



THE EXCHANGE RATE

V.—What Controls It?

THE previous numbers of this series explained that the foreign dollar is not money but a commodity, and that the in-convenience of settling international debts in gold has led to the use of Bills of Exchange. We now come to the effect of the Trade Balance on the exchange value of the dollar.

If we bought from the United States goods to exactly the same value as those we sold to them, broadly speaking, there would be no exchange problem between us, since the amount of Bills of Exchange offered for sale in each country would just cover the requirements of those wanting to pay debts in the other.

At present, however, we are buying from the United States far more than they from the United States far more than they are from us. In consequence many Bills of Exchange, representing Canadian dollars, are being offered in the money markets of the United States by American vendors and few bids are being made for them. The holders, to dispose of them, lower the price until they become a tempting bargain. The Canadian dollars are therefore at a discount in the United therefore at a discount in the United

On the other hand, only comparatively few United States dollar Bills of Exchange, created by the sale of Canadian goods, are being offered in Canada and there are many bidders who want to buy them to pay their debts in the United States. In consequence the competition is keen, the price rises and United States dollars are at a premium here.

AVIATOR IS DEAD

Lieutenant Ferguson Was Shot Down in German Lines During the War.

Flight-Lieut. John A. A. Ferguson, son of Rey. John Ferguson, pastor of Bathurst Methodist Church, died at his father's home, 581 Markham street yesterday, after being home one week from Gravenhurst Sani-

tarium.

Lieut. Ferguson enlisted early in the war with the R.F.C., and went overseas in 1917. Whilst on a flying stunt one of his comrades in the air was attacked by a German plane. Ferguson went to his aid. Whilst helping his comrade he was attacked by two other Hun planes from above. and was shot down in the enemy

Since his return in 1919 Lieut. Ferguson had been in the sanitarium with tuberculosis and suffering from the wound in the knee. It was due to neglect while a prisoner that he contracted tuberculosis. Altho in hospital since 1919, he had only been allowed to come home a week ago. Born in Woodbridge, he was educated at high school and was attending there prior to his enlistment. Surviving are his father and mother, Rev. and Mrs. J. Ferguson, one brother, Marshal, and one sister, Emily.
