ARE PLEDGED TO SET ONE FIRE EVERY WEEK; IS MURDER TO ENTER SUFFRAGETTES' PLANS?



Lillian Lenton Photographed in Bed While Correspondent Shepherd Was Interviewing Her

London, March 31.—"Are the English suffragettes preparing to commit murder in order to win the vote?" I have just returned from the bedside of Lillian Lenton, London's newest, prettiest, and most popular suffragette—the girl who was released the other day from Holloway prison because she contracted pleurisy. I asked Miss Lenton this question—whether she expected assassinations at the hands of women—and here is what she said to me: "We women are showing very desperate here in England. The rest of the world does not even guess the problems we are facing. We must have the vote if we are to preserve the decency and morality of the English race. We must have it at any cost—even at the cost of human life. "I have entered into a pledge to help to set fire to one building every week in England. "We broke windows—that did not help at all. We have dynamited Lloyd George's home—that has not helped much. I and Olive Wharry burned up the \$10,000 tea pavilion in Kew gardens—that has not helped a great deal. And now— "Well, Mrs. Pankhurst has told us not to take human life—yet, at any rate. All the inner circle of militant underground that she does not want us actually to kill anybody, but— "But what? I persisted. "Sometimes it looks to me as if she couldn't always hold some of the women in check. They lose their patience when they see things going so terribly slowly. "But are there really women who would commit murder? Do you, yourself, know any suffragettes in London who would actually kill? "I know more than a dozen girls who are so zealous that they would be willing to take human life and to die on the gallows if they saw that, by so doing, they could gain the vote for women in England! "I remember I am not so sure myself that killing wouldn't help matters! But still we must be loyal to Mrs. Pankhurst while she is our leader! "I am sure you will not print it in England, but I have entered into a pledge with a few young women to set one building alight every week in England. You count upon the fire of the hat few weeks and see how regularly they have been happening—and you watch in the future. Olive Wharry and myself, who were caught when we were burning down the pavilion in Kew gardens, were too confident, for we said we had set up to that time, and we grew careless. But the fire will go on, even though they sent Olive to the penitentiary for a month and I expect to go to jail for the same length of time, just as soon as I'm well enough to be arrested again. A Kitchen Beauty Shelf

DO NOT give up trying to be pretty just because you have to do your own housework, as you can keep hands and face in very good condition indeed if you will but yield to my persuasion and put up a beauty shelf in your kitchen. The best place for this shelf is over the kitchen sink, but if this is impossible, put the shelf anywhere, so long as it is within easy reaching distance. Once the shelf is nailed securely to the wall, cover it with a plain piece of heavy white paper, and then, to make the tout ensemble everything it should be, tack on a paper fringe. Now what shall we put on this shelf? Not knowing what your needs are, I will have to rest content with telling you what I would put on this shelf, were I in my kitchen. To begin, I would certainly feel it necessary to keep the half of a freshly cut lemon among my beauty supplies, and vegetables and fruits do stain one's hands, and lemon juice is most effective in removing disgusting marks if applied to the stained fingers immediately after one's task of paring and cutting is finished. A tin box of Beauty Food would come next on my list, as, after the dishes are washed, it is a wise idea to rub a tiny bit of cream into the hands, thus preventing chaps. What next? Why, a manicure file, an orange-wood stick for cleaning the nails and a pair of miniature scissors to use when they become roughed or torn. Frequently the housewife washes her hands hastily under the opened kitchen faucet and carelessly uses kitchen soap, consequently falling heir to red, rough hands. Arguments For the Education of the Feeble Minded Children In view of the growing feeling in this country that something "should be done for the benefit of the feeble-minded child that which has been done by the London county council is of interest. In the extensive report published in 1911 it is stated that the council has eighty-nine schools for the mentally defective. "The six years which have elapsed since the appointment of the Royal Commission have afforded ample proof of the desirability of providing further care and control for many of the mentally defective persons in this country. It is therefore to be regretted that some means of dealing comprehensively with it, have not yet been found. The absence of control in the case of a large number of feeble-minded persons is a social danger, and, as some assert, this number is increasing in an undue proportion, the matter being made more serious. There appears to be evidence that many mentally defective persons are to be found in prisons and other public institutions and that the ranks of the unemployed are largely swollen by these unemployables. If, therefore, some means are taken, it can be proved that there is a further national loss, in the shape of racial deterioration through the feeble-minded not being subjected to proper restraint, a case is certainly made out for immediate action to be taken. "Many local education authorities are fully alive to the necessity for action, and in some cases steps are being taken with a view to giving effect so far as the existing powers permit, to some of the Royal Commission's recommendations. In one city a colony has been provided for certain classes of epileptics and feeble-minded persons, where proper and adequate classification can be secured, and where the cases can receive special treatment suited to their condition. Each colony is instructed as far as possible to use the best permissible powers which the local education authorities at present have for dealing with the defective and epileptic end of the age of sixteen. This constitutes a grave social danger—while it cannot be supposed that special supervision up to sixteen is a mistake policy, since the restraint which is imposed on mentally defective children in the special schools is all to the good as far as it goes, it is clear that the mistake is not continuing the restraint longer. "As matters stand, the removal of supervision and the difficulties arising during the period of adolescence often cause the mentally defective children to become entirely unmanageable because there is no authority to overlook and control them until they have settled down to some useful occupation. A large number of defective persons might with advantage be placed under control during their whole lives, but setting this question aside for the moment, it is clear that in the case of the majority of defective persons care and control between the ages of sixteen and twenty-one is an urgent necessity. Until parliament provides for that control no permanent amelioration can be looked for in the lot of this unfortunate class. "The aim of the eighty-nine special schools of the London county council is to give the children such training as will enable them to be self-supporting in later life. In the great majority of cases though the mental capacity of the children is small yet they show considerable aptitude for manual work, when properly trained under control, when properly

SCHOOL PLAYARDS TO BE MADE PUBLIC

Up-to-Date Methods Being Promoted in Detroit (Detroit Journal).

