanderers.

Visits to Montreal of the Winnipe

Visits to Montreal of the Winnipeg Victorias will always remain fresh in the minds of hockey enthusiasts. That Winnipeg team flashed on Montrealers in February, 1896, as something new in the game, when they defeated the Montreal Victorias by a score of two to nil, and the white bowl went west for the first time.

The following December the Montreal Victorias went after the prize and captured it from Winnipeg, the score being six goals to Winnipeg's five. It was at that time the practice to determine the championship by a single contest.

mine the championship by a single contest.

The next match of any interest was in 1839, when the westerners came after the mug again. The series of three games ended in a dispute. The local Yics, won the first, and in the second they had a score of three goals to two, when Tony Gingras claimed he had been cut down by Bob Macdougail. The referee refused to allow the claim, and the visitors-left the ice.

It was in this year that the Montreal Shamrocks came into form by winning the league championship. In the final match with the Victorias the Irishman won by one to nil, Harry Tribey scoring the goal.

In 1900 Winnings the first, and losing the last two to Shamrocks. But in 1901 the western hockeyists were more successful, when they won the majority of the three games. Shamrocks had begun to decline in their play, and have never since assumed their old form as a team.

When Ottawa won the championship in 1903 the cup went to them, and they held it till 1906.

The E. C. H. A. had been formed in the fall of 1905, and in 1906 the Wanderers won the cup from Ottawa by taking the league championship. The next season the Wanderers defended the cup successfully, but in 1908 they lost it to the Kenora Thisties in January, but won it back in March. Last year the Wanderers lost the championship and cup to Ottawa. Now it is practically certain to return to Montreal.

The history of the cup has been the history of Ottawa and Wanderer clubs since 1903. Kenora held it for less than two months in 1908. Apart from that short period, it has been in the possession of Wanderers or Ottawa clubs, which have proved their superfority over all challengers, generally without much difficulty.

The fact is indisputable and has been affirmed repeatedly by no less an authority than the supreme time and again insisted that if a corporation has bonded its property for ar, amount that exceeds its fair value. tious, it cannot impose upon the public the burden of such increased rates as may be required for realizing profits upon such excessive valuation or fictitious capitalization. Net the effort to do this has resulted in the bankruptcy and ruin of many franchise-holding companies, in the valuation of contractural obligations imposed as a public safeguard, in inefficient service, in the withdrawal of transfer and other facilities, and in other attempts capitalization upon the people.

The condition of the New York street railways is one of the most striking examples of the evils attending over-capitalization. It has been clearly shown that the bond and stock issues made by their various operating, holding and security companies, created according to the methods of expert high financiers, approximate \$700,000 .-000, and that the whole systems could be duplicated at a cost of slightly over \$100,000,000. These railways are bankrupt and in the hands of receivers. Only the other day the Third-avenue Railroad was sold by public auction to the trustee of the first mortgage debenture holders for \$26,000,000, and the stockholders eliminated. Eleven years ago, when the road was paying seven and eight per cent. dividends,







"Three men were in the room. Prostrate on the floor lay Lillis, half were bloody. Above him stood Cudahy. He was in evening dress, except that he wore no coat. His sleeves were rolled up. Blood was on his hands. At his side stood a chauffeur.

"None of the men noticed me. Lillis groaned and struggled feebly at the cords that bound him. Don't do it, Jack, please don't do

it," he pleaded.
"I rushed to the trio and asked Cudit," he pleaded.
"I rushed to the trio and asked Cudahy: 'What does all this mean?' 'He's ruined my home,' he replied, turning to me and making no resistance to arrest. 
