INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.

The Commissioners appointed to construct the
Intercolonial Railway give public Notice that
having annulled the Contracts or Sections Nos.
6, 7, and 8, they are prepared to receive tenders
for re-letting the same.

Section No. 3 is in the Province of Quebec and
extends from the Eastern end of Section No. 2
four miles east of Rivière du Loup, to the Sixty-
sixth mile post, near Rimouski, a distance of
about 26 miles.

Section No. 6 is in the Province of New Brun-
swick, and extends from the Eastern end of Sec-
tion No. 3, opposite Dalhousie, to the West side
of the main line, near the forty-seventh mile
post, Easterly from Jacques River, a distance of
about 21 miles.

Scotia, and extends from the Southern end of
