FORMER N. B. MAN ARRIVES HERE ON YACHT

Lady Beaverbrook Due Here Tomorrow From Quebec

SURPRISE VISIT

Famed British Capitalist Greatly Pleased to See Old Faces Again

LORD BEAVERBROOK of England, formerly Max Aitken of New Brunswick, at one time law student in Saint John, thereafter engaged in Montreal stock selling circles, and latterly in the financial world of London, arrived in port aboard the ocean-going power yacht "Miramichi" Captain O. J. Hauraken, a little after midnight, accompanied by his two sons, a secretary, S. W. Alexander, and a few personal friends. The sons are Masters Max and Peter Aitken, aged 14 and 16 respectively, students in the Westminster school, London. Father and sons will greet Lady Beaverbrook upon her arrival in this city tomorrow, via Quebec. Her Ladyship will be accompanied by the eldest of the children, Janet. Together the family will make a brief tour of places in the Maritime Provinces.

Huge Railway Bridge Planned By Denmark

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 16.—Bids for the steel work of one of the greatest over-water railway spans of Europe have been asked by the Danish railway authorities, with the approval of the government. The steel work will cost more than \$5,000,000 and the completed bridge will cost at least \$8,750,000, according to estimates of the engineers.

Britain Developing Aerial Dreadnaught

FELIXSTOWE, Eng., Aug. 16.—The British navy is developing an "aerial dreadnaught" which will be used in manoeuvres with the fleet. Work on the new machine is being conducted secretly. It is said to be one of the largest airplanes not needing a mother ship to carry it which has yet been constructed.

Earth Tremors In England Cause Alarm Among People

LONDON, Aug. 16.—England, which once or twice recently has experienced earth tremors, so slight as to raise doubts as to whether they were really of seismic origin, yesterday had the extraordinary experience of earth shocks covering an extremely wide area extending almost through the whole of the island, as far south as Bournemouth, within 10 miles of London. A part of Wales also felt the shocks.

"An Honest Attempt to Reveal Lists," is Answer at Liberal Headquarters

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 16.—An information charging perjury has been laid before Eric Robinson, justice of the peace, against Amos C. Ferguson, said to be a worker in the Liberal ranks, in connection with the filing before Chief Registrar W. E. Haskins, of affidavits demanding that upwards of 3,000 names be removed from the voters' list of Vancouver Centre riding, on the ground that they no longer resided in that constituency.

JEALOUSY SAID CAUSE OF DEATH

WHITSTABLE, Kent, Eng., Aug. 16.—Extraordinary precautions were taken today to prevent crowds of curious people gathering at the inquest to be held this afternoon in connection with the death of John Thomas Derham, who died from the effects of a railway accident on Friday in a fight with Alphonse Francis Austin Smith, grandson of the late C. P. R. pioneer, the late Hugh Ryan, one of the founders of the Canadian Pacific railway.

N. S. Yacht Acadia Wins Two Trophies

HALIFAX, Aug. 16.—A special despatch from Toronto to the Morning Chronicle, states that the Nova Scotia built yacht Acadia, designed by W. J. Rouse, of Halifax, and built by F. W. Baldwin at Baddeck, had been awarded the George's Cup and Lipton Cup, blue ribbon trophies for international lake racing. The Acadia is owned and sailed by Commodore Gooderham of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club of Toronto.

COBHAM RETURNING

MELBOURNE, Aug. 16.—Alan Cobham arrived here late yesterday after a four and half hours flight from Sydney completing his outward journey. After overhauling his plane he began the return journey on which he hopes to break all records. Cobham was much chaffed here by his statement, published in some responsible newspapers—that he encountered two dragons in captivity in the Dutch East Indies, and he retorts by saying that on the return trip he will photograph these dragons and show the negative on his return for positive proof.

TEN HOUSES DESTROYED

YAMASKA, Que., Aug. 16.—Ten houses and two stores were destroyed by fire here Sunday. The damage is estimated at \$50,000, partly covered by insurance. There was no casualty.

The Lady Laurier sailed for the island yesterday on a regular trip with supplies and reached her destination at daybreak this morning.

