FOURTH SESSION.

The Conference opened on Wednesday, June 15th, 1887, at 9 a.m.

The President took the chair and conducted devotional exercises, the Brethren George Johnson and Roland Morton leading in prayer.

After further devotional exercises, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed.

The Roll of Ministers was called, when sixty-four Ministers answered to their names.

The Names of the Lay members were reported by the Chairmen of Districts.

The retiring President spoke briefly, reviewing the year, and thanking the Members of the Conference for their unvarying kindness, after which he called upon the Conference to elect a President.

On the fourth ballot, Rev. Jos. Gaetz was declared elected, who took his seat and addressed the Conference in a very interesting speech. He then called upon the Conference to elect a Secretary.

On the first ballot, A. D. Morton, M.A., was declared re-elected.

J. G. Angwin was elected Journal Secretary, W. H. Langille, and G. W. F. Glendinning were appointed Assistant Secretaries, and S. E. Whiston Assistant Journal Secretary.

A resolution of thanks to the retiring President for the efficient discharge of his official duties was unanimously passed.

The Examinations shall take place on the first Wednesday in May, at 9. a.m., and in six Sections as follows:—

SECTION I.—The Halifax District. In Windsor, under the charge of Jabez A. Rogers, and D. W. Johnson, A.B.

SECTION II.—The Truro and Cumberland Districts. In Truro, under the charge of E. B. Moore, and E. E. England.

SECTION III.—The Annapolis District. In Annapolis, under the charge of J. Cassidy, and S. B. Dunn.

SECTION IV.—The Guysboro' and Cape Breton Districts. In Port Hawkesbury, under the charge of John Astbury, and W. H. Evans.

SECTION V.—The Liverpool and Yarmouth Districts. In Liverpool, under the charge of G. O. Huestis, and J. C. Ogdan.

SECTION VI.—Bermuda. At Hamilton, under the charge of Supt., of District.

NOTE 1.—Superintendents of Circuits are required, immediately after the March Quarterly Meeting, to forward to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners the names of Candidates recommended to be received on trial by their respective Quarterly Boards.

NOTE 2.—The Examiners are requested to forward their questions upon the books allotted to them to the Secretary of the Board of Examiners on or before the 31st day of December.

In order that Circuits may have some knowledge of what may be required of them the Committee shall ascertain the aggregate amount of deficiency in each year and shall estimate the amount which it may consider the Church can raise. This estimated sum shall be apportioned by the Committee to the several Districts on the basis of Circuit Income for Ministers salary, and shall, at the Financial District Meetings, be apportioned to the several Circuits and Stations in such manner and proportion as in each case may be thought best.

IV.

In making disbursements the Committee shall be governed by the following regulations:—

1. Probationers to receive a salary of \$350.00.
2. Men in the full work to receive \$500.00 for first year after reception, which sum is to be increased by 25.00 for each subsequent year until the salary reach \$750.00, provided always that no Minister whose income exclusive of Children's Fund claims shall equal \$670.00 shall receive anything out of this Fund until others shall receive their full claims according to the terms of the first part of this sub-section.
3. In determining the basis upon which grants shall be made, the Committee shall estimate the income of each Circuit and Station, separately. The estimate for each Circuit shall be year by year. The Committee shall, from time to time, submit its estimates to the Conference.
4. The Committee shall have power to consider any special cases which may arise, and to take such action as may be considered necessary.

V.

The Committee shall, through its Secretary-Treasurer, make an annual report of its work to the Conference. This report shall include that of an audit of accounts.

REPORT OF C. E. AND P. AID FUND COM. OF N.S. CONFERENCE.

The business done by this is constantly increasing. Since last conference four aggregating \$1050,00 have been authorized and completed. The total amount of loans made since the Fund has been operating is \$4720.00 of this capital sum \$1439,29 has been returned, leaving the sum of \$8285.71 in the hands of Trustee Boards.

During the year the interest of this Fund in Jubilee Fund investments has been transferred to Supernumerary Fund Treasurer, in payment of an amount borrowed from the latter in the year 1881. Owing to shrinkage of values in foreclosure of mortgage, &c., the amount netted to this Fund was \$498.20. This unfortunate result for which the Committee and officers of this Fund are not in any way responsible has resulted in a loss of \$164.85. The accumulations in the regular way have in the year reduced this loss to 102.05.

