# NOT BREAK THROUGH Was Driven Back When Attempting To

Slip Past In Woods of Gruree-Allies' Progress In Woevre District Continuous.

(Canadian Press.)

Paris, Oct. 3.-3:03 p.m.-The official announcement issued this afternoon declares that the violent attack of the Germans at Roye has been repulsed by the allies.

The text of the statement follows: "First .- On our left wing the violent action which has been progressing since yesterday, continues without interruption, particularly in the region of Roye, where we have repulsed attacks, although upon this part of the front the enemy has been reinforced by new additions, taken from the enemy's centre, as has been previously noted.

CROWN PRINCE DRIVEN BACK.

"Second.-Upon the centre nothing is to be noted from Rheims to the Argonne region. In the Argonne district the Sixteenth German Corps (the army of the Crown Prince), which had attempted to slip by through the woods of Gruree, has been driven back toward the north of the Varennes-la-Harazee-Viennes-la-Ville line.

"In the Woevre district, and upon the heights of the Meuse our progress is always slow, but continuous.

"In the Belgian field, the Germans are bombarding the front, southeast of the Antwerp position, without being yet able to produce any considerable effect upon the works. They have delivered many infantry attacks, which have been re-

RUSSIAN SUCCESSES.

"In the Russian field of operations a strong German army of four corps has taken position between the frontier of East Prussia and the River Niemen. Its left wing has been thrown

At the centre the city of Augustovi has been taken by the Russians. On the German right wing the struggle continues around Ossowotz (between Lyck and Bielostok.)

"In Galicia the rear guard of the Austrians has retreated in disorder as far as the Vistula.

A Romantic Figure in Modern Litera-Joseph Conrad is one of the most picturesque and romantic figures in modern literature, and it may be said without hesitation that every word which he writes is a revelation of his own personality. An appreciation of his work, by Richard Curle, has been chosen to lead off Messrs. Kegan Paul's new series of "Studies of Living Writers." Born in Ukraine, in South Poland, in 1857, he was only 5 years old when his father was banished as a rebel, so that the child's youthful memories were all suffering and unrest. He was educated at the best school at Cracow, but the longing for a sea-life haunted his boy hood, and in 1874 he became a sailor, landing in England four years later to join the crew of an Australian liner. Thereafter for sixteen years he was at sea, rising steadily in the service, and when he left the trade in 1894 he had in his sea-chest the manuscript of "Almayer's Folly," which was published in the following year, and recognized at once among the few who care about

vital literature. Thenceforth Mr. Conrad became a professional author, but the atmosphere of his books remained the atmosphere of his adventurous youth. A Stimulating Personality. 

It was feared that, having entrenched in the line from Kalisz and Czenstochowa, he would await an attack, but it is now expected that the main blow of the Germans will directed towards the upper reaches of the Vistula.

For the complete overthrow of the invaders, it is, essential that they should advance as far as possible from their base of operations, especially at this season, when the roads are practically impassable. 



### BRITISH AND FRENCH TROOPS GERMANS DRIVEN BELIEVE VICTORY IS NEAR ON THE BATTLE FRONT-VIA PARIS, Oct. 2.-9:31 p.m.-A

thrill was in the air all along the extended allied lines today. The French and British troops who have been over a fortnight in the closest contact with the Germans felt that they had accomplished their hard task of preventing the Germans breaking through the human this meant eventual victory for the allies.

The lines of the trenches make the battle front appear like deeplyscarred fields. The allies, who quickly learned the lesson in burrowing, at some places faced the Germans within a quarter of a mile. Their field entrenchments offer admirable shelter from the effects of the German artillery, which consequently reduces their casualties and permits the allies to await in comparative safety the German attacks. which must be made across the open, and often at terrible cost, GERMAN FURY UNABATED.

The fury of the German onslaughts was unabated today, especially on the western wing; but their every effort was met with vigor by the allies, who seemed to vie with each other in throwing all their strength and courage against the attackers.

The scene of the most violent attacks changes day by day. The Germans, finding it impossible to penetrate the allied lines in the vicinity of Rheims and Soissons, quickly transported many of their divisions farther northwest, and today hurled them against Roye. Again they failed, although tonight they had not ceased their efforts to batter down the resistance.

The allies' great turning movement continued today, and their western wing extended toward Arras.

HUNDREDS OF GERMAN PRISONERS. Reports from the other end of the line on the frontier show the progress of the allies to be slow but sure. Hundreds of German prisoners fell into the hands of the allies at every point, and it was remarked that among them the majority were Bavarians, who seem to have been prominent in the front of the German attack. 

Unemployed persons who apply to the committee are referred to the employment bureau, and, where possible, work is secured for them, but in many cases no work is available, and in those cases the application is submitted to the chairman of the relief committee, who must decide whether under the terms of the constitution re-

lief can be given. . Hard To Determine. Up to the present no relief has been given out of the funds at the committee's disposal the difficulties the way of determining that unemployment and consequent distress are the direct result of the war being almost in surmountable. Then the real diffi with the progress made by Canadian culty crops up. The employment bureau refers the applicants to one or other of the charitable institutions but practically all of these are without funds except in the case of the Vin cent de St. Paul organization, which is in a position to talle care of distress amongst the Roman Catholics of the city all through the winter; and this lack of funds is attributable indirectly, according to those interested, to the patriotic fund campaign.
