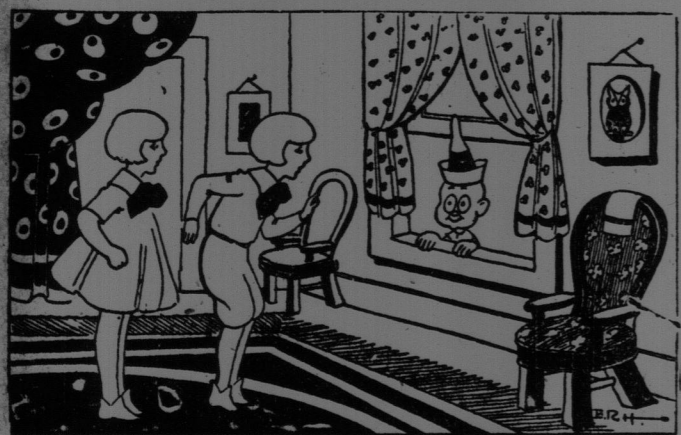

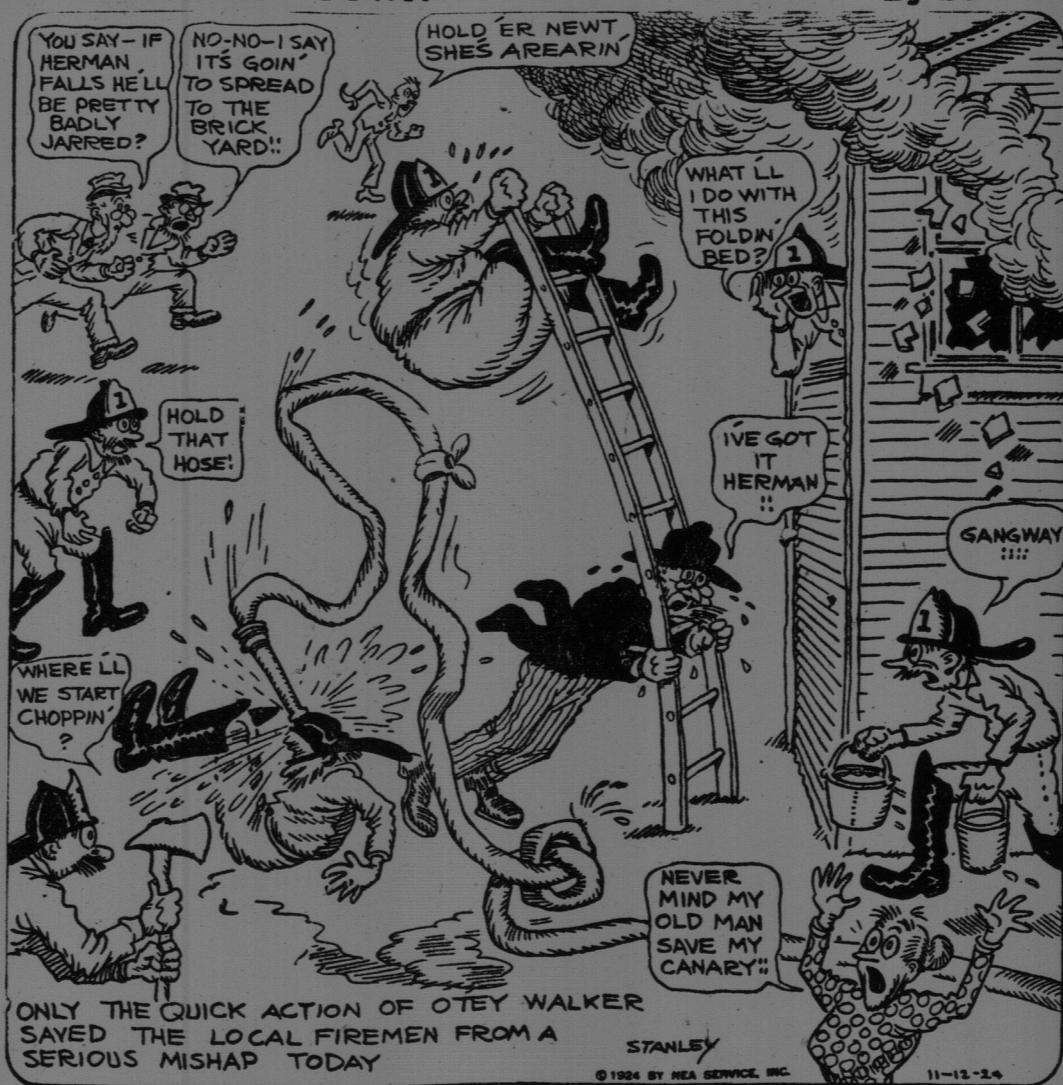

The provincial office of the Red Cross Society has received word that the head office has appointed Miss Sibella Barrington, of Halifax, as organizer of home nursing classes for New Brunswick to carry on the work which Miss R. 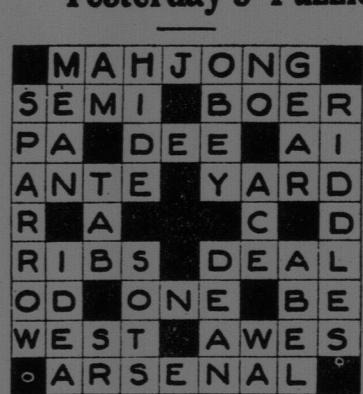