Trustee Boards who have received loans have in general shown great promptitude in repayment. Twenty-one trusts are now enjoying the advantages of the Fund.

3. That for the present year the revenue shall be derived by a pro rata assessment on the Circuit receipts of last year.
4. That for the present year the claim for each child shall be \$5 excepting the children of deceased and Supernumerary Ministers and those over five in number of the ministers in the active work, who shall receive in every case \$30.

REPORT OF THE SUPERNUMERARY FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee regrets that it can report an increase in receipts from circuits over last year of only \$20.01. This increase has been principally in the Bermuda and Guysboro Districts. In several of the others there has been even a slight decrease.

We commend the interests of this Fund to the careful consideration of the Superintendents of Circuits and the friends of our cause generally. This small increase in receipts is hardly an offset to the regular increase in demands. The General Treasurer in his appeal to the members of the Fund, says:—

The Current increase must be increased in some way or soon fail to pay in full the moderate but gradually increasing demands made upon it. It cannot be thought that the scale of allowances is too liberal. The average yearly allowance to the forty supernumeraries was \$213, and to the seventeen widows less than \$90, last year." He closes his appeal with the following significant words:—"In 1876, ten years ago, the amount of the annual claims paid to 20 supernumeraries and 11 widows was \$5,019.71; the amount paid at the last Conference to 40 supernumeraries and 17 widows was \$9,996.25, and the Current increase for the year, barely sufficient to meet these claims." Indeed, we may add, that although there was a small balance after paying claims, it was insufficient to offset the demands upon capital stock for repayments. As a consequence our capital stock actually suffered during the year 1885-6, as may be seen by the Financial Exhibit herewith presented to the extent of \$577.73. Help, brethren these things ought not to be.

The Conference will be glad to know under these circumstances, that the contention with the Western Fund as to the legacy of the late Z. Chipman, Esq., of St. Stephen, has been by the courts decided in our favor, by which means the timely addition of \$5000 has been made this year to our capital stock.

TEMPERANCE REPORT.

We your committee are gratified to be able to report that temperance sentiment in this Province has reached a high mark, and in no section of the population, higher than in our own Church. But the painful fact is becoming more and more apparent that the laws of the country are construed by the courts in many cases, contrary to the spirit of Justice and the best interests of the people.

The principal remedy therefore, for the difficulties lying in the way, seems to us to be the election of men to parliament who shall not only insist upon *good laws*, but shall also see that measures are taken to have the laws properly administered.

It is the opinion of the committee that the Conference should urge upon our people the importance of maintaining all we have gained thus far in legislation, till a purely Prohibitory law can be secured, and that we protest most emphatically against any such interference with the Canada Temperance Act, or the License Act of Nova Scotia as would make them less efficient or stringent in their working.

We most heartily adopt the following resolutions placed on record by the Montreal Conference.

"Whereas the disastrous influence of the liquor traffic is by statistical and well-tabulated evidence becoming more manifest throughout this land, involving the destruction of life to the extent of several thousands annually, the direct victims of liquor, and entailing poverty and crime, as authenticated by the records of courts, prisons, and benevolent institutions, and

"Whereas the attitude of the Dominion Government toward the Prohibition movement has given rise to the greatest fear on the part of lovers of Temperance and moral reform that a reactionary policy is about to be inaugurated looking to the impairment, not the abolition, of the Scott Act,

"Therefore be it resolved, that we, the ministers and laity of this Conference, having observed the beneficial effects of prohibitory legislation in diminishing crime, lessening drunkenness, promoting the temporal comfort of the people in those counties where it is enforced, would memorialize the Legislature of the Dominion against any action that would impair the beneficial effect of said legislation by sanctioning the sale of intoxicants in said counties;

"Resolved, That all the ministers and laity of this Conference, solemnly pledge ourselves to oppose by all constitutional methods any Government, political party or individual member of Parliament, who shall directly or indirectly oppose the existing prohibitory legislation;

