SAVING ITALIANS IN CANADA TO CATHOLIC FAITH
Hamilton, Ont., Nov. 18.—Vice-Chancellor Mahoney, rector of St. Mary's Cathedral, who recently returned from the plenary council at Quebec, in making an appeal to his congregation to support an aggressive campaign to be launched here to educate and hold Italians in the faith, used strong language and urged the efforts made by other denominations to woo the foreign element away from the Catholic Church.

\$100,000 LOSS BY FIRE
Jamestown, N. Y., Nov. 18.—The most disastrous fire that has ever occurred in the village of Westfield broke out early today and the central part of the village was almost wiped out, including the Memorial house on which the loss was \$20,000. The fire departments were called from Fredonia and Brockton. The flames were under control at 9 o'clock this morning. The total loss will reach \$100,000, insurance about \$80,000.

PERSIA'S PARLIAMENT
Teheran, Nov. 18.—The Persian parliament was opened yesterday with brief but imposing ceremony, in the presence of the Shah, the royal princes and many of the diplomatic representatives.

LABOR LEADERS NOW GET TILL NOV. 29
Washington, Nov. 18.—The court of appeals of the District of Columbia today granted a stay until Nov. 29 of the issuance of the mandate sending President Gompers, Vice-President Mitchell and Secretary Morrison of the Federation of Labor to jail for contempt.

LOWER PRICE OF BREAD
Belleville, Ont. Nov. 18.—Bakers' bread has been reduced in this city to 10 cents for a three-pound loaf. It has been selling for twelve cents.

STORM ON GREAT LAKES CAUSED HALF MILLION LOSS
Cleveland, O., Nov. 18.—The storm on the great lakes completely abated today and traffic was resumed with vigor, which annually characterizes the closing days of the shipping season. It is estimated that the damage to the extent of probably \$500,000 was suffered by the marine interests. During the storm only one life was lost, although five vessels were caught and partly wrecked.

New York, Nov. 18.—Fear that Col. John Jacob Astor's yacht Nourmahal, with the owner and his son Vincent aboard, may have been disabled in the West Indies hurricane of last week was further increased today by the failure of the various vessels known to be seeking the whereabouts of the missing yacht to report her.

San Salvador, Republic of Salvador, Nov. 18.—Advises received here from Managua, state that President Zelaya has practically put an end to the revolution, which is now confined to Bluefields.

SUBWAY SCHEME FOR TORONTO IS PLANNED
Toronto, Nov. 18.—(Special)—Controller Hocken's proposed subway railroad was considered yesterday afternoon by a special city committee and reported to the city council. J. W. Moyes handed in a report dealing with the scheme from the standpoint of a railway expert. It contemplates the construction of 18 miles of surface lines. The total estimated cost is \$4,885,000. The people will vote on the scheme in January.

SEIZE ALL THE BLEACHED FLOUR IN THE STATES
Order of Agricultural Department is Disobeyed and Vigorous Action is Taken—Several Carloads are Confiscated

Washington, Nov. 18.—Open defiance by millers of the United States government's secretary's command. It is supposed here that \$1,000,000 of bleached flour was manufactured during the past year and that most of what remains is in the east, especially in and about New York. About a year ago the department of agriculture following an investigation and experiments decided that bleached flour is injurious to health. Then the secretary issued an order to prevent the manufacture of such flour, but for various reasons the millers were allowed six months to dispose of their stock. Some of them obeyed the order, but others, it is said, continued their operations.





ATHANASIAN CREED

Protest Meeting at Cambridge Against Change of Rubric

(London Standard.) Presiding over a large meeting at the Cambridge Guildhall to protest against any alterations of the Rubric which directs the use of the Athanasian Creed, Viscount Halifax declared that any discussion on the Prayer-book in parliament should not be contemplated without the gravest apprehension. Lord Halifax recalled the fact that the same question was raised in 1851, and it was a great meeting of men in St. James's Hall which, humbly speaking, had preserved the Athanasian Creed. They must be not less active now. After a brief survey of the origin and position of the Athanasian Creed, he said it came to them with all the weight of Catholic tradition, with the sanction and authority of the whole Church of Christ. If we changed the rubric, he asked, would it be to the use of another? Again he asked, was this the moment for attempting any revision of the Prayer-book? Under existing circumstances, could a revision be contemplated without the gravest apprehension? There could be only one answer to such questions.