JOURNALISTS' STORY PROVES AMUSING HOAX

Officials Solemnly Open Packing Case at Morgue

FAIL TO FIND BODY

Scotland Yard Seeks Frank Power, Originator of the Mystery

LONDON, Aug. 16.—The British Home Office today announced officially that a packing case, recently delivered at Waterloo station, and alleged to contain the body of the late Lord Kitchener, "was found to contain an empty coffin."

After the investigation of the packing case, Chief Constable Wensley and Detective Superintendent Brow, went to the Home Office, where they held a lengthy conference with officials and legal advisers.

Scotland Yard officials today sought to get in touch with Frank Power, British newspaperman, who brought the packing case from Norway, when he said the body of Lord Kitchener had been picked up after the sinking of H. M. S. Hampshire.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT

The statement issued by the Home Office this morning said: "The packing case, alleged to contain a coffin and human remains, which on Saturday night was removed by the police from an undertaker's on Waterloo road, to Lambeth, Coroner's court was this morning opened in the presence of Coroner Ingleby Odde and Sir Bernard Spilsbury. The packing case was found to contain an empty coffin. The coffin was new and obviously had not contained human remains."

PHOTOGRAPHERS ON JOB

LONDON, Aug. 16.—The Evening News says today that it understands that when the coffin at a Waterloo Road mortuary, alleged to contain the body of the late Lord Kitchener, was opened, a large crowd of photographers was present.

CATHOLICS AND POLICE BATTLE IN THE STREET

Was Due to Misunderstanding and No One was Killed

COUNTRY ENTERS ON 3RD WEEK OF STRIFE

Churches Comfortably Filled Yesterday for Services—Priests Arrested

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 16.—The Republic of Mexico has entered upon its third week with the controversy which has arisen out of the enforcement of the Government's new religious regulations still at a deadlock. Except for a disturbance at the Church of San Jacinto in the suburbs of San Angel, during which the heads of a group of policemen and Roman Catholics were bruised, the third priestless Sunday passed quietly. No trouble has been reported from any other part of the country.

SEARCH FOR ARMS

When the police went to the church to search for arms, the Roman Catholics assembled for the defense of the building. The police endeavored to suppress the crowd and to take possession of the arms, but were repulsed. After the fray the police found the Catholics were not preparing for an uprising, and Catholics discovered nobody was endeavoring to seize their church. Then the casualties were their property. The police arrested a half dozen Catholic leaders and charged them with inciting the people to riot.

Spoke of Grand Falls

The former New Brunswick seceder eager for home gossip. His many-sided interests as a newspaper proprietor in England, in the world of finance generally, politically, and his association with the industrial developments on both sides of the water, prompted him to ply the reporter with many questions. It pleased him greatly, he said, to learn New Brunswick had taken such a long step forward in the proposed development of Grand Falls for industrial purposes. He asked questions as to the availability of the power once it was generated and seemed anxious to be assured that it would be purchasable by the industries in general. His inquiries remained surely the harnessing of Grand Falls would be a tremendous uplift to the province of New Brunswick, and the North Shore section and upper parts of the province should feel the stimulus most markedly.

HEARTENING PROSPECT

New Brunswick was undoubtedly rich in forest products, the chief of them being forest land products for the manufacture of pulp and paper. The enormous demand for paper was growing in size but magazine publications in all its branches was forging ahead by leaps and bounds, and new uses for all qualities of paper demanded the utilization of the forest in ever increasing quantities year by year. The map of New Brunswick is almost three-quarters crown land, a heartening prospect in view of the vast initial step taken recently to employ natural waterpowers with which to generate paper mills and kindred manufactures.

EVASUED POLITICS

Lord Beaverbrook evaded discussion of politics, either British, Canadian or Dominion. He was interested to know whether Premier Meighan had spoken recently in Saint John and that the former Premier W. W. Mackenzie King had due to speak here shortly. He wondered if the Hon. Mr. Dunning was to talk to New Brunswick and whether his Lordship was well informed in the details of the present federal campaign and whether he would see any of the meetings during his tour.

He bought her because of her Diesel engine equipment, the absence of coal bunkers, funnels and boilers permitting more room, lessening danger and keeping the craft immaculately clean. His previous yacht was British built but was coal-fueled.

Invention Will Solve England's Mining Labor Surplus, is Prediction

NEW YORK, Aug. 16.—Development of two new processes for the distillation of coal at low temperatures, which, it is predicted, will solve England's coal mining labor surplus, is announced by the International Combustion Engineering Corporation.