"Resolved, That as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens to subordinate political party alliances to the great work of securing the abolition of the accursed liquor traffic;

"Resolved that while we recognize in the Senate some noble representative men who have stood faithful to their responsibilities and have sought to advance prohibitory reform we affirm our utter want of confidence in the majority of the members of that body on this question, and lament the deliberate action of the Government in filling the vacancies which occur by men who are, with but few exceptions, the declared and determined opponents of the Temperance reform;

"Resolved that we declare our desire to cooperate with the various Conferences of the Methodist Church of Canada, from Halifax to British Columbia, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, the Anglican Synods and Congregational Union, the Baptist Association and also Cardinal Taschereau the Head of the Roman Catholic Church in this Dominion, in a combined effort to marshal public sentiment, which shall demand of the Parliament of this Dominion prohibitory legislation, which shall abolish that greatest of evils under which the people of this Dominion mourn."

The Committee also unanimously recommend the Conference to place on record its opinion as to the prevalent and growing habit of using Tobacco, that much money is wasted; that the health if not the morals of many boys and young men are seriously injured by this habit, your Committee fully believe; and that it is time the Christian Church definitely repudiated all responsibility of encouraging by its silence the use of tobacco in any form.

CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

With pleasure your Committee reports that by the blessing of God the present prosperity of this institution is unprecedented, and the perpetuity of its success is becoming annually more apparent. Never in its history did it receive such signal marks of the divine favor, as last summer, as evidenced in the earnestness of christian workers, the readiness of the unsaved to yield themselves up to Christ, and the number brought into the fold. A very marked feature was the deep interest taken in the subject of christian holiness as a definite experience all through the meetings.

From the report of the officials we learn that it is their intention to make every provision within their power for the success of the gathering this season; further improvements are being made upon the grounds and new features are being introduced of a thoroughly scriptural and legitimate character which it is hoped will increase the interest taken in this religious festival.

The officials also express their thanks for the interest taken by our ministers and laymen in this enterprise and assure them that no pains will be spared to suit their convenience in every way practicable.

The time fixed for the opening of Camp meeting this season is the 27th July, and it is expected that the meetings will continue until the 4th of August.

REPORT OF S. S. COMMITTEE.

We have 12,045 children attending our schools, of whom 1393 are members of our society classes. During the year 420 have been brought to Christ, while the attendance has increased by 864.

The following facts relative to the Methodist Schools of the Dominion, are worthy of note :—

1. 10,785 scholars have been added to our schools during the year.
2. The Methodist Schools outnumber those of all other protestant churches, both as to number of schools and scholars in attendance.
3. Over 20,000 volumes have been distributed among poor schools during the year.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted :—

1. We recommend, with a view of securing uniformity in filling up S. S. Schedules and furnishing a yearly report of the number of our S. Scholars pledged to total abstinence, that hereafter, in filling up the column in Circuit and District Schedules, headed, “No. who have taken total abstinence pledge,” the total number of pledged abstainers in the S. Schools be given in all cases, and not merely the number who have taken the pledge during the year.
2. We further recommend that uniformity be observed in reporting amounts raised for Missions, and that all amounts raised in S. Schools, whether by card or otherwise, be included as directed in S. S. Schedule No. 1. G.
3. And we strongly recommend the use of our series of catechisms in our S. Schools, and advise S. S. Teachers and officers not to be content with the stray catechism questions contained in the Berean Leaves.

SPIRITUAL REPORT.

HALIFAX DISTRICT reports Spiritual prosperity and aggressiveness in church movement. An increase is manifested on the part of members by a readiness in social services and more general personal effort to lead sinners to Christ which cannot fail to be productive of good results.

TRURO DISTRICT—In this district there have been many seasons of spiritual refreshing on the different circuits. God's Servants have laboured faithfully for the master and have enjoyed many tokens of His favour and approval; the congregations have been large, in almost every circuit some souls have been saved.

CUMBERLAND DISTRICT—The reports from this District now indicate progress in every line of church work. A new church has been erected in Nappan and Oxford circuits, they have already been the birth place of many souls. On the Parrsboro and Advocate Harbour circuits much good has been accomplished. Increase in membership 237.