FOUR NEW LEPROSY CASES TWO OF THEM IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Report of Canadian Minister of Agriculture for Fiscal Year—Good Work Done For Farmers

The report of the minister of agriculture for the fiscal year ended March 31st deals with the various branches of the department, there being an interesting account given of the work of the extension of markets division. This division is charged with the supervision of the inspection services organized with a view of improving the handling of Canadian food products, of securing proper temperatures for the safe carriage of these goods and that delays in transit may be reduced to a minimum.

The report states that six cargo inspectors at Montreal who watched the handling of perishable freight as it was unloaded into the steamships, tested the temperature of the butter before it was placed in cold storage chambers on the ships, and placed thermographs in the different chambers and holds. Three food inspectors at Montreal, who reported the condition of the refrigerators which arrived at the railway terminals with "but-ter" look temperatures of the butter and saw that it was carefully handled and quickly distributed. Three inspectors in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec, tested the temperature of the butter at the various shipping stations. A REMARKABLE BARBER

Iowa City has a barber with a most remarkable record. He was drawn as a juror in the district court, was found to know nothing about it, and he expressed no opinion respecting the same, and when the jury returned a verdict, he was at his chair the next morning and said nothing about the case or the verdict returned, about the Republican.

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"I spent five months and made a thorough investigation of the islands and they crossed to the mainland and spent a year in the Portuguese colony of Angola, whence the slaves are recruited. I visited the ports and saw the laborers being exported, men and women, with their babies in their arms, and I saw the long lines of slaves being carried across the great slave route, running eastward across the Angola into the heart of Africa.

"Skeletons and skulls could be seen by the roadside, and heavy wooden shackles used for securing slaves by night, lay in abundance along the route, unmistakable evidence of compulsion. I saw slaves coming down, weak and emaciated, tottering along in honor of the King of Portugal. Three fresh skeletons in one shackle, and one of our party saw a bound native being carried on a pole. After nearly two years of travel in Africa I returned to England, and my report was given by the British government to the Portuguese authorities. Reforms were promised, but not carried out.

"These facts of slavery were so appalling that the four cocoa firms who had sent me out publicly announced their intention of ceasing to buy Portuguese cocoa. England can now drink free cocoa, and Portugal can dispose of her produce elsewhere, the abuse continues and the slaves still suffer.

"The Anti-Slavery Society of London has sent my wife and myself to this country to urge the people to support England in this fight for freedom."—Baltimore Sun.

FAMOUS RACE HORSES THAT HATED MEN

Famous race horses, like famous people, are often very eccentric in their behavior, and there have been many cases of celebrated animals that have turned savage and had to be shot through trying to eat their jockeys, as the St. Louis Post-Dispatch.

Otto Madden, the famous jockey, who only a few seasons ago won the Derby on the 100 to 1 chance, Jeddah, was violently attacked by a horse at the Brighton races. He was riding Centre down to the post for the Worsling plate, when a horse called Marigold IV, overtook him, dragged him out of the saddle by the shoulder, and seizing him by the throat, shook him as a terrier shakes a rat. The jockey of Marigold IV, who had himself been unseated, used his whip freely on the brute's head to make him release Madden, and other jockeys coming to his assistance. Marigold IV, was eventually beaten off.

Madden returned to the paddock bleeding from a wound on the throat which had to have several stitches put into it, and it was some time before he was able to ride again.

Sweet Sounds, in spite of his name, was an irreclaimable savage. One morning at exercise his girths came undone, he got his foot off and rushed at him like a lion, the result to the unlucky lad being a month in the hospital. Good Morning was another of the ugly tempered sort. Once he bit his leading rein clean through with one vicious snap, caught hold of his attendant and shook him ferociously.

Lada, another famous race horse, was perfectly quiet under ordinary circumstances, but for some reason he had a great dislike for ladies and would "go for them" if any members of the fair sex approached the paddock.

