# SAYS DESTINY IS LARGELY IN PEOPLE'S HANDS

C. N. R. Head Suggests that Judges Name Commission on Problems.

C. P. R. CO-OPERATION

Following his speech at last aight's banquet, Sir Henry Thornton this morning enlarged upon his proposal for a Maritime Provinces commission, and pointed out that it was necessary for the people to busy themselves in the matters at issue. He said he would welne C. P. R. co-operation. He Him Term In Jail outlined his views on the apointment of the commi

Others of the C. N. R. visiting party made a detailed inspection of the harbor this morning and all left for Sydney at one o'clock.

"Now as to the method of appointment. It is desirable, I say, to keep it out of politics. Would it be possible for the judges of each province, say the chief justice of each province, to meet and take on additional responsibilities as outstanding and independent citizens and appoint such a commission? If they would not do it, could not the governors of the three provinces meet and lend their assistance to framing such a board?"

Let Halifax Know.

Sir Henry continued to discuss the formation of the board from many aspects. It was evident that he regarded the men who would be selected as most important to carry out the ideas and to make the investigation into the needs of the Maritime Provinces. He agreed that somebody must act, and there should be no hesitation in any responsible organization taking the initiative to start the ball rolling. Commissioner Lodge here interrupted to say that the message should be sent to Halifax and Nova Scotia, urging prompt and energetic action upon their part to carry out the ideas of Sir Henry.



of the problems of the Maritime Provinces and offered to co-operate in this matter.

Matthew Lodge of Moncton, now a C. N. R. director, spoke strongly for the use of Canadian ports and St. John's position in this regard.

Sir Henry was very frank in his statements and his declaration that the time had arrived when talk should cease and action begin was heartlly applauded by those who heard him.

Detailed plans of the proposed work at the station and in Courtenay Bay will be submitted to the council later by the railway authorities.

He desired to point out three matters to which he believed attention should be drawn. The first was the proposed removal of a ledge of rock before the McLeod wharf in the harbor. This could be taken away, he believed, at a very small expense and would provide room at the dock for an additional vessel to load grain, and would increase the capacity of the port. Sir Henry asked if some one could enlighten him as to whether this work should be done by the railway or whether it was in the province of the Public Works Department. Commissioner Bullock replied that it would be done, he believed, by the Department of Public Works, but the city wished the railway to ask for the work, as it was thought the request would carry more weight coming from the railway.

J. E. Dalrymple, traffic vice-president of the C. N. R., sald that he understoood application had been made previously in regard to this matter, but that the city had then been reluctant to assume the responsibility for damages entailed in the work, contending that the railway should take the burden. 

700 More Ballots Cast in Byelection Than in Plebiscite







Messages of congratulation, flowers, and other presents were sent to her from all parts of the world by men and women famous in art and literature.


Mrs. Perugini still takes a lively interest in current events and, despite her age, enjoys the best of health.







This amount under the order of the board is to be paid to the city in one lump sum or credited on future bills for a period not exceeding two months.
