Co

This Congregation shall be known by the name of the First Presbyterian Church, London.

The Board of Managers shall be chosen by ballot by the Congregation from among the members of the Church in full communion, at the annual meeting of the congregation, or at a meeting duly called for that purpose.

The Board of Managers shall consist of nine members, one-third of whom shall retire annually by rotation; and their places, as also the places of any who may die or vacate their office during the year, shall be filled at the annual meeting of the Congregation. The retiring Managers may be re-elected.

If any Manager be cut off from Church privileges by process of discipline, or leave the Congregation, he shall forthwith cease to act as Manager, and another shall, as soon as convenient, be appointed in his place.

The duties of the Managers shall be to attend to the temporal and financial affairs of the Congregation. More particularly it shall be their duty to obtain from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry; to take care of the property of the Congregation; to provide for the payment of the Minister's and other salaries; and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge, as the Congregation may from time to time direct.

Meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Wednesday of each month for the transaction of business; but a meeting may be held at any time on the call of the Chairman, by notice from the pulpit, or addressed personally to the members of the Board.

Five members present shall constitute a quorum. Every meeting should be opened and closed with prayer.

The Treasurer shall be appointed at the annual meeting of the Congregation from the members of the Board of Managers. His duties shall be to keep the accounts of the Congregation and to receive and disburse all moneys, subject to the direction and control of the Board of Managers.

The Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed by the Board of Managers at the first meeting of the Board held after the annual meeting of the Congregation.

The Chairman's duties shall be to preside at the meetings of the Board of Managers, and to sign all accounts which have passed the Board. In his absence any member may be chosen to act as Chairman *pro tem*. The Chairman has only a casting vote.

The Secretary's duties shall be to keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Board of Managers, and to act as Clerk of the Congregation at congregational meetings.

All cases not herein provided for shall be governed by the Rules and Forms of Procedure laid down by the Church Courts of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

## Session Report, 1892.

In God's good providence it devolves upon the Session of this congregation briefly to review the work of the past year.

As in former years the Elders have called upon the members of the congregation in their various districts preceding each communion season. It is hoped that such visits are a bond of union, and that the people will take advantage of them to discuss the affairs of the congregation and give and accept hints as to any way by which our strength and usefulness may be increased. The pastor has also paid his annual visit to each home in the congregation, as well as many calls made during the year upon the aged and those who have been laid aside through illness, some six hundred visits in all having been made by him. There are, however, some few in the congregation whom it is hardly possible for him to meet, and he desires all to understand that, unless there is some special call made upon him, he is at home Thursday afternoon and evening of each week, and will be pleased to meet with any of his people.

There is much that has been satisfactory in the progress made by the congregation during the year, the details of which will be found in the various reports. There have been a great many changes in the membership, but notwithstanding many losses by death and removal there has been gain in the number upon the roll.

The Session emphasize the necessity of every one connected with the congregation showing faithfulness in the discharge of personal responsibility. It is by each one doing a little that, under the blessing of God, prosperity is attained. taken u Balanc

A much larger sum has been contributed to the schemes of the Church in 1892 than during the preceding year, but it is to be borne in mind that \$500 of the total was a legacy from the estate of Mrs. George Marshall. Aside from this bequest, however, there stands to the congregation's credit this year the sum of \$584.95 in place of \$528.66 last year, an increase of \$55.29. This is gratifying, and that the increase has not been larger is doubtless due to the many demands that are made upon the people. The Session urges upon all members and adherents the conscientious consideration of the various schemes of the Church, all worthy of the support of God's people.

The session note with gratitude that the members of the Young People's Society have undertaken to raise the sum of \$500 for Church building in the Northwest, and this year have contributed and collected \$207 of that sum. The object sought and the spirit shown by the young speople is highly to be commended.

The attendance upon Sabbath and week-day services has on the whole been good, but there are those connected with the congregation, some in full communion, some adherents, who are too often neglectful of their opportunities. It is hoped that to many the year 1893 will bring greater interes in and appreciation of their privileges, and therefore a more regular attendance at the services of God's House. The number of faithful young people in the congregation has also increased, and there is promise of good work in the future through these young

The Pastor's Bible Class has met regularly, with the exception of the months of July and August, and the members of the class have themselves conducted it when the Pastor has unavoidably been absent. It is to be regretted, however, that such a small number of the young men avail themselves of this privilege, and it is hoped that more will take advantage of this opportunity to study God's Word.

