Mr. Beveridge has been

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## General Intelligence.

The New British War Vessel.

(From the London Telegraph.)

Mention was made on Monday in

the House of Commons of the *Inflectible*,

the latest pattern of war-ship

building for our navy. The belief of

Admiral Eliot, that the days of ar-

myr playing are nearly over, is cer-

tainly not justified by this extraordi-

nary vessel. The exact drawings and

particulars of her build are very natu-

rally kept from public knowledge, but

we may, without any breach of

patent, give a general conception of

the design adopted in this the

youngest of our iron-clads. What

may be called the distinguishing char-

acteristic of the *Inflectible* is that she

is a water-tight vessel, with a

"wind and water line" at all.

Every one must know that the

vitals of a man-of-war lie along the belt

of her flotation—a breach of her sides

in that region lets in the sea and swamps

her. The *Inflectible* is built with a

side armor upon a central space 110

feet in length. It