GUYSBORO AND CAPE BRETON DISTRICT—This District has enjoyed a remarkably prosperous year. Gracious revivals have visited nearly every circuit, giving a new impulse to every department of church work. Increase in membership for the year 396

ANNAPOLIS DISTRICT—The work in this District has been very encouraging during the past year. No part of the field has been altogether without gracious visitation. God's Spirit has been poured out on many circuits and as the result there has been a gratifying increase in the membership. The brethren have aimed at working Methodism on Methodist lines.

LIVERPOOL DISTRICT—The spiritual reports from the various circuits in this district upon the whole present features of interest and encouragement. Many of the circuits report large accessions in membership. There is much to awaken devout gratitude to the great Head of the Church for His manifested presence.

YARMOUTH DISTRICT, Reports the work of God on its various circuits to be in a very satisfactory condition. There has been an increased attendance on all the means of grace. Scores of souls have professed faith in God, and many members have been gathered into the fold of Christ.

BERMUDA DISTRICT—The reports of this District seem to indicate progress. There has been a general interest in the means of grace. The classes have been more thoroughly sustained, and S. School work has made a general advance. Much good has been accomplished by open air work. The indications seem to warrant the belief that the near future will witness a gracious revival and ingathering of souls.

Resolved, That in the consideration of the state of the work of God,

This Conference devoutly desires to record its gratitude to the giver of every good and perfect gift for the manifestation of grace unto salvation, as shewn during the year just closed, in which the spiritual life of the church has been greatly revived. The Conference would record its conviction that more earnest efforts should be made towards the employment of exhorters and local preachers, with the addition wherever possible of organized bands for house to house visiting and evangelistic effort. The Conference expresses its determination to more fully consecrate its strength and influence to the work of saving souls, and to the endeavor to lift still higher the spiritual life of the church, and would further recommend to the church the last Friday of August as a day of special thanksgiving with supplication that our church may be even more successful than in the past as a winner of souls.

MISSIONARY REPORT.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY MEETING, June 15, 1887.

Chair taken by the President, Rev. Joseph Gaetz at 7 30 o'clock on Wednesday evening the 15th., inst.

After singing and prayer the President briefly addressed the meeting, referred to some of his early experiences of Missionary toil in Newfoundland when he often met with rough persecution, but God graciously owned his labors for the conversion of souls.

The Report of the Society was then presented by the Secretary. After an anthem rendered by the choir, Rev. David Hickey addressed the congregation on the "Origin, triumphs, and progress of Missions." It would be impossible to give in the brief space at disposal any resume of this elegant and ample address which would do it justice. The same remarks apply to all the addresses which were of an unusually high order of merit. Fuller reports will have been seen in the Connexion and daily papers.

Rev. Arthur Hockin spoke most forcibly and aptly on "Home Missions," giving point after point on the importance, civilizing and educative power of Home Missions.

Mr. S. E. Whiston, of Halifax, admirably presented the claims of the Women's Missionary Society and its noble assistance to our work.

Rev. Joseph Coffin, though the hour was late, held the close attention of the large audience to an eloquent exposition on the adaptation of the gospel to all classes, and the unity of the whole field of operations.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

DEAR CHRISTIAN BRETHREN.—As your united Pastorate, assembled in our Annual Conference, we again send you our greetings and counsels. Receive them as a renewed assurance of the unfeigned love which we cherish for your souls, and of our earnest solicitude that you should increase with all the increase of God. The Apostolic words, "Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ," express our constant and heart-felt prayer in your behalf.

The place of our gathering has been the scene of the labours of Methodist preachers since the year 1834, when the Rev. J. McMurray, D.D., now a venerable father in our midst, preached the first sermon. Though our church here has not reached its present proportions and position in this town without overcoming many difficulties, some of them severely trying, the prosperity it now enjoys is one of the marked tokens of Divine power which we as a people have received, and our special prayer is that our presence in the midst of this congregation may result in the strengthening of their bonds, the confirming of their faith and the advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom.