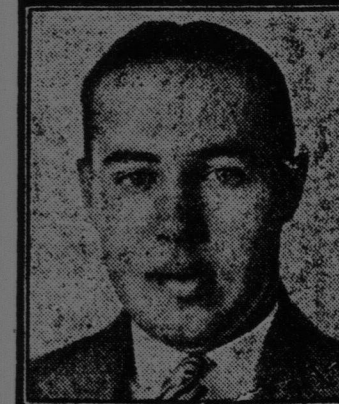
SECOND FATALITY AT SYDNEY MINES

PETITION IS IN VIEW FOR PROBE OF HOME STUDY

Talk of Asking the School Authorities to Examine the Matter.

A few weeks ago a communication appeared in The Times-Star signed by a local mother, complaining of the amount of home study imposed upon public school children, particularly in the intermediate grades. This lady asserted that so oppressive was the burden of home work becoming to some children that school life for these children was resolving itself into self-teaching at home and oral reviews by the teacher in school hours. The writer sharply deprecated this alleged system of teaching and wanted to know if it was authorized or was it a laxity on the part of some teachers.

Yesterday, The Times-Star heard an echo of the complaint raised by this mother when it was said steps were being taken to circulate a petition asking for an investigation of the home work problem by the Board of School Trustees or educational authorities higher up. The agitation seems to have gained considerable headway and numerous instances of excessive home study are being cited in motherly circles which add considerable strength to the protests.

One mother said that her 12-year-old boy was required to draw the map of Europe with its numerous details, to look up and write down a large number of difficult words and their meanings, to prepare a Latin study, a large section of history and some geography all in one evening's session. This she considered a pretty large order for a none too robust boy and one who was made to apply himself seriously to his educational tasks.

Other cases of alleged overloading of pupils with home study were related, but none of the complainants were willing at this stage to give their names for publication. In each case cited the complaining parents said too much homework was making their children nervous, irritable and in other ways affecting their health. They would insist upon their children having a sufficient amount of open air recreation and on the other hand they would be equally insistent upon routine study at proper hours. It was their opinion, however, that too much night study was offsetting the healthful exercises in the open.

One mother wanted it emphatically understood that she was not opposed to the idea of home studies as a method of teaching but only if teachers shifted much of their responsibility upon the shoulders of their scholars. She felt that a reasonable amount of mixed study at home would meet the requirements and would like to see a competent committee of educationists settle upon such a modified plan.

Another parent, agreeing with this idea of curtailment in home study, said she understood that an experiment had been made in Ontario whereby home studies were practically abolished, but were replaced when it was discovered the children practically ran wild in the

evenings when not called upon to apply themselves indoors. This she said proved the double value of home work for public school children but had no bearing whatever in favor of overloading the youngsters.

CROSS WORD PUZZLE MAY BE OLDEST OF BRAIN TEASERS

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 27.—In the Archaeological Museum of Johns Hopkins University is a copy of what looks like the world's oldest cross-word puzzle. For years it has been a puzzle, whether cross-word or other variety, to archaeologists and the solution now is thought to be as remote as ever.

According to many students this ancient brain teaser dates from 2000 B. C. It is called the Phaistos Disk and was found in the Island of Crete. It is made of terra cotta and contains on both sides a continuous spiral line of picture-writing. Since the writing never has been deciphered no one can say whether it begins at the centre and runs outward or follows the reverse course.

The disk seems to have been intended originally as a die, and it is the interpretation which makes the ancient "puzzle" appear comparable to the cross-word matrices.

According to students of Cretan antiquity, the disk contains a religious hymn and was not really a product of the island but was imported from Lycia, in Asia Minor.

In the history of Greece the "cross-word puzzle" disappears after Cretan times. Specimens of ancient Greek poems have survived to the present day which show a knowledge of the acrostic. Euripides has a passage in one of his plays which is construed so as to have the first letters of the lines spell the name "Theusis." In some of the old manuscripts, containing collections

of ancient Greek poems have been found compositions so made as to be in the form of various objects, such as the pipes of pan.

