Out of 5:000 'inhabitants as many as 500 are reported stricken with the malady. Close on to 100 deaths have already occurred. In one house four of a family died in three days. "Boilt your water and milk' is the physicians' orders all along the Red River, and every precaution to prevent the apread of the fatal disease is being taken.

MANITOBA UNIVERSITY.

The above institution is constituted on quite a broad scale for a new country, it consists of four separate colleges: SL Joseph's (Oatholic), SL John's (Anglican), Manitoba (Presbyterian) and Wesley (Methodist).

Four courses—Arts, Theology, Law and Medicine—are laid down and can be pursued by any qualified student in connection with eitner college.
