Peace in Guatemala.

GUATEMALA, Aug. 29.—The peace treaty nas been signed in Salvador by Provisional President Ezeta and his Minister of State and submitted to Congress. The treaty provides that both countries shall withdraw their troops from the frontier within 48 hours. Within eight days all implements of war shall be stored and each country shall keep standing only the usual number of troops kept in time of peace. Neither country shall be liable for indemnity for any damage sustained during the war. In future the full independence of Salvador will be respected. Serious Trouble Among Chicago Switchmen.

SWITCHMEN STRIKE.

CHICAGO, Ill., Aug. 28.—Twenty-seven switchmen in the employ of the Lake Shore road struck last night, completely tying up all the business of the road as far as Chicago is concerned. The trouble grows out of the stock yards difficulty. Superintendent Amsden took a crew of men down to the stock yards yesterday afternoon. Just before reaching there the men quit and left their engines standing on the track. Some time afterward another crew was started, but it abandoned the engines at Forty-third street. When the night shift came to go to work they learned that Superintendent Amsden had discharged all the men who had left their engines. They immediately held a meeting and the men in the yards at Tweifth street, Forty-third and Englewood, walked out in a body. A general meeting was called at the corner of Sixty-third street and Indian avenue, and a communication was drawn up and addressed to Superintendent Amsden, in which it was stated that the men would return to work when those who had been discharged were reinstated. Amsden replied that the men had been discharged for refusing to perform their duties. A strike was at once declared. The switchmen held a meeting to-day, at which Superintendent Amsden was present, and explained the circumstances under which the night force struck and asked the men whether they intended to stand by the company or the strikers. Thirty-four of the 60 men present signed a paper agreeing to stand by the company and to go to work. The remainder decided to side with the strikers, Two engines were then sent to Packingtown to do the work needed there, and the remainder are to work in the Lake Shore vards. There is no particular change in the situation at the stock yards. Everything is quiet, and the engines, managed as they were yesterday, are doing whatever work is needed. There are no switchmen in the yards. There is no change in matters at the Chicago and Alton yard.

Grain for Steers on Pasture.

Grain for Steers on Pasture.

The following are the "Suggested Conclusions" of a trial made by Prof. G. E. Morrow at the Illinois Agricultural Experiment Station, and detailed in Bulletin No. 9 of the "Value of Pasture, and of Grain Ration with Pasture, for Young Cattle:"

"The results from two years' trials indicate that a grain ration to young steers on good pasture is not usually profitable. The value of the increase in weight by the grainfed steers over that by those having grass only will rarely repay the cost of food and labor. The increased value of the animals from earlier maturity and better quality may make the grain-feeding profitable.

"Especially if the grain given be unground is it essential to have pigs follow

may make the grain-recting profitable.

"Especially if the grain given be unground is it essential to have pigs follow the cattle, if a profit is to be had.

"To secure the greatest gains per animal the pastures must not be fully stocked. To secure the largest gain per acre they should be fully stocked.

"An acre of good grass may be expected to support a steer weighing from 800 to 1,000 pounds, and enable it to make a moderato gain during the summer.

"The rate of growth of cattle, either on grass alone or with an added grain ration, is very irregular, being especially checked by either drought or excessive rains, extreme heat or cold storms.

"The addition of grain or other food to the pasturage before the grass fails in the autumn is clearly activisable.

"The acreage of pasturage may probably be asfely decreased one-third if the steers be given a full grain ration.



plated. If millions of treasure must be spent in preparations for a war that need not come, there are ample opportunities in Boston or New York harbors for its expenditure. It were possible in a very short time to sink a number of surpluses in rendering those unprotected ports in a measure impregnable to the assaults of foreign fleets. Until such work is accomplished, the fortification of our northern frontier will be the more inexcusable.