The Session are impressed with the importance of faithful visitation of the congregation, and trust that the lady visitors will make an earnest effort to call upon all the families in their various districts at least once or twice a year.

# Report of the Board of Managers

For the Year 1892.

To the Members and Adherents of the First Presbyterian Church:

Your Board of Managers in presenting their Annual Report would recognize with gratitude the goodness of the Great Head of the Church towards us throughout the past year.

We have great satisfaction in being able to announce that the Congregation has enjoyed great financial prosperity during the year just closed. Our revenue for carrying on the ordinary work of the Church as shown by the Treasurer's Report is \$4,367.83, a sum exceeding that of any year in our past history. We are therefore pleased to state that we have been able to meet all liabilities, pay \$300.00 on mortgage, thus reducing our indebtedness to \$2,500, and have a balance in our favor of \$82.82 in the Treasurer's hands. The results for quarters are as follows: First quarter, \$1,099.50; second quarter, \$1,122.59; third quarter, \$1,030.50; fourth quarter, \$1,115.24; total \$4,367.83; \$3,772.33 of which is from envelopes, and \$595.50 from open collections.

It may be here stated that several amounts that were unforeshadowed at our last annual meeting were contracted during the year and have been paid. Were it not so, our indebtedness would have been reduced by at least \$700. Of the amount here referred to, a sum of \$319.06 was paid for repairs to the Waterloo Street South Sunday School, for this outlay however the Congregation have no cause for regrets, as the School is in a very prosperous condition and we have every reason to believe that good work is being done there. Another unavoidable outlay is the item of \$100 for an organ for the Pastor's Choir; this also is a pleasing investment and is showing results, at least commensurate with the expenditure.

The question at present of most interest in connection with our secular affairs is the erection of the new church edifice, and as the Congregation have been informed from time to time of the progress made, and the Building Committee will report on the matter, your Board of Managers deem it unnecessary to enter at length upon the subject. We would here mention, however, that although some trivial obstacles have been met with, nothing sufficiently serious has occurred to materially retard progress in our proceedings, and with the first appearance of fine spring weather, building operations will undoubtedly be commenced and pushed forward with all dispatch towards completion at the earliest possible date.

Your Board of Managers gratefully acknowledge the generous spirit manifested by the Congregation by so liberally responding in the matter of the subscription list. Previous to its being started \$5,000 was the maximum of what might be expected, whereas the amount subscribed exceeds \$7,000, of which over \$1,500 has been paid to the Treasurer.

The Loan has also been completed, so that, financially speaking, all is in readiness, and we can hopefully look forward to the completion of the Church about the end of the present year.

Three members of the Board have retired by rotation and are eligible for re-election, viz.: A. M. Hamilton, Wm. Craig, and A. Sharp.

Your Board respectfully recommend the following:—1st, that Rev. W. J. Clark's stipend be \$2,100 for the present year; 2nd, that the usual grant of \$50 be given to the Sunday School of the Church.

The thanks of the Congregation are due to the Choir for their faithful services, and the gentlemen who have so efficiently acted as ushers.

# Report of Building Committee.

Your Building Committee, to whom has been entrusted the erection of a new church edifice, and to whom full power has been granted by the Congregation, have not, under existing circumstances, any extended report to make.

It may be sufficient to say that plans were prepared, tenders received, and arrangements made to carry on the work. It had been intended to proceed with the foundation and other preliminary work during the Fall of 1892, but circumstances, and particularly one circumstance, prevented. The winter, however, has been anything but an open one, and in all probability but little time has been actually lost by delaying operations until the spring of the present year. It is the intention of the several sub-committees, among which the work to be done has been sub-divided, to get again actively at work, with the object of being ready to push operations vigorously in the early spring.