It is but fitting that as loyal subjects your attention should be called to the auspicious completion of the Jubilee Year in the reign of her Majesty, Queen Victoria, an occurrence which not only calls for devout thankfulness to Almighty God on her behalf, but for the many national blessings which, during her reign we have enjoyed at His hands; for the unity and prosperity of her empire, for the extension of its power and influence, and above all for the increase of righteousness in the earth, through the various representative organizations which have sent abroad their agents under the influence of her rule. Let your prayers still ascend to heaven for the preservation of her life, the continuance of her empire in peace, and the establishment of her throne in righteousness.

In reviewing the history of the past year we find occasion for unfeigned gratitude to the Great Head of the Church in the fact that though severe affliction has visited some of His Ministering Servants and their families we are saved the painful duty of chronicling the death of any of our fathers or brethren.

Through the varied and frequently trying experiences incident to ministerial life, they have been safely conducted by the wise and gracious providence of God.

We are also glad to be able to inform you that during the year, as a denomination we have had great peace within our borders. On several of our circuits, have fallen showers of blessing, while from none have the dews of divine grace been withheld.

The returns from the various districts show a net increase of 745 members.

Since our last Session, the second General Conference of our united Methodism has been held. Its legislation was so cautious in conserving our institutions and usages as nearly as possible in their primitive forms that it amounts to a re-affirmation on the part of the pastors and the people of their confidence in the time-honoured methods of our church.

You will be pleased to learn that our Educational Institutions at Sackville, continue to enjoy public confidence, and to prosecute successfully their important work; and we have the utmost confidence in commending these Institutions to you for the higher education of your sons and daughters.

The retirement of our beloved brother, the Rev. T. Watson Smith from the Editorial chair on account of failing health was to us all a cause of profound regret. As you are aware the General Conference has appointed the Rev. Dr. Lathern as his successor; and we may congratulate ourselves that one has been called to this important office, who is so well known and so highly esteemed throughout our Church, and so eminently qualified for the position. The Rev. S. F. Huestis, a brother esteemed and beloved, has been appointed Book Steward. The business tact and other special qualifications possessed by Brother Huestis fully justify this renewed expression of the Church's confidence. A new departure has been taken in the reduction of the price of the *Wesleyan* from two dollars to one dollar and fifty cents. That this venture might not result in serious financial loss it was necessary that the circulation of the *Wesleyan* should be largely increased; hence, an appeal was made for one thousand additional subscribers. Already 850 names have been added to the list, and we earnestly hope that the full number required will be speedily secured. We recommend the *Wesleyan* with its well filled columns of literary and religious intelligence, as well adapted to gratify and instruct the members of your home circle. The design of our Book-Room in Halifax is to furnish our ministers and people, at the cheapest paying rates possible, with our sound theological and other standard works; and to supply a healthy and valuable literature which will enlighten the mind and improve the heart. Permit us, dear brethren, to ask you to rally round this important department of our work and to extend to it, in both branches your most generous patronage.

In the Sabbath School department of our work we are able to report an encouraging increase in the number of teachers and scholars, with a comparatively creditable advance in the average attendance. It is also pleasing to be able to report 420 conversions, 1930 as having signed the pledge of total abstinence prescribed by the Discipline and 3505 as learning the catechism of our church. It is worthy of comment that in Bermuda 620 scholars are learning the catechism out of a possible number of 693. It is hoped that other districts will take pattern from those isles of the sea and give more marked attention to this important feature of Sabbath School work.

We strongly recommend the observance of the requirements of the Discipline with reference to the holding of District Sabbath School Conventions and hope the day is not far distant when the recommendation of our General Conference with reference to the formation of a Conference Sabbath School Association will be brought into effect.

Owing to the increasing demands for Home Mission work throughout the Dominion and the inability of the General Board of Missions to meet satisfactorily all present claims upon its resources, memorials from several Conferences and Districts were presented to the General Conference of 1886, praying for the establishment of a Sustentation Fund.

On the recommendation of that body, your Annual Conference has inaugurated a scheme which we trust will commend itself to you and receive your prompt and hearty support.