At the same time, it was said these new processes will permit England to produce domestically, as a by-product, more than \$5,000,000 worth of automobile fuel and oil at present imported. Arrangements are being made to install the first equipment in England.

### HON. DR. MANION SPEAKER AT CAMPBELLTON

Speaks of Conservative Policy in Interests of the Maritimes

CAMPBELLTON, Aug. 15.—In an address of nearly an hour in length, Hon. R. J. Manion, Postmaster-General of Canada, gave a clear exposition of the policies of the Conservative party before a record audience in the Opera House here last night. Mr. Manion dealt at some length with all the outstanding issues of the present election campaign and used caustic words on criticizing the administration of the King government.

#### MEIGHEN'S POLICY

In dealing with Premier Meighen's Maritime policy the speaker quoted from Hansard a portion of a resolution brought before the House by Mr. Meighen which contained the Conservative platform as far as the Maritimes are concerned. This provided for a tariff to protect the farmers and manufacturers of the east, called for the use of Maritime ports and provided for an effective and satisfactory revision of freight rates. The adjustment of the freight rates problem, Mr. Manion declared, would be one of the first tasks Mr. Meighen would tackle if placed at the head of Canada's affairs. As a first step toward the achievement of something worth while in this connection the Premier had selected a Maritime man as minister of railways.

### PRESS GATHERING SET FOR GENEVA

Representatives of New Agencies of the World to Meet Shortly

GENEVA, Aug. 16.—Representatives of the great press associations and news agencies of the world are assembling here for the conference called to meet under the auspices of the League of Nations to discuss the improvement of facilities for the international collection and distribution of news. This conference, the most widely representative international press association conference ever held and attended by delegates from the 17 leading press services of 11 different countries, will decide upon the agenda to be considered by a general committee of press experts at a later date. The proposal to call such a committee made originally before the League Assembly by M. Yanes, delegate of Chile, was approved by the Assembly and the Council in the hope that the cause of international good-will could be advanced by greater facility and freedom in the international interchange of news.

ment of all press associations in matters of censorship; elimination of any discrimination among press associations in transmission of news dispatches, and elimination of discrimination between the so-called official agencies and the non-subsidized independent associations in the promulgation of official or government news.

The United States will be represented at the preliminary conference by the United Press and the Associated Press. Other press agencies attending are the Reuters, Ltd., of Great Britain; the Havas Agency and the Radio Agency of France; the Nippon Dempo Tan-shinsha and the Nippon Shinbun Bunko-sha of Japan; the Stefan Agency of Italy; the Suisse Agency of Switzerland; the Tass of Russia; the Telegraphen Union and the Wolff Bureau of Germany; and the Tidningarnas Telegramby of Sweden.







MOVE FOR FILIPINO AUTONOMY BECOMES PERSONAL STRUGGLE

GENERAL WOOD'S OPPOSED BY MANUEL QUEZON

MANILLA, Aug. 15.—Leonard Wood vs. Manuel Quezon. That is what the problem of the movement for immediate independence for the Philippine Islands bids fair to become during the next few months when the two Filipino leaders meet in America to start what he declares will be his greatest fight for separation of the islands from American rule.

Both sides have drawn their battle lines carefully. Quezon is the leader of the new Supreme National Council, which Filipinos will tell you is destined to become a sort of super-government, and Wood by the President of the United States and the vast majority of the American population of the islands as well as hundreds of Americans at home. The fight has been an open battle ever since Major General Wood came to the islands as Governor General five years ago.

Wood is known to many thousands of Americans as a great army officer, an able administrator in Cuba, candidate for the Republican presidential nomination and a man of undoubted achievement in organization and politics. The two able men opposed to each other are physically and mentally as far apart as the poles.

General Wood is in his 66th year, grey, solid, dignified, simple and direct in manner, enormously determined to see a hard task through to a successful conclusion. In Manila he is referred to as the "Old Man" or the "Rock of Malacanang."

Quezon is in his 46th year, but gives the impression of being 10 years younger, slender, with a mane of well-cared-for black hair, radiating mercurial energy, quick of speech, and also enormously determined to see his job through.