The one circumstance specially alluded to above, which caused some delay, was the opposition of Mr. Chisholm to the Congregation being allowed to project the new building westward on their own property to the extent contemplated in their plans. It was thought the matter might be settled promptly, and that a few weeks' delay would not be an important hindrance. The matter was not settled promptly, and, indeed, is still dragging its slow length along. Your Committee do not, however, consider the situation as serious, nor as one calling for any further delay on the part of the Committee; and it is their intention as stated above, to proceed at the earliest practicable date to carry out the mandate laid upon them by the Congregation.

In presenting this, the Annual Report, while we regret that the average attendance is not as good as in 1891, we have reason to be thankful that there are still the same number of scholars enrolled; and though a large number of teachers and scholars have left us others have been found to fill their places.

The collections for Missions also are considerably in advance of the previous year, as will be shown later in this report.

There are eighteen classes in the School this year (two less than last year) and are as follows: one Young Ladies' Bible Class, eight boys' and eight girls' classes, and the Infant Class.

The names of five teachers and officers were added to the roll, and the number struck off was five, leaving the staff complete; while of scholars the large number of thirty-seven was added, and curiously enough the same number was removed. Of these latter, one has joined the teaching staff, another, little Tommy Irwin, was taken away by death, much regretted by all, and the balance have mostly left this district.

It will be seen from the foregoing statistics that the children do not attend as regularly as they might, and in view of the fact we would take this opportunity to urge upon the parents the necessity of seeing that their children are regular in attendance and have their lessons well prepared. In

connection with the above we might state that our staff of teachers for the coming year never was better, and it is hoped this will be borne in mind.

### Waterloo Street School.

The teachers and officers have much pleasure in presentng to the congregation their first annual report.

The School was opened on the first Sabbath in January, 1892, with an attendance of nine scholars and eight teachers and officers, which has steadily increased until on the last Sabbath of the year the attendance was one hundred and four scholars and sixteen teachers and officers.

An increase of over one hundred per cent.

During the first six months only one room in the building was occupied, but as the attendance increased it was found necessary to fit up a second room, which was opened on the first Sabbath in July, with a special service.

A Bible Class for young women, taught by Mr. Greenlees, was begun in July with an attendance of three, which has steadily increased until there are now fourteen names on the roll, with an average attendance of ten.

The School is graded into eleven classes, and consists of one Women's Bible Class, five boys' and four girls' classes, and the Infant Class.

The Library, which contains nearly two hundred volumes, has been freely used by the scholars and much appreciated.

The older scholars, during the year, have been supplied with the Northern Messenger, and the little ones with the Sunbeam.

A Weekly Prayer Meeting in connection with the School has been held during the winter months, with an attendance

of from thirty to forty. These meetings have been addressed by our Pastor, members of Session and others, while valuable help has been rendered in making them attractive by the members of the Christian Endeavor Society in connection with the Church.

An entertainment for the scholars and their parents was given in the School room in the beginning of October, and proved a great success, the parents turning out in large numbers.

Each teacher has visited the homes of their scholars during the year, with good results both to teacher and scholars.

The weekly collections, to aid in paying the expenses of the School, have been \$76.95.

The teachers and officers desire to express their thanks to the Board of Management and the First Presbyterian Sabbath School for their liberal grants to meet the running expenses of the School, and to the members of the congregation and others who so kindly helped them to fit up the rooms and form their Library.

# Report of the Missionary Society.

In coming before the Congregation at the close of another year, the Missionary Committee has much pleasure in reporting a continued increase in the amount collected for the various Schemes of the Church.

During the year 1891 the amount realized from envelopes was \$528.66, while this year there has been received from the same source (including a special contribution of \$25.00 for Home Missions) \$584.95, showing a gain of \$56.29 over the previous year. The number of contributors has risen from 93 to 139, giving an average of \$5.36 per contributor or \$1.83 per member.

Your Committee while expressing their satisfaction with the progress which is thus shown, are nevertheless of the opinion that if our membership realized to any adequate extent the great importance of the different operations carried on by our Church at large, both at home and abroad, and the strong claims these have upon our sympathy and support, the amount contributed for these purposes would bear a larger proportion than it does to the sums raised for our own use as a congregation. We would again remind contributors that these monthly offerings represent, not merely our subscription to Missions, but to all the 8 or 10 different schemes of the Church. The envelopes now furnished bear the names of these different funds, and subscribers are requested to decide how much they are able to give to each, (indicating their wish, if so desired) and make the total contribution accordingly.

