"I spoke a few moments ago of a statement showing the number of sailings that there would be from the port during the coming winter. Most of those sailings are of vessels that are freight carriers and which will give very great employment to labor. In addition, there are two vessels carrying His Majesty's mails the Virginian and the Victorian, of the Allan line, and I have very great pleasure in being able to state to you here tonight that in addition to the Virginian and the Victorian, carrying the overseas mail from St. John, the two Royal mail steamers, the Royal Edward and the Royal George, of the Canadian Northern line will during the coming winter sail directly from St. John to Great Brit-ain. ## THE PROBLEM

Contestants who have remitted any amount less than six dollars with their correct solution of the first puzzle, have the privilege of sending in with their solution to the second puzzle, whatever amount they wish, up to a limit of six dollars. That is, any one who sent two collars with the first correct solution may now send from one to four dollars Draw a continuous chain of circles across the face of the chart from left to right and back again so that the numbers within the circles will total the greatest number of points. Start at 99 near the bottom of the left-hand column. To be exact the eighth number from the bottom.

The progress of the chain in crossing the first time may be up or down and to the right, but not to the left. In coming back it may be up or do to the right.

Each section must be at a right angle with the preceeding and succeeding section, and must contain either three, four, five or six circles, not less than three or more than six. When working back to the left, the chain must not cross itself and no circle shall be drawn in a square which touches at right angles or obliquely any square which tains a circle that was drawn when going toward the right.

By section is meant a series of three four, five or six circles in a straight line.

The circle at the angle where the chain turns is to be regarded as the end of one section and the beginning of the next. This, however, does not mean that the numbers in these circles are to be counted twice, or that the circles themselves count two when adding up the number of points encircled or the number of circles which form the chain

The numbers in each square, where there are two figures, are to be regarded as double numbers, as ninety-nine, sixty-five, eighty-seven, etc.

The circles do not have to be perfectly round or artistically formed. Contestants, however, should be careful to draw them so they will not obliterate the numbers. Circles can be drawn with either pencil or ink.

Should two or more tied contestants who are associated together in business or otherwise colsely associated and acquainted with each other submit identical solutions which should prove to be a prize winner, and which no one else submits, one prize only will be divided equally between those so associated or acquainted unless those submitting them can conclusively show that they were not aware that the others were working on the puzzle, and they had no access to each other's work.

A mistake in stating the number of points will disqualify the chart as a possible prize winner.