But the cry, "Defend the great lakes," becomes wholly uncalled for when the legit imate demands of this great artery of commerce for appropriations are beginning to tax the resources of the national treasury. Were the money available, doubtless millions of dollars could be spent to good purpose in improving navigation at points where natural obstacles are many and almost insuperable. The Sault Ste. Marie Canal, which renders possible inavigation between Lakes Huron and Superior, is recognized as a legitimate object of an increasing paternal care; and even the notorious Hennepin Canal, which pleads for an uninterrupted water-way between the lakes and the Gulf of Mexico, would become worthy of serious attention as opposed to fortifying. Rouse's Point or Sackett's

affords the only means of communication between Lakes Eric and Ontario, and therefore the commercial results alone accruing to the ICanadians from its ownership are of great consequence. Although the "Soo" canal is free of tolls to Canadian vessels, the discrimination made at the Welland Canal against vessels bound for American ports is such as to be almost prohibitory. That the Payne bill, providing for the construction of a Niagara ship canal, probably will not succeed in reaching the President at this sension of Congress, may or may not be cause for regret; yet it is certain that the work should be accomplished before approval is asked for any system of frontier fortifications, such as Secretary Proctor or Gen. Schofield may contemplate. The great lakes can better be defended by works of peace than by those of war—by the opening of great arteries of commerce rather frowning bastions.



This feature is very important, as no variety unsuitable for grinding will retain its place long, whatever good qualities it may otherwise possesss.

He referred particularly to the harm which the McKinley Bill would bring to the Canadian farmers, who have hitherto found so large a market for their hitherto found so large a market for their surplus cattle, horses, sheep, hay, straw, eggs, garden and other truck in the United States. There is now every prospect that this bill will become law, and there seems but one way for Canadians to escape its provisions, and that is by their declaring in favor of unrestricted reciprocity. Mr. Wiman asserts, and there are many indications that he is correct, that a comprehen-Wiman asserts, and there are many indica-tions that he is correct, that a comprehen-sive reciprocity treaty can be negotiated with the United States the moment that it it shown by the majority of the people of Canada that they are ready to carry out some such arrangement as is embodied in what is known as the Hitt resolution, which has been unanimously recommended to Congress by the Foreign Relations Committee, and which will in all probability be passed at the December and one of the December and One o ember session of that body. It

Their reticence in regard to treating with Canada no doubt can be aced for by the fact that it has been made known to them, by official utterances and by Parliamentary action, that the present Canadian Administration is hostile to the extension of trade between the United States and Canada, and determined to stand by the combines as against the re-maining portion of the people of the Do-minion. Once let it be known that the taxpayers do not indorse the policy of isolation decreed by the present rulers, and that they favor all-round reciprocity, and joint action looking to a treaty that shall be for the benefit of both countries will be a possi-bility. It seems to us to be much preferable and likely to be far more satisfactory for the Government of Canada toadopt the straightforward course of agreeing to negotiations on the line of the Hitt resolution. An agreement on that basis would increase and seement the frieadships now existing between the two countries, and while calling for the sacrifice of no principles or interests in either country, it would be mutually beneficial to the whole people of North America. 



The Congregational College.

The school room of the First Congregational Church was comfortably filled last evening with an audience, assembled to hear Principal Barbour, of the Congregational College, Montreal, discuss the workings of the institution with which he is connected. Rev. R. Neale occupied the chair and introduced the speaker.

Dr. Barbour, in opening, pointed out the great necessity for the proper education of ministers of the gospel, holding that such was requisite for the proper fulfillment of heir spiritual duties, which were clearly et forth in Paul's Epistles to Timothy, therein was contained what was expected a servant of Christ. A minister should evell cultivated in mind, and with that their spiritual duties, which were clearly set forth in Paul's Epistles to Timothy, wherein was contained what was expected of a servant of Christ. A minister should be well cultivated in mind, and with that goodness which would make his care of souls natural—not in a professional way, for fame, for money, or any worldly consideration. In referring to the college work the speaker dwelt on enlightened instruction in the Word of God as a prime necessity with them, also as a characteristic of their people. The Congregational College was better off now than ever before; it was better attended than ever before; it was better provided with the necessaries of a student's life than ever before; it got more money than ever, and yet it did not have half enough. The equalization of wealth was talked about, but it should be concentrated in some cases, for who would not wish to drink from a well rather than a shower? This winter the college would have every room occupied, including many young men from Ontario and some from the cream of Canadian society. He would warn the boys against the girls, because, out of the five gold medals given by McGill University, three were awarded to young laddes. The speaker concluded his entertaining address with a recital of the advantages to be derived from a course of instruction at the Congregational College at Montreal, which was the only one conducted by that denomination in Canada. Mr. Barbour's manner of deliveryis entirely unrestrained, and he speaks in a conversational way that renders him thoroughly at home with his audience.
