## ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, BRAMPTON, Jan. 10, 1900

The meeting was opened by singing, reading of Scripture, and prayer.

Mr. Jno. Anthony moved, seconded by Mr. Jno. McClure, that Mr. John Smith act as chairman for the evening. Carried.

Rev. W. C. Clark, the pastor, read the Report of the Kirk Session and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Jno. Anthony. Carried.

Mr Wm. Kirkwood read the Report of the Mission Fund and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. J. H. Robertson. Carried.

Miss N. Brown read the Eleventh Annual Report of the McLaren Mission Band and moved its adoption, seconded by Miss Charlotte McClure, and carried.

The Report of the Sabbath School was read by Mr. J. C. Kirkwood, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. A. G. Buckham. This encouraging report showed the Sabbath School to be in a highly efficient and prosperous state.

Miss A. Robertson read the Fifteenth Annual Report of the W. F. M. Society and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. G. McClure and carried.

The Report from the Managers was read by Mr. John McClure, treasurer, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. J. H. Robertson. Carried.

Mr John Anthony read the Report of the Session Fund and moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. Robert McClure and carried.

Mr. John Anthony moved, seconded by Mr. Wm. Miller, that Mr. John McClure be re-elected Treasurer for the congregation, and that he be granted \$25 for his services as such. Carried.

Mr. J. H. Robertson moved, seconded by Mr. John Carter, that Dr. French be re-appointed Secretary. Carried.

Nominations for four Managers to hold office for three years and one Manager for two years, were taken and resulted by ballot as follows : For three years : Messrs. Jno. D. Gordon, Dr. Moore, W. J. Fenton, J. Warren, and for two years, Mr. Murray.

Mr. David McClure moved, seconded by Mr. A. G. Buckham, that the congregation be again asked to give two collections for S. School. Carried.

Messrs. J. Warren and W. E. Anthony were appointed Auditors for 1900.

Mr. W. J. Fenton moved, seconded by Dr. Noble, that whereas Mr. J. C. Kirkwood is about to remove from the bounds of the congregation, be it resolved, that we as a congregation place on record our appreciation of the services he has rendered as a member of the Managing Board, and also as Superintendent of the Sabbath School, and pray that God's blessing may attend him in his new field of labor. Carried.

The past year brought a number of changes to the Session as well as to the congregation. It was thought to be to the interest of the people to add to the membership of the Session, accordingly the congregation was asked to elect six. Upon the ballot being counted it was found that Messrs. J. C. Kirkwood, John A. McCulloch, R. T. Noble, Andrew Henderson, John T. Carter and T. H. Shields were the choice of the people. Only the first three were able to see their way to accepting the office to which they were called. They were accordingly ordained and installed to the office of Eldership of the Presbyterian Church of Canada.

Following this addition came the resignation of Dr Moore, who for a

number of years had so efficiently discharged the duties of Clerk. This was very much regretted, as Dr. Moore was exceedingly helpful in counsel and faithful in the discharge of all duty. Although pressed to withdraw his resignation, Dr. Moore felt that owing to extra demands made upon him by his profession, he must retire from the active work of the Session.

Mr. J. C. Kirkwood was chosen as Clerk, but the end of the year found Mr. Kirkwood leaving town, and although not separated from the Session, yet it would be impossible for him to continue acting as Clerk. Mr. Kirkwood will be especially missed in the S. S., where he has been an esteemed and useful officer for many years. Mr. Leslie has succeeded to the Clerkship, and we trust the present year will not bring as many changes as the past.

Among our dead are some of our oldest members and strongest supporters. Five of the eight were wives and mothers, who left behind them desolated homes, especially those where there were little children. One was an aged father, and two were young men in the strength of manhood. We are thus warned that anyone may be called, and, therefore, all should be ready. These homes which have been led through sorrow we bear to Him, "Who doeth all things well," in prayer.

We would like to interest all in the study of the Life of Christ, which is being taken up in the S. S. and Prayer Meeting. This, through careful study and earnest prayer, should bring forth in all our hearts and homes much fruit. We should strive to live in His spirit and walk before men clad with His righteousness. If the Christ Life would only become our motto for 1900, how many little things which are neither for our good nor His glory would become things of the past!—how much stronger and brighter and better we would all be!

For the next fifteen months the "Century Fund" will claim our attention. Already we have made fair progress, and if we all respond as faithfully as those who have already given, we will not lack anything in giving our portion. "Bring ye the tithes into the store-house."

## MANAGERS' REPORT.

For the first time in a number of years, the Financial Report comes before the congregation under the depressing, though possibly salutary, shadow of a deficit. It accentuates, in a practical way, that the congregation cannot afford to overlook its own responsibilities, come what may, on the one side, and shows the necessity of that unpopular thing—economy—on the other. When we come to look the deficit—another unpopular thing, but perhaps not quite so much so as economy—squarely in the face, it does not look so bad as at first appears. It springs, chiefly, from an excess of expenditure over previous years, for which full value has been received. As an instance may be mentioned the interest on Repair Work, new Organ, Carpet, &c., amounting to \$157.50. But this is not the only considerable item of outlay, not in the expenses of two previous years, which may be seen by comparing the subjoined figures with those of these years.

