It is to be regretted, we think, that the

Liberals did not put a candidate squarely in

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The Privy Council.

In the argument in reference to the

legality of the Canada Temperance Act

before the Privy Council, the Lord Chan-

cellor, Lord Watson, has expressed the

opinion that the case was heard by six

judges, and that the majority of the six

judges was equally divided on the sub-

ject. Three were of the opinion that the

jurisdiction rested with the Dominion

Government, and three were of the opi-

nion that it belonged to the Provinces. The

Lord Chancellor, upon whom under the

circumstances rested the responsibility of

giving what may be termed the casting

vote, decided against the Dominion Act.

His warrant for so doing being, it is

understood, the decision, favorable to

the Provinces, rendered by the Supreme

Court of Canada.

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BULGARIA.

SOFIA, Dec. 26.—Prince Alexander entered Sofia today at the head of six regiments of infantry, one regiment of cavalry, and three batteries of artillery. He was received with great enthusiasm by the inhabitants. The city was brilliantly illuminated. Many banners bearing patriotic inscriptions were displayed at various points on the line of march. One of these read "Honor and glory to the victors of Silistria, Dragomirgrad, Tzarigrad and Plovdiv."

Dec. 27.—The Serbian troops today made an attack upon a Bulgarian frontier village, and were twice repulsed. Three Bulgarian soldiers were wounded. The Bulgarian Government will send a note to the Powers protesting against Serbia's violation of the treaty of alliance.