Diamond Jubilee was another famous horse that gave a good deal of trouble to his trainer owing to the violence of his kicks and dislikes. He hated Mornington Cannon, the famous jockey, and on one occasion flew at him while exercising on Newmarket Heath, mauling him flying, and "Morry" would most certainly have been killed if assistance had not been at hand.

PARLIAMENT NOW HAS NAVAL PLAN FOR ITS CONSIDERATION

Three Cruisers and Four Torpedo Boats for a Start—Imperial Conference Proceedings in Blue Book—Military Defence

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—Canada's naval plans were laid before parliament this afternoon. They provide for the construction of three cruisers of the "improved Bristol" class, and four destroyers of the "improved river" class.

The Fleet Unit

It was therefore recommended in the advisory memorandum that the fleet unit to be aimed at should consist of the following at least: One modern cruiser of the Indomitable class; three unarmored cruisers of the Bristol class; six destroyers and three submarines with necessary auxiliary such as depot and stores ships.

Imperial Conference

The conference papers and the correspondence were presented to the commons and the senate in the form of a blue book, comprising fifty pages. It commences with copies of the communications exchanged between Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and the home government, relating to the summoning of the conference.

The plan for Australia was that with some financial aid from the imperial government the commonwealth should maintain the Australian unit of the Pacific fleet.

New Zealand elected to adhere to her first proposal, which was to form a part of the British fleet in Chinese waters.

The double seaboard of Canada was held to make it inadvisable for her to adopt a fleet unit of the kind suggested for Australia, at least in the present time.

It was stated in the conference "that if the problem of imperial naval defence were considered merely as a problem of naval strategy it would be taken into account the output of strength for a given expenditure is obtained by the maintenance of a single navy with the concomitant unity of training and unity of command."

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



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

SUCCESS ATTENDS ST. JOHN MAN

Capt. Harry T. Boyd Promoted to Command of Ten Thousand Ton Passenger Steamer

The many St. John friends of Captain Harry T. Boyd, a former north end resident, will be pleased to learn that he has been promoted to the command of one of the finest passenger steamers on the Atlantic coast, the new steamer Antilles, of the Southern Pacific S. S. Co's fleet, which ply between New York and New Orleans. The new steamer is 500 feet long and 10,000 tons register.

Captain Boyd left St. John about four years ago. He is a son of a former well known baker in the North End, and his wife was Miss Colwell of the west end.

For a number of years he sailed out of St. John as first officer in sailing vessels of the Thomson fleet, and on going to New York took a position as second mate in the Southern Pacific Company's service. He was promoted to mate and then to master of the passenger steamer Chulmette remaining in command of her for about three years. About a fortnight ago he was placed in charge of the big new steamer Antilles, which is said to be the finest passenger steamer on the Atlantic coast.

ONE COMPANY TO CONTROL ALL BATTLE LINERS

The Yarmouth Herald says that at the meeting of the shareholders of the steamers forming the Battle Line, held here on Friday evening, as announced in the Herald, it was decided to form a new company combining all the steamers. Official appraisals will value each steamer in England, and the gross amount will form the amount of capital of the new company. The insurance will be largely reduced, as should a loss occur the amount will be scattered among all the shareholders, which will be as much advantage as the respective amounts are at present.

It is also understood that the steamers are to be placed in commission as soon as possible; two of them—the Eretria and Himeria—already being chartered and nearly ready for sea.

FIRST WINTER PORT STEAMER DUE AT HALIFAX TONIGHT

The first winter port steamship, the Virginia, is due at Halifax tonight. She has on board, thirty-six saloon, seventy-eight second cabin and 410 steerage passengers.

C. P. R. steamer Montrose, left Antwerp for this port direct last Monday.

A large amount of freight is coming forward from the west, including much wheat. The warehouses on the west side begin to present a busy appearance.

Up to date thirty-four different ocean steamships are listed to do the St. John winterport trade. There are others to be added as soon as their sailing dates are fixed.

C. P. R. steamship Empress of Britain, Captain Murray, will leave Liverpool tomorrow for this port via Halifax. This is the first C. P. R. steamer in this season's winter port business.

Allan Line steamship Grampania is scheduled to sail from Liverpool today for St. John. She will be the second steamer of this line now on the way here.

Steamship Cassandra, of the Donaldson line will leave Glasgow next Saturday for this port direct.
