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AFRICAN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Weymouth, Saturday, September 29th, 1866.

The Association met, pursuant to adjournment, with the Weymouth Church, Saturday, 2 p. m. After singing, prayer by Rev. Henry Jackson.

Resolved, That Brother Thomas Saunders be Chairman

for our Association.

Resolved, That Brothers C. Taylor, T. Sanders, T. Jones, Wm. Smith, A. Berry and J. R. Thomas be a committee to wait upon defected members. Also that Brother Taylor be Moderator for said committee.

After singing the Rev. James Thomas read the 33rd Psalm and lectured from the same, followed by the Ministering brethren, also a number of the brethren and sisters.

Truly we had a good time.

Met at 7 o'clock. Prayer by Bro. Jones. The Rev. Henry Jackson read the 15th Psalm, and lectured from the same, followed by several of the brethren. Prayer by Rev. James Thomas.

Sunday.—Met at 10½ o'clock, a. m. Prayer by Brother Thomas Saunders. Rev. James Thomas preached from the

4th Chapter of Daniel.

3, p. m. Preaching by Rev. Henry Jackson from the 14th Chapter John, followed by Rev. James Thomas.

Met at half-past six o'clock. Preaching by Brother E. Jackson from the 41st Chapter of Isaiah, 5th verse, followed by Rev. James Thomas, and several of the brethren.

Monday the ministers and delegates met at 9 a.m. Prayer by the Rev. James Thomas. The Association was

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Yar Live called to order. The counsel got into confusion about Smithers' case, so we did no further business.

Met at 11 o'clock. The Rev. Benson Smithers being advised by his ministering brethren to be silent and lie at the feet of the Cross, until his case was settled, yet he persisted, and, for sake of peace, the ministers did not disturb him. The Clerk was ordered to take no notes of his preaching.

Met at half-past 2. Prayer by Brother Thomas Jones.

The Rules and Regulations of the African Baptist Church,
Halifax, were read and discussed and approved of.

Met at 6 o'clock. Prayer by Brother Jackson. Preaching by Rev. James Thomas from 3rd Chapter Exd., last clause, 2nd verse, followed by Thomas Saunders, Jones, and others.

Tuesday.—Met at 10 o'clock, a. m. The Rev. James Thomas read the 7th Chapter of Solomon's Song.

Approved, that the Rev. James Thomas and John R. Thomas read the letters.

Resolved, That the Letters from the various Churches be read; from which statistics were found.

of Brother Middleton as Deacon.

Voted that if the Church to which Brother Charles Francis belongs approves to give him a Letter of License, he has our approval.

Resolved, That no Brother be entitled to a license to

preach until he is approved of by our Association.

This Association advised Brother Roan to go home and make acknowledgment to the Halifax Church, as we consider him and all concerned in the difficulty with the little Meeting-house, Dartmouth, entirely wrong, from first to last.

Met at 7 o'clock. Preaching by Rev. Henry Jackson, followed by Thomas Saunders and others. Our Association then separated to meet with the Bear River Church on the last Saturday in September, 1867.

December 5th.

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Brothers Charles Roan, Thomas Tynes, Richard Tynes, and John Gerry, have acknowledged their wrong to the Halifax Church, then called for their dismissal which was granted, therefore they are not considered members of our body.

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CIRCULAR LETTER.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

We feel under a renewed covenant to God for having spared our lives; yet we stray away from him by thought, word, and action. And as I have been instructed to write this letter there is one thing that remains pressing upon my mind, incompetent promotion, too long, dear Brethren, has this topic been in and among us, and I feel it my duty to write briefly upon the same. God requires us to work to the glory and honour of himself, but it becomes us to work with humble simplicity, looking low to the feet of our Blessed Saviour Jesus Christ, that we may see high to where thine honour dwelleth. Hence the Lord said by the mouth of his servants, the

properts of all, " I will make a feast of fat things, a feast of wines on the lees, of fat things full of marrow, of wines on the less well refined." This is truly a delicious feast. but, if we have not got an appetite for this heavenly feast, then we can have no delight in this glorious provision which the Lord has made for his people.
