FIRE at MURRAY ROAD.—John Smith, of Murray Road, had his house with all its contents burned on the evening of the 4th of February. The loss is heavy as he has a large family and all his clothing, seed grain and other necessities were consumed.

NORTHERN LIGHT.—The unlucky "Northern Light" left Pictou on Saturday, the 4th, for Georgetown. After a week's battering around among the ice cakes, she reached Caribou, near Pictou, and landed her passengers safely, within easy access to their starting point.

EUBRITIAN.—The young gentlemen of this society have temporarily organized themselves into a parliament, for the discussion of public questions. M. Gais Smith, president of the society, is Speaker of the House, W. B. Jones and W. M. Tweedie are respectively leaders of the Government and Opposition. A member of the Government has given notice of a resolution approving of the present protective policy of Canada.

DEER CAUGHT.—On Monday, Mr. John Crocker, Wood Point, while out breaking roads, observed the hoof prints of a deer that had crossed the wood-road near Atkinson's mill. The track was fresh, and he determined to follow it. He only went a few yards, when he caught sight of the animal, which was making very slow progress in the deep snow. On being alarmed he plunged into the deep snow, and became completely helpless, when Mr. Crocker secured him and took him home on his sled. The animal is very handsome and has become already quite docile. Mr. Crocker has been offered \$20 for him.

Car Shed Smashed Up.

NINE 1 C. B. CARS DESTROYED.

The length of the roof was 375 feet, and the general opinion seems to be that there was not enough support to it. Anyhow it broke down and four first-class passengers, two second-class, two postal and one fanger were crushed. The total loss to cars is given at \$40,000.

The Late Dr. Wilson.

By the death of William Wilson, Esq., M. D., recorded in to-day's issue, is removed a face and figure long familiar in our household and that will carry regret to nearly every family in the county. The robust health of Dr. Wilson has been gradually declining for six months or more, and his demise was not unexpected to his friends. Few men were so busy and useful during a long life, yet the events of his personal history may be told in a few words. He was a native of Ireland, was educated at the University of Glasgow, immigrated when a young man to this country and first practiced medicine at Quaco. He removed to Shepody practicing there for a year or two. His business extended so rapidly that in 1826, he found it necessary to live in a more central place, and removed to Dorchester Corner, where he commanded an enormous practice, not only in that locality, but throughout Westernland and the adjoining counties. Possessing quick powers of observation, a keen and accurate business judgment and a rare tact, he was most successful in his profession, establishing a reputation for medical skill, that has survived the period, when the weight of years compelled him to relinquish active work. As an evidence of the character of his practice and powers of endurance, we may mention that in one week he made visits as follows: to Sussex Valley, returning home, went once to Shepody, returning home, and went to Parramore, and then to Richibucto, in all 450 miles on horseback. He with Dr. Bayard formed a government commission to inquire into the occurrence of leprosy at Tracadie and on their report a lazaretto was established there. When he settled at Dorchester, physicians were not as abundant as they are to-day. In Cumberland, the sole representatives of the healing art were Dr. Purdy and Dr. Carruth—his latter being the father of Dr. T. W. Carruth, and father-in-law of Dr. Wilson. In Westernland, as at the Point, Dr. Rufus Smith lived; in Sackville Dr. Marmaduke Backhouse practiced; at Dorchester there was Dr. Charles Smith. Of these, Dr. Charles Smith alone survives—a venerable octogenarian still enjoying fair health. He is still able to take his two mile walk with ease. Dr. Wilson's political opinions never interfered with his private friendship, his invariable good nature and ready tact serving to render his political opponents amongst the strongest of his personal friends. He had an old-fashioned horror of the now fangled notions of the present. In contrast with the rage for liberalism so affected nowadays, there was always a refreshing flavor of skepticism in his opinions as to the real value of responsible government, railways, telegraphs, confederation, &c., &c. This a remarkably temperate man, he was an opponent of the Temperance Reform movement. It is said it was some years after the first railway train passed through Dorchester that he ventured to trust himself on board. When telegraphs were being first established, he was one evening at a whist party, where a hot discussion arose as to the practicality and value. In the midst of it—the Doctor received his first telegraphic message—a peremptory summons calling him away. "There," said he, triumphantly holding up the message, "it had not been for your confounded telegraphs, I could not have received this call to-night, and we could have finished the game." Dr. Wilson received legislative honors twice. In 1837, he was elected with Daniel Hanington, Wm. Crane and Philip Palmer. He did not offer for the next Assembly, but John Smith of Albert, taking his place, but in 1846, he was again elected. His colleagues were Hon. D. Hanington, Wm. Hazen Botsford and Amund Landry. Albert County had been divided off, and was then represented by John Smith and Wm. H. Stevens. In this Assembly, John Wesley Weldon (now Judge) was Speaker, John K. Partelow was Provincial Secretary, L. A. Wilnot, Attorney General, Wm. Boyd Kinney, Solicitor General, and Thomas Baillie, Surveyor General. The succeeding election (1850) Dr. Wilson retired from the Legislature. The following was the poll at that election:

Mr. Gilbert demanded a scrutiny of Chapman's and Botsford's votes. Chapman was unseated, a new election was ordered and Smith (now Sir Albert) was returned. Nothing of especial note marked Dr. Wilson's legislative career. He was then a supporter of the Botsford and Chaudhury's and was subsequently won of Sir A. J. Smith. One little incident occurred that illustrates in a striking manner the difference in the manners and fashions of forty years ago and those of today. In the heat of political discussion, the Doctor referred to the conduct of some of the Gilbert family, who were political opponents of his. The late Thomas Gilbert, Esq., a member for Queens, heard it and with the redoubtable pluck that distinguishes that family, immediately took up the quarrel of his relations and sent a challenge. The Doctor accepted. Mr. Gilbert had the reputation of being a dead shot and a good deal of alarm was felt amongst the Doctor's friends as to the results. The meeting took place one winter's morning on the Simonds farm (the Ridge) two miles below Fredericton. They both fired but the shots resulted harmlessly—a flurry of snow it is said having temporarily obscured Mr. Gilbert's vision.

We cannot close this brief sketch of departed worth without referring to Dr. Wilson's kindly nature. He was a man eminently of generous impulses. Not only were his professional services given unreservedly to the poor, but his hand was ever on his purse to render more substantial aid.

The British Parliament.

The British Parliament has it work out for it this session. Mr. Gladstone will not have the walk over the track that he had last year. It will require all his talent, industry and personal popularity, to help him out of the difficult position he is in. The land law passed, but Ireland is not quiet. It does not satisfy the different classes of malcontents any more than the famous traveller could suit the bystanders as to how he should get himself, his journey and his land. Landowners are angry because rents are not abolished; landlords are angry because rents are lowered. Bradlaugh's friends are cross because Mr. Gladstone ever hindered him from taking his seat, and Mr. Bradlaugh's enemies are not pleased because the Premier wished to arrange things so that Bradlaugh could sit. Forster, Secretary to Ireland, has to have his letters opened by machinery, else he would have been before this mutilated by explosions contained in them. Gladstone gets warning letters signed "Satan" and sees ill-looking men dogging his footsteps. Still, the like has been before and the era of disquiet will pass away. Meanwhile, Gladstone has a surplus, a good looking, good natured, pleasant and persevering man, and a well earned reputation of being, for internal affairs at least, the first statesman in Europe.

Gladstone lost his first motion; that for the admission of Bradlaugh. He is now introducing a bill to prevent obstruction. Under its provisions the speaker can by the votes of 200 members, or if only 40 oppose, declare a motion urgent, and put the question allowing no further debate. This will be opposed by the Conservatives and it is said that the Minister will resign if the bill does not carry.

An Example.

Baldwin, the late Cashier of the New York Bank, has been tried on three indictments, and found guilty of all. Judge Nixon in sentencing him used the following language: "This is a very sad and hard case, both to you and to me. I wish I could discharge my duty and let the Government simply say to you: 'Depart and sin no more.' But this is not the place for mercy, but rather for justice. I think, perhaps, I should be doing but right if I imposed upon you on each of the indictments a sentence of three years imprisonment. That number the law allows. I do not think it right to impose a lighter sentence, and I do not think this would be doing justice, because one of the objects of punishment is not only to punish the guilty party, but also that it may keep others from doing likewise. I, therefore, in this case impose upon you five years' imprisonment on each of the three indictments, one term to begin at the expiration of the other."
