The act respecting the department of education provided for the appointment of a superintendent of education and the establishment of an advisory council subject to the Minister of Education. The superintendent will have general supervision over all classes of provincial high, public and separate schools, art schools, public libraries and all inspectors. He may make recommendations to the minister on any matter arising out of this supervision.



LEOF : STATESMAN 8 AND REPROBATE

to the Chicago Tribune.] London, April 10.-Yesterday King Leopold celebrated his 71st birthday, infirm as far as health is concerned, but still in the full enjoyment of that keenness of intellect which has won for him the reputation of being the cleverest and most astute man of business of old world royalty. While his private life has been beneath rather "When St. Patrick banished the than above reproach and has contributed to rob his old age of those domestic affections and of the popular respect and veneration which he would otherwise enjoy, it cannot be denied that as a sovereign he has an immense claim upon the gratitude of his subjects, having in every way fostered the trade and industry of Belgium, thereby increasing her prosperity and her economic importance in an altogether phenomenal fashion. He has by his statecraft won for Belgium in the concert of nations a position altogether out of proportion to the smallness of her area and of her population, and has moreover, to all intents and purposes, invested her with the possession of an immense colonial empire which differs from the transpontine dependencies of so many other powers in that it not merely pays its expenses, but yields colossal profits. Indeed, as a sovereign and from a Belgian point of view, Leopold has

been an altogether admirable monarch, and it seems base ingratitude that his people should entertain so little affection for him. The fact of the matter is, however, that he is the most unlovable character that it is possible to conceive. There is no pretense of any affection between his three daughters and himself. With his brothers, the late Count of Flanders, his relations were strained. He held no friendship whatsoever with his wife, the late Queen Henrietta, during the last ten years of her life, and only keeps up a sort of pretense of paternal regard for his nephew, the heir apparent, Prince Albert, who is

his antithesis in everything. Then, too, the King is intensely cynical, is disposed to sneer and to sniff at everything, and is charged with being devoid of a single spark of chivalry or generosity. The most incredible stories are told of his meanness and of his greed, and there has been little that is kingly in the sharpness with which he has been ready to drive a bargain in his personal business transactions. He was one of the few people who made large sums through his investments in the Panama Canal, and has money in all sorts of enterprises and undertakings in this country, as well as in China, Persia, Russia and on the Congo.

The management of his colossal private interests alone is sufficient to monopolize the attention of not but of several clever financiers, and yet he manages everything himself, as those who have had business dealings with him can testify. With all that he finds time to fulfill his duties as monarch of Belgium and as sovereign of the Congo. His death will be a great loss to Belgium in many respects. 