The Governor-General works quietly, dominating Malacanang, the palace of the executive head of the Philippine congress, confident, untroubled by political tempests.

These are the two men who have faced each other in Manila week after week—General Wood, rugged, confident, deliberate, a faithful public servant for what he thinks is right.

The Filipino leader works feverishly, traveling through the islands, haranguing the people, a vivid figure of action, driving the Filipino congressmen, confident, quick to see and seize an opportunity, exhibiting a well learned lesson in American pep.

He says that the beauties waste too much time in flirting with young men who hang around their boxes and obstruct trade, and that they are more interested in their looks than they are in making the right change, whereas the girl who isn't sufficiently pulchritudinous to attract attention, and who doesn't expect her face to make her fortune, gets right down to business and is worth half a dozen good lookers.

THAT is good news, for, heretofore a peach and cream complexion, combined with a willow figure and a boyish bob, has been more potent in getting a girl a good situation than a knowledge of how to spell or add up a column of figures correctly, or an ability to sell goods.

However, the best is still to come. The editor of a matrimonial paper, in which men advertise for wives says that his patrons seldom mention beauty among the qualities they demand in a wife and frequently state that they prefer homely girls to pretty ones.

WHAT do you think of that? Isn't that the rainbow of hope, and the Balm of Gilead, and all the other consoling things you can think of? NO WOMAN of 30 is physically beautiful. If at that age she is good-looking, it is not a matter of skin and hair and figure. She is lovely because she has a lovely soul.

Yet, in spite of knowing this, the first question a man asks about a woman is never, “Is she good?” or “Is she intelligent?” or “Is she sympathetic and understanding?” But his invariable query is “Is she pretty?”

OF COURSE, men are not really such beauty worshippers as they think they are, or else there wouldn't be so many married women who would not take a blue ribbon in a good-looks' contest, but that is the result of men's guardian angels working overtime. Every man thinks he marries a beauty, but when he is able to see charms that no one else discovers in a plain-faced, sensible, affectionate girl it is a miraculous intervention of Providence in his behalf.

No one will contend that there are not beautiful women who have minds and souls as perfect as their bodies, but they are as rare as hen's teeth.

Nature is a stingy old dame, and when she gives anybody an over-supply of one good quality, she is mighty apt to skim them in something else. Therefore, as a general thing, you will find that the woman who is extraordinarily good-looking is about as thrilling a companion as a clam, and with about the same amount of feeling for anybody else except herself.

ALL the circumstances of the beauty's life also contribute to make her vain and selfish. From her cradle up she has been flattered and worshipped, and given the best of everything, and the man who marries her may rest assured that he will have to spend the balance of his days in burning incense before her, and hustling to get the money to buy the clothes that make the proper frame for the living picture.

OFFICIALS THINK CONGESTION OVER

1926 crop has been brought down and that the remaining stocks on hand in elevators at the head of the Great Lakes were comparatively small. It is thought that the balance of last year's Canadian crop will have been all taken care of before the movement of this year's American crop begins. The United States grain will begin running within a week or so, and the new Canadian crop which is already being harvested in some parts of the Canadian West will be ready for shipment in about a month's time.

Bulk of Canada's 1925 Crop Has Been Handled

MONTREAL, Aug. 14.—Deliveries of grain amounting to over 872,000 bushels were put through the Montreal Harbor Commission's grain elevators on Thursday, and six lake boats with 464,463 bushels of grain unloaded. The number of lake boats waiting to unload was reduced from 88 to 46. This is the most active movement of grain through the local elevators in some days.

Harbor officials when questioned this morning were of the opinion that the congestion of lake boats in this port would rapidly disappear, and that all grain offering would be handled more expeditiously from now on. The reason being that the greater bulk of the



**TUESDAY IS SET FOR CONFERENCE OVER TRAIN SHED**

W. U. Appleton of C. N. R. Coming Here to Meet Council

**COMMISSIONERS' VIEWS EXPRESSED**

**Application for Right to Cut Lumber at Spruce Lake**

The attitude the City Council would take on the matter of the C. N. R. encroaching on Lombard street and laying an extra track in Mill street for the cutting of lumber on city land near Spruce Lake was discussed this morning by the committee of the whole.