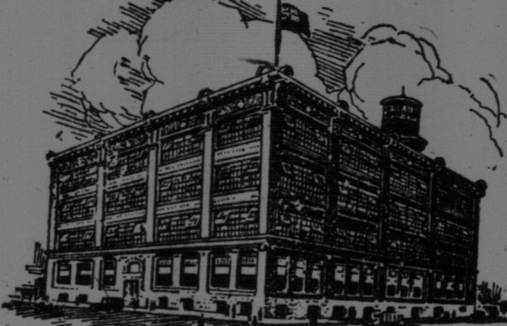

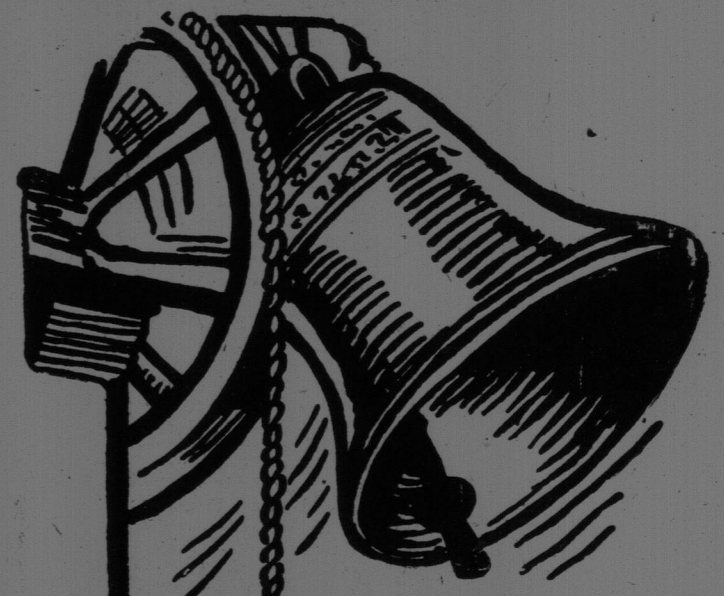

NIGHT TERROR IN IRELAND CAUGHT

Robber Smilingly Acknowledges Many Crimes and Produces Spoils.

Dublin, Nov. 27.—The people of Grigenamagh, County Kilkenny lived in hourly fear of being the next victim of a mysterious robber.

Every night for four weeks a burglary had taken place in the district. Shops, houses, factories, and the local creamery suffered at the hands of the elusive robber.

Two members of the Civic Guard determined to capture the robber or resign from the force. They have fully succeeded, and in this manner— Sergeant Tuohy and Guard Bergin had been making their own inquiries in and around the district. When they compared notes they found that their conclusions pointed in the same direction, and they decided upon strategy to effect their purpose.

In the early hours of the morning they dressed in the garb of shepherds, and climbed the steep side of Brandon Hill.

They wandered about, pretending to count their flocks, and about 8 o'clock saw Patrick Ryan coming from the direction of the numerous robberies, towards the house of his uncle, situated in a remote position on the hill, and almost the last place on earth one would look for the headquarters of a persistent robber.

Entering the house, the officers saw Ryan partaking of a substantial breakfast. They at once placed him under arrest. The culprit admitted that he was the author of all the robberies in the district.

The confessed robber took them to a hay-shed, and there pointed out an excellent dug-out, in which he lived and stored his hauls. There, well wrapped up to prevent the effects of damp, was the greater part of the proceeds of the robberies.

Ryan took the situation well. His face showed an amused grin, and in fulfillment of his promise he took the officers to his uncle's house, and at a short distance therefrom, produced all the remaining stolen property.

The result of this last admission was the arrest of the uncle, named Patrick Maloy. He was charged with receiving certain stolen property, knowing it to have been stolen, and with having it in his possession. Then the Guards read out the list of the various robberies, and with an amused grin Ryan replied: "Yes, I was there. I did it."

The story was told at a special court held at Grigenamagh. Men came for miles to look upon the face of the "Night Terror" as he had been called. He stood unconcerned as the story of his dark deeds was unfolded.

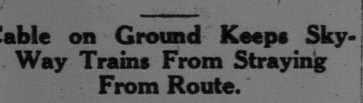

USE ELECTRICITY AS GUIDE TO AIRPLANES

Cable on Ground Keeps Sky-Way Trains From Straying From Route.

London, Nov. 27.—Experiments towards the electrification of Great Britain's airways, with a view to the elimination of all possible chance of collision, are being carried out by the Royal Air Force at South Farnborough.

It is believed that the time is bound to come when so many machines will be winging their way along recognized routes between the inland centres of population, and between British aerodromes and the Continent, that means should be devised to regulate sky-way "trains."

The method that has been found most efficient involves the laying of electric cables on the ground beneath the route taken by the sky liners. An indicator in front of the pilot responds to this and warns the airman when he is straying from the recognized route.

Moreover, by means of an ingenious piece of mechanism, any tendency to diversion from the straight path is automatically rectified. The air express, in fact, kept as closely to the airway as if it were an electric train running on rails.

The pilot has only to maintain altitude and ensure that his motors are running well. The electrical "brain" does the rest.
