Crush in New York on Last

Day for Making Returns.

New York, March 16—All day yesterday great lines of men and women, from millionaires to day laborers, fought for a chance to pay their income and excess profits taxes at the customs house, this being the last day for making returns. At midnight it was estimated that 400,000 returns had been made the final day.

Unconditional resignation of the leaders of the new government was demanded by the Ebert cabinet, which arrived here yesterday afternoon by a special train from Dresden. The national assembly will meet here on Wednesday stanoon at four o'clock.

Announcement was made that the Ebert government is in contact with almost all points in Germany.

"The constitutional government," reads an official announcement, "refuses to negotiate, being responsible to the people for the maintenance of the constitution and negotiations would only occasion distrust and confusion and would prolong disorders."

CANADA'S FIRE LOSS IS NOT DIMINISHING

Main Portion of Total is in Larger Losses of \$10,000 or Over—Carelessness and Ne-

Fire losses in 1919—\$23,500,000. With the war over, with no munition plant fires, with industry under normal conditions, and with many interests advocating fire prevention, Canada, in 1919, reached the above enormous total of Are waste—a waste equal to \$2.90 per capita of her population. Of the larger losses, there were 288 of \$10,000 and over. These larger losses are mostly of business properties or manufacturing plants. They make up the greater portion of the total loss, and the effect of this loss is widespread. With the destruction of the factory, employment is discontinued and the workman suffers; business is interfered with and the employer suffers. The keep and the employer suffers. The keen competition of today very often absorbs the market for a product before a business can be re-established, and the own-

ers, realizing this condition, decide not to rebuild. Many of the smaller municipalities have, as their chief support, one large industry. If fire should destroy this industry the community must almost cease to exist, or, alternatively, secure another, often by burdening itself to pay

Employers and workmen are almost universally responsible for fires in factories. Through carelesness or neglitories. Through carelesness or negligence they allow conditions to exist which sooner or later create fire dangers. This carelessness is the result, largely, of home training. The greater number of our fires are in the homes, where little care is taken with matches, ashes, lighted cigarettes and cigars, etc. The carelessness is the root of our fire loss problem.

Fuel Saving and Increased Track Capacity Two of the Results.

Fuel saving and increased track capacity would be two of the important results from the electrification of the railroads of the country, it is stated by the National Bank of Commerce in New York in the March issue of its magazine, Commerce Monthly. However, chiefly because of the great expense involved in the transition from steam to electrically operated railroads, it is unlikely that any general move toward electrification will be made in the near future, the bank says.

bank says.

"It would not be without precedent," the magazine declares, "if the next decade witnessed England and the continent outstripping this country in the exploitation of another industry which, while possibly not conceived here, has certainly been more fully developed in America than elsewhere.

"It is plain that we must take a long-sighted view of the future of our railroads," Commerce Monthly continues.

"It is plain that we must take a long-sighted view of the future of our rail-roads," Commerce Monthly continues. "They must be given such freedom to develop and to improve their facilities that they will not be required to enlarge their facilities merely on the basis of the immediate pinch, but will be able to introduce improvements from the standpoint of return a decade or two decades hence. Electrification thus has its greatest argument in the future, for with the rapidly increasing cost of fuel and rate of traffic, the ultimate return on any amount now invested in electrification will be more than generous compared with the return on the accumulated amount which might be spent year by year over a long period in patching up our steam rail-way system.

Also, the fuel situation in the United States is so much more favorable than is that of most other nations that the problem of conservation and efficient utilization of our coal supply has not become so acute as in Europe."
