The general public and a great many physicians scarcely seem to realize that he prevention of typhoid fever by vaccination has been absolutely proved. According to the highest medical authorities in America and Europe there is already overwhelming testimony in favor of the protective value of anti-typhoid vaccination.

The latest indorsement of this procedure is made by The Journal of the American Medical Association in an editorial, based partly on the last report of the Surgeon General of the U.S. Army and partly on conditions among the troops stationed along the Mexican border. Here are some contrasts presented by the writer:

writer:

"The figures given for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1909, showed an incidence of typhoid fever sixteen times greater among the unvaccinated than among vaccinated troops. Up to October 1, 1910, only five cases had developed among the immunized as against 418 among the non-immunized. Moreover, of these five cases four were so mild as to leave doubt as to the diagnosis, and there were no bad effects of any kind as a result of the vaccination.

Like most medical discoveries, the final perfection of the practice of anti-typhoid vaccination has resulted only after years of experimentation and apparent failures. To Prof. A. E. Wright, of the British Army Medical School at Netley is due the honor of having first conceived and put in practice the idea of anti-typhoid vaccination. This was before the Boer war. ation. "The results, were rather unsatisfactory in South Africa during the campaign, and it was only after further experimentation that the technic was perfected. One of the chief troubles had been in the fact that it had not yet been fully demonstrated that the best results were to be obtained only after the repetition of the process three times at intervals of ten days.

"The German army next took up the investigation, and as a result the medical officials succeeded in cutting the typhoid fever rate in half by vaccination of a portion of the troops in Southwestern Africa in the campaign against the Hereros in 1904 and 1907.