We would call the attention of our sisters especially to the claims of the Woman's Missionary Society, a society which, while it received some official sanction from the time of its establishment in 1880, was not fully recognized as part of our church organization until the General Conference of 1886; in view of the more recent action in regard to it, constituting it part of our economy, the urgent demands for female agents in the Mission Fields, and the natural feeling of sympathy which should exist between all christian women and their sisters in heathendom we heartily commend to you this society's work, not only trusting that your contributions to its funds will be increased, but that others may be led in a like spirit to that which has prompted two devoted females from our church in this province, to consecrate themselves to the mission work of our church.

Amongst the auxiliaries of our church we would not have you lose sight of the Methodist Camp Meeting Association. While in some respects its history has been a somewhat checkered one it has never deviated from the objects for which it first began to work; true to God and the convictions under which the scheme was inaugurated its record is on high and in the light of divinity alone will it be known how much has been accomplished in the conversion of souls and the sanctification of believers through this agency. Never in its history were God's servants more faithful in their preaching, his people more in earnest for the salvation of souls, or was more good done than last year. Never were its prospects for usefulness as bright as they are now; still it never more reasonably claimed the hearty co-operation of God's people than it does to-day, nor is there within the bounds of our Conference at the present time an agency combining such a variety of harmonious influences so well calculated to invite believers to entire consecration to God, to stimulate them to greater activity in His service, and suggest methods of and opportunities for work suited to many spheres. We heartily recommend this Association with its annual gathering to your favorable consideration.

Not only do we learn from the New Testament that some were by divine authority set apart for the work of evangelists, but the exigencies of our work as well as the example of sister churches demand that in some such way the over-taxed labourers in the field shall be assisted and the grain already ripened for the sickle garnered.

We would therefore call your attention to the fact that while the Conference has not seen its way clear to set apart a man from the ranks of the ministry for this work, a Committee has been appointed empowered to employ a suitable man whenever they may find one.

There is no reason why those who have been especially set apart for the work of the ministry should be the only persons eligible for this position, let your prayers, therefore, ascend to the Lord of the Harvest, that he may raise up some duly qualified minister or layman to prosecute this work.

One of the popular mottoes which is said to have originated with Cornish Methodists is "All at it, and always at it;" this, we believe is one of the best preventives to declension in the spiritual life of the individual christian or the church. In modern church work no wiser method has been introduced for the employment of the inactive element in connection with our congregations than the banding of a number of christian people together under an efficient leader for the purpose of aiding the frequently over-worked pastor, supplementing the work of an evangelist or visiting neglected districts in their own or neighbouring circuits. Such work entered upon in the spirit of entire consecration, would, as has been already proved, yield an abundant harvest of souls; it would be well for all our circuits to adopt this plan on some basis suited to local opportunities and material.

In view of the deepening interest in Prohibitory Legislation and the efforts which are being put forth to destroy the power of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, we would call your special attention to the resolutions adopted by this Conference and urge their adoption by all our people.

And now brethren suffer the word of exhortation. Be assured that it is no mere formality when year by year we urge upon you the maintenance of personal piety. This is your life. The absence of spirituality in the church is death. The mere addition of members or the perfunctory discharge of duty cannot keep christianity alive. There must be the indwelling of the Holy Ghost. Systems of religion are worthless until they are energized by divine agency. It is the Spirit that giveth life. We exhort you to cultivate personal holiness, not only for the sake of your own peace and joy, but also that you may be a blessing to others. Be content with nothing less than entire personal consecration to God. Let us remind you that this will be promoted by a diligent use of the means of grace. "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." In view of the subtle methods on the one hand and the laxity on others by which the sanctity of the day is invaded be careful to support no measure whether social, industrial, political or ecclesiastical which will have the slightest tendency to endanger the validity of this Divine enactment. See to it that the worship of God has the first place in your thoughts on this day. Do not allow your place in the Sanctuary ever to be vacant when it is possible for you to be there. Do not listen to the temptation that one appearance in the Lord's House, on the Sabbath is sufficient, except under special circumstances. Be found regularly at the Sacramental Table. As often as the sacramental bread and cup are dispensed, "do ye show forth with patient faith and grateful acknowledgment the sacrificial death of our Lord Jesus Christ." We watch over some of you in this respect with a godly jealousy. It is not a matter of option or caprice whether you thus commune or not. The command is most solemn and obligatory. "Do this in remembrance of me." Be diligent in the use of your weekly meetings for fellowship and prayer. "Let us hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering, for he is faithful that promised; and let us consider one another to provoke unto love and good works; not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is; but exhorting one another and so much the more as ye see the day approaching." In this age of activity and enterprise beware of the temptation to neglect private prayer and the devout reading of the holy Scriptures. Let not the social circle or the favourite book have greater charms for you than the Mercy Seat of God. Let not the hour of prayer be less punctually kept than the hour of secular or social engagement.