# Women's Foreign Missionary Society.

The year just closed has been very encouraging to us as a Society. In point of numbers we are a little stronger than a year ago, six new members having been welcomed. We have held eleven regular meetings during the year, all of which have been interesting and instructive; the average attendance has been fourteen. The subjects considered—Missions in China, Prophecies concerning the Jews, the Opium Traffic, Slave Trade in Africa, and our Northwest Missions.

Early in the year it was decided to extend an invitation to the Women's Foreign Missionary Society to hold their next annual meeting in London. The invitation was accepted, and we look forward with great pleasure to their meetings in April. Mrs. Robert Reid and Mrs. Charles Leonard were appointed delegates to attend the last annual meeting held in Toronto in May. An interesting report of the meetings was afterwards given by Mrs. Reid.

Owing to the resignation in March last of Mrs. Fraser, the Secretary, Mrs. Charles Leonard was appointed to fill the position for the remainder of the year.

The special work assigned our Society by the Presbyterial Society was to provide clothing for Indians in some of our Northwest Missions. A special collection was taken which amounted to \$11.75. This amount was expended for clothing and returned to the Presbyterial Society in August. Total of money received during the year \$112.40

The Annual Thankoffering Meeting was held in October, when we were glad to welcome Dr. Paton, Missionary to the New Hebrides. The meeting was well attended, and cannot

## Report of the Ladies' Aid Society.

During the year eight meetings were held, the average attendance being fourteen. Two receptions were given in the school-room; the first in January, and the second in November. And five afternoon sewing meetings were held at the homes of members of the Society. These were fairly well attended and the result desired partially attained—that of bringing the ladies of the congregation together in a social way and thereby making them better acquainted.

Three lectures were also given under the auspices of the Society; the first by Mr. R. A. Little, B.A., of the Collegiate Institute, on the "Negro Problem"; the second by Rev. Dr. Howie, of Palestine, the proceeds going towards his missionary work there; and the last by Rev. Dr. Munroe Gibson, of London, England, subject "Robert Browning," this being a great literary treat.

Our membership shows an increase of six over last year and the number of contributors remains unchanged.

Mrs. C. W. Leonard and Mrs. Cowan have been appointed to fill the vacancies on the Elders' visiting list.

At the last meeting in December it was decided to issue circulars and send them to each family, with contribution envelopes for first quarter of the year, asking each lady who is not already a contributor to give a certain sum monthly, no matter how small, to aid in purchasing furnishings for the new church, to which object the funds of the Society are to be devoted.

We are greatly indebted to Mr. Little and Rev Dr. Gibson, who lectured for us gratuitously, and our thanks are due to those who so kindly assisted at the receptions, as well as to the friends who contributed so liberally, though not members.

### Report of Christian Endeavor Society.

In reviewing the work of our Society for the past year, we cannot but feel thankful for the success that we have attained. Not only has our membership roll increased, but there has been manifested a deeper interest and increasing zeal in the meetings which we hold on Sunday evenings.

In December of 1891 our membership roll numbered sixty-six, of whom thirty-nine were active, twenty-six associate and one affiliated members.

During the past year we have enrolled twenty-one active and eighteen associate, whilst the names of six active and five associate members have been struck off. Of these, five have left the city, eleven associate members were transferred to the active list, and one active member became affiliated. We have now a total membership of ninety-four, of whom sixty-four are active, twenty-eight associate and two affiliated members.

On account of so many of our members being absent from home during the vacation, no meetings were held during the months of July and August.

In addition to our regular meetings, we held meetings at the Convalescent Home, one social meeting at the Aged Women's Home, and each week five or six of our members attend and take part in the prayer meetings held at the Sabbath School on Waterloo Street.

In order to make our members better acquainted with each other, we held a social in the School Room and a picnic to Port Stanley.

Encouraged by the success that has attended our efforts, we felt ourselves capable of undertaking some active work outside of our own particular work in the Society, and of thus increasing our sphere of usefulness. We decided that our efforts