Our increase in outlay does not account, fully, for the financial situation—not alarming, however—which the contributions by envelope in the receipts, being, at present, \$100 less than in 1898, corroborates. As an offset to this rather startling statement, the contributions in this way, amounting to \$1,800.00 in our last year's report, included most of the arrears, but this year only one Sabbath of the new year having gone by, it does not—at least we hope not—and the plate collection this year (1899) is \$28.74 better than that of 1898.

Eight hundred dollars having been paid by the contributions to Repair Fund, on our repair debt, \$36.00 of interest is thereby cut off, which, with \$108.08 insurance premium paid in past year, make \$144.08—an amount the expense of 1900 will be less than 1899, so far as these things are concerned.

But let us not feel too pleased at this until we hear both sides. We commenced 1899 with the special contribution of \$200 by the will of the late Mrs. Huston, and another hundred of regular balance, when all arrears were in, to keep it in company; and yet now a deficit, how much it will be, if any, when all arrears are in, cannot at present be exactly said. Supposing we be ultimately placed in a position to pay all liabilities, without borrowing, we would require at least \$100.00 more for the present year than that contributed for 1899, meaning about 5 per cent. of an increase on our total revenue, or for every dollar given for last year, so far, an additional 5c.

And what shall we more say?—than that the small square envelopes in which the Weekly Offering is made, and on which contributors are requested to mark amount enclosed, are placed on table of vestibule, where each one may supply himself, or be supplied by speaking to one of the ushers

## Fifteenth Annual Report of Brampton Auxiliary to the W. F. M. S.

Meetings have been held regularly during the past year on the first Friday of each month, with the exceptions of months of July and August.

In January the Rev. Robt. Johnson, of London, delivered a lecture on "Some Scottish Heroes in Church and State," under the auspices of the Society.

A Social in aid of the Contingent Fund was held in the Lecture Room of the Church on the 1st of June. \$13.78 were realized for that fund.

Our pastor, Mr. Clark, was present at our September meeting and gave a short address on our privileges as members of the W. F. M. S.

The annual Thank Offering Meeting of our Society was held in October. Mrs. Gray, of Toronto, was present and gave an account of the work being done in the Regina Industrial School. The offering amounted to \$31.01.

In September a bale of Clothing valued at \$22.55 was sent to the Northwest Mission Schools. \$6.25 in cash was also contributed.

Our total membership, including 26 Scattered Helpers and 16 members of the General Society, is 76. The average attendance is 25.

The total amount of money contributed during the year was \$117.85.

Ninety copies of The Tidings are in circulation.

In reviewing the work of the past year, we cannot help regretting that we have not made greater progress, yet for what has been done we desire to return thanks.

We trust that during the year 1900 our membership may be greatly increased, and that each member may take a new and more active interest in the work of our Society.

## SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT FOR 1899.

The Sabbath School in 1899 has had an encouraging year, not so much in the matter of attendance, though there is a gain there, as in the general condition of all interests. The offerings are better than for many years past, and all departments of the School seem to be in a fairly healthy state. For 1898 we received from the Congregation two special offerings, amounting to \$64.89. In 1899 similar offerings amounted to only \$37.10, a falling off in this help of over \$27.00. However, the Cantata in December, given publicly in the Concert Hall, netted us about \$33.00, so that we were able by this entertainment to overtake this shortage. We continue to supply both teachers and scholars with adequate "Helps" for the Scripture Lesson studies; and we are able to report there is an increasing use by all of the Bible in the School. The new Library put into circulation about May last has been freely used, and is a highly appreciated adjunct.

Some features of the School may be stated more particularly:

We had, to mark our "special days," the Rev. Louis Jordan, of St. James Square, and the Rev. Alex. McMillan, of St. Enoch's, Toronto. We were fortunate indeed to have men so distinguished, and the memory of their visits abides with us, and we trust, too, the profit of them; and if the Congregation is disposed to grant us in the new year days in which we receive their special assistance, we shall endeavor to do our part in having for these occasions to minister to us all worthy men. Indeed, as we see it, the Congregation owes the Sabbath School a debt of gratitude in enabling it to extend its acquaintance with the bright and noted servants of our Presbyterian Church.

We have had recorded in the past year visitors to the number of over 250. This is worthy of remark, and is greatly encouraging. We would like much to see more of the members of our Congregation visit the Sabbath School, and it would delight the Pastor of our church to see his Bible Class enlarged by the coming—the regular coming—of the older people.

The general attendance has been fair, but not large enough, considering the membership of our Congregation. We have on the roll 24 officers, whose average attendance for the year was 19, or 75 per cent. There are recorded 191 scholars, with an average attendance of 119, or 62 per cent.—a gain of 10 per cent. in 1899 over 1898. With the help of the parents, a more regular attendance of scholars could be obtained. If the parents would keep in mind that the children in, alas! too many families, are taught eternal truth only in the Sabbath School, they would give to the single hour in the week devoted to Bible study a new value, and they would be very deeply concerned—or ought to be. Let us urge again that parents endeavor to give home instruction in the lessons set for study, or see that time is taken for this purpose. This is a matter fraught with life issues. It is a momentous thing. Indifference on this subject is death—soul death.