Superintendent of schools Charles E. Chaskey and School Inspectors Goldberg, Mumford, Kennedy and Lowrie, appeared at Mayor Max's weekly cabinet meeting Monday afternoon and warmly endorsed A. D. Edward Barnett's suggestion that all school yards be thrown open as public playgrounds.

Superintendent Chaskey said it would cost \$77,500 for salaries of competent teachers to act as supervisors. "The worst boy in town is not a moral menace to other boys when he is playing; let our boys and girls play under careful supervision and you will reduce juvenile delinquency," said Superintendent Chaskey.

Mayor Max wanted to know whether it would not be possible to eliminate a few of the yards because many schools are close together. Superintendent Chaskey said it would be easier to get a boy or girl to play in the yard of the school they were accustomed to attend. Inspector Mumford argued that every one of the school yards should be used for playgrounds. Ira W. Jarose, agent of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children, also favored the plan and told of a little four-year-old boy who was crushed to death under a wagon while playing in the streets.

Ald. Barrett will introduce a resolution in the council Tuesday night asking the school board to put \$77,000 in its budget to carry out the plan.

Police Commissioner Croul called attention to the appropriation in the board of education budget for ten trust officers. He declared that trusty work rightfully belongs to the board of education and that the money should be allowed for the purpose. Superintendent Chaskey said the law contemplates that the superintendent of schools shall enforce the attendance of pupils and for that reason the trusty squad should be connected with the school department.







Clerk of the Juvenile Court is Calling For Volunteers  
(Montreal Star).  
O. C. Dawson, clerk of the Juvenile Court, is calling for volunteers to form a "big brother" movement in this city. Anybody is eligible to join from the collar student to the millionaire.  
Already "big brother" organizations have been formed in Toronto, and in all the big cities of the United States. The purpose of the movement is to give the youngster who might otherwise go wrong, a friend who will look after him, and if so inclined provide the boy with some of the pleasures of life and some of the benefits of education and associations in more refined surroundings.  
The volunteer big brother is allowed to choose any younger boy like from the juvenile in parole. He may lend the boy books, take him to the theatre, to baseball matches and other sporting events, and generally see the part of a good friend to the boy who would naturally lack this companionship.  
In other cities a banquet for the boys and their "big brothers" is held once a year. At these events the banker sits beside the juvenile he is befriending, and the stock broker sits beside the boy who has the habit of running away from home. His estimable good has been accomplished by this treatment.  
In Toronto recently a movement of this kind was started and there were 5000 volunteers among the students across the city.  
"An organization of this kind is badly needed in Montreal," declared Mr. Dawson to the Star representative today. "Of course the three parole officers backed by their various committees are doing splendid work, but, as we have over 2,000 youngsters in parole, it is difficult to look after them all.  
Mr. Dawson remarked that numerous drivers took boys with them on their rounds to hold the boys and look after parolees, and suggested that it would be a good idea for those to join the big brother movement instead of leaving the youngsters to drink and smoke cigarettes."







A committee of the St. John Presbytery, of which Rev. J. A. MacKeigan is convener, which was appointed to confer with Calvin and St. John churches regarding a proposed amalgamation, met with the session of Calvin church for an informal conference last evening. The matter was discussed, but no action could be taken at this stage of the proceedings. The committee will meet the session of St. John church later for a similar conference. TUNISIAN AT SAND POINT

She has on board 250 cabin and 711 third-class passengers, who will be landed tomorrow morning.

KENNEDY JONES AND HOME SAFE

More Good St. John News Comes Out of the Ohio Flood District

Word was received yesterday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Jones in Indiantown that their son, Kennedy was safe in Dayton, Ohio, and that there was no cause for fear on his account. When the newspapers bore the tidings that the floods had devastated the city, anxiety was expressed concerning the welfare of the young man, and his father telegraphed to learn as to his safety. Owing probably to the troubled times, and the conditions of service in the flooded district, no message was forthcoming from their boy until yesterday, when a letter and telegram arrived within a few moments of each other. Young Mr. Jones said that the home which he had purchased a short time previous to his marriage was quite a distance from the floods, and all in his neighborhood had escaped without mishap or loss. The scene in many sections of the devastated country came fully up to descriptions as given in the press despatches, he said, but there were some districts in the flooded region in which, although much damage had been sustained, the loss suffered had not been so great as at first supposed. Mr. Jones' many friends here will be very pleased to learn that he escaped without injury and lost nothing in the disaster.

THESE ACTS BY BOYS ARE SERIOUS

Much Damage to Property on Sandy Point Road is Reported

If some of the residents along Sandy Point Road could have laid hands on a band of youthful marauders who were doing damage in that neighborhood, it would not have gone well with them on last Sunday afternoon.