Commissioner Wigmore took the stand that the railway should bear the cost of any moving of the water mains and sewers made necessary by the changes in the track layout and Commissioner Prink said he hoped this time the negotiations would get past the preliminary stage and that something would be done. The members of the council will meet the representatives of the C. N. R. tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock to discuss the matter.

Commissioner Harding asked permission to pool the balances of the safety department. He said that the bell tower on the Carleton City Hall had cost \$800 and he had made an appropriation of only \$500 for it and to provide for this over-expenditure of \$300 it was necessary to pool his accounts. The request was granted.

**SPRUCE LAKE LUMBER**

Commissioner Wigmore reported that he had received from Alexander McLeod an offer for the privilege of cutting lumber on the Abert farms, Spruce Lake, owned by the city. The lumber had been damaged by the spruce and worm, and the offer submitted was a good one. The area sought was not on the watershed of Spruce Lake, the commissioner said, but drained toward Musquash. He was not prepared to make a recommendation on the matter as he desired to secure further information.

The Mayor suggested that if the area was not on the water it might be well to sell it outright and get rid of paying taxes on it.

**C. N. R. TRAIN SHED**

Mayor White said he had made an appointment with W. U. Appleton, general manager of the C. N. R., to meet him tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock and discuss the proposed change in the grade made necessary by the building of the proposed train shed. The letter of Mr. Appleton said that the work of construction of the train shed would begin soon and he would like to know what the city would be prepared to do to allow the encroachment on Lombard street and the laying of an additional track in Mill street made necessary by the building of the shed.

**COMMISSIONERS' VIEWS**

His Worship said the members of the council would be more familiar with the matter than himself and would like to get the views on the matter before the conference and an idea as to what terms they were prepared to agree to.

Commissioner Bullock said it seemed as though this matter always came up at election time but nothing had yet been done.

Commissioner Wigmore said if the proposition of the railway was agreed to there would have to be some changes made in the water mains and sewer in Lombard street and he would insist that the cost of this change be borne by the railway. He would submit to the Mayor a plan showing the location of the sewer and water main and an estimate of the cost of changing them to another location. It seemed strange to him that when the government was selling land to the city they wanted the highest price but when it was the other way round were not willing to pay and expected the city to bear the cost.

Commissioner Prink said he would submit a plan of the street and he hoped this time the negotiations would get beyond the preliminary stage and reach a finality. The shed was needed and it would provide employment for some of those out of work.

**MILL STREET TRAFFIC**

In discussing the additional track in Mill street the Mayor said that, so far as he could see, some arrangement would have to be made to keep traffic off that street. The viaduct was not a possibility in the immediate future, owing to the cost and the interference it would be with the C. P. R. freight sheds. The logical way to meet the difficulty, he thought, was to widen Paradise Row and divert traffic that way. If the city said to the railway that they were agreeable to the encroachment in Lombard street and the other track in Mill street it removed any excuse for further postponement of the work on the train shed.

**Saint John Men Prevent Robbery**

The arrival of a Saint John automobile, containing five men, frustrated an attempted hold-up on the trunk highway between Fredericton and Oromocto this week, according to word received in Fredericton.

Charles Harper, who was proceeding alone by automobile to his home at Lavender from Fredericton, was the victim of the attempted hold-up. Between Fredericton and Oromocto he was signalled by two men who demanded a ride to Oromocto. He complied with their demand, but when nearing Oromocto was met with a further demand for money. He refused.

At this juncture the Saint John party made its appearance, and Mr. Harper signalled for assistance. Even with the arrival of the car party in the scene Mr. Harper's two unwelcome guests declined to vacate the automobile until forcibly ejected and left on the highway.

**SEE THE FALLS**

At high tide the water of the Bay of Fundy reaches a higher level than the water of the Saint John River and forces its way through the gorge of the Falls, creating a "fall" running up river.

At low tide the water in the Bay becomes so much lower than that of the river, that the fall of water is reversed and flows down river into the Bay.

At half tide, when the level in the Bay and River are about equal, the Falls disappear entirely, and the surface of the water becomes smooth as the surface of a lake.

To fully appreciate this wonder of the world it should be seen at all seasons.

**Calls Attention to Automobile Law**

Under the new Motor Vehicle Act it is illegal for any person but the owner of a car to drive it unless in possession of a driver's certificate issued on the request of the owner of the car. 
