

REPORT.

The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry in again placing their annual Report before the subscribers and the public feel that they may congratulate them on the satisfactory state of the institution.

During the year just closed a large amount of relief has been extended to the poor of the city by this charity, and the system of ward visiting being still kept in efficient operation the managers hope and believe that nearly every case on the books receiving aid are really deserving and necessitous.

As will be seen by the accompanying statement of the Superintendent, the large number of 655 families received out-door relief during the past year, in addition to which (and the casual poor) an average of 109 are maintained in the house as inmates, most of whom are old and infirm persons, quite unable to earn their own living.

The Managers find that the change made some two years ago, in giving out coal instead of wood, to the poor, during the winter, has been attended with most beneficial results, coal being cheaper than wood, enables the Board to grant relief to a larger extent without increased cost to the charity.

The Soup Kitchen has been again opened for the winter months, in connexion with the House, and large numbers avail themselves of this aid. All applicants for soup are relieved, the amount being regulated by the number in each family applying.

Rations of tea, sugar, barley, &c., are also distributed to families in which there is sickness, in addition to their allowance of coal and bread.

The Trustees and Managers have to deplore the loss, by death, during the past year, of three of the most prominent and useful members of the Board, viz., the Hon. John Elmsley, William Mathers, Esq., and Robert Cathcart, Esq. In the death of Mr. Elmsley, the Trustees and Managers feel that no words of theirs would be adequate to enable their patrons to judge of the great usefulness of that gentleman, not only as a member of this Board and a ward visitor, but also as connected with nearly every movement in this city for relieving distress. The poor of Toronto have lost, in Mr. Elmsley, a kind benefactor, and the community a Christian gentleman. Mr. Mathers and Mr. Cathcart had also been long connected with the Board—the latter for the last two years as deputy chairman, Mr. Cathcart's warm interest in the House of Industry has been still further shewn by the very handsome donation of \$2,000 left by him to the institution. The Trustees would respectfully re-

commend to their successors in office that this sum, when received, should be permanently invested for the benefit of the House, and thus, by this and other grants, enable the Board to extend the usefulness of the charity.

During the last Session of Parliament the amount of Goverment aid to all hospitals and charities was considerably reduced, in which, of course, the grant to this institution was included, the Board however feel pleasure in stating that they have so far been enabled to meet all claims upon them, and leave a fair balance in the hands of the Treasurer.

The Trustees and Managers cannot close this report without acknowledging the most valuable assistance rendered to the efficient working of the institution by the gentlemen of the Board, who act as ward visitors.

Herewith they beg to submit the Treasurer's account, in detail, duly audited, and also the report of the Superintendent, showing the amount and nature of relief afforded during the year.

The Board desire to express their entire satisfaction with the assiduity and efficiency of the Superintendent and Matron of the establishment.