"What various hindrances we meet
In coming to the mercy seat."

Because of these we ought to come the more frequently. "That we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need." Your personal piety thus promoted by the use of appointed means will be fully exhibited in your christian deportment. You will manifest a patient disposition in circumstances of trial or provocation. Your lips shall be under guard so that no corrupt communication shall proceed out of your mouth. Your business transactions will be marked by uprightness and integrity. You will be religious in making a bargain as truly as in singing a hymn or in offering a prayer. And your zeal for the salvation of others will be seen in your earnest attempts

"To save poor souls out of the fire,
To snatch them from the verge of hell,
And turn them to a pardoning God,
And quench the brands in Jesus' blood."

Some of you are parents. We ask you to consider your weighty responsibilities. In the sacrament of Baptism claim for your children the Saviour's promised grace. Let the service be conducted if possible in the Lord's House and on the Lord's day, so that you and your offspring may have the prayers and the sympathies of the people of God. Give to your little ones not only a christian example but also an early religious training. Do not think for one moment that you can commit to others the sacred responsibility of teaching your children the way of the Lord. If the earliest seeds of truth have to be implanted in the Sunday School or in the Sanctuary there has been neglect at home. Let it be your constant aim to surround your children with the influences of a thoroughly christian home, as with the atmosphere of a temple, so that their first lisps may be of Christ, their first imaginings of his love, their first steps to his footstool and their first moral act, an act of consecration to His service.

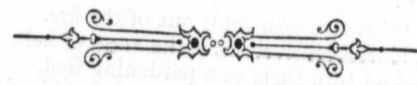
We exhort you to give attention to strangers who occasionally visit our places of worship and to those regular hearers who are not members of our church. Our religious profession demands that we be courteous. We little know the emotions under which many seek or wander into the House of God. It may be that a word kindly spoken will knit the stranger to you and to the place. Fix your heart upon the conversion of some whom you know to be out of the way. Let them see and feel that you have an interest in their welfare. Bring their cases before the Lord in prayer; and you shall rejoice over souls gathered to Christ and into the Church.

We appeal to you, dear brethren, who hold office in our churches. Ye are our helpers in the work of the Lord Jesus. Let us unitedly seek to realize the Master's spirit that we may do His will. Let the Leaders aspire after richer views of truth, and higher experience of the things of God that they may be means of blessing to their classes. Let the Local Preachers see to it that, as ambassadors for Christ they get thoroughly acquainted with their message, and that with the love of Christ constraining them they beseech men to be "reconciled to God." Let Sunday School teachers ask to be all taught of God, and be encouraged in their work and labour of love. Let Stewards and Trustees bear in mind that, tho' chiefly charged with the temporal affairs of the Church, they are employed in blessed service, and that, ere long if diligent, each one shall hear the Master say "Well done thou good and faithful servant." Let us all be up and doing. There is work for all. The world is kneeling in tears and hope for a blessing at our hands. Immortal powers are within us. Angels are beckoning us onward. God is perpetually summoning us to duty; and imperishable honours are waiting in unseen hands to crown us.

Finally, brethren, we most earnestly desire that between the altar and the porch there may be no conflicting counsel; that the pulpit and the pew may conspire to render the year on which we enter vocal with the praises of the new birth, and that when our work is done we may shine "as the stars" before Him whose we are, and whom we serve. To this end we pray that the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God our Father, and the Communion of the Holy Ghost may abide with you and with us, henceforth and forever. Amen.
