# TO HIS DEATH

The Murderer of Father Leo Fights on Way to Gallows

ACTS AS A SNARLING BEAST

He Resists the Prison Guards, Who Hold Him Fast Until He Exhausts Himself.

Canon City, Col., July 15 .- Giuseppe Alfa, who shot Father Leo Heinrichs at the altor of St. Elizabeth's Church in Denver on Feb. 23 last, was hanged in the penitentiary here tonight. He

went to the gallows a fighting, biting, snarling bundle of humanity. The night noises peculiar to every penal institution had died away when Warden Cleghorn summoned the murderer from the cell and through an interpreter told him the hour of his death

had arrived. Alia stood for just a moment glaring he raised his head, uttering a series of Italian oaths and offered physical resistance against accompanying the guards to the gallows. He was held by

the warden's assistants until he exhaused himself by his efforts. Calling down maledictions on the Roman Catholic priesthood and shouting in Italian, "Long live Italy!" he was then carried to the death trap, which was sprung at 8:30 o'clock. Alia's crime, the murder of Father Leo Heinrichs, of the Order of Franciscan monks, at the altar rail in St. Elizabeth's Church in Denver while the priest was administering the Sacrament of the Eucharist, struck horror to the heart of every person in Denver and awakened anxiety throughout

the Catholic world, lest it should prove the beginning of a general plan of priest-murder. Alia had been in Denver several weeks, unemployed, and apparently penniless. Early on the morning of Sunday, Feb. 23, according to his story, he was aroused from sleep by the ringing of the chimes in St. Elizabeth's Church. He dressed himself hurriedly and walked to the church-He went, not with the thought of thanksgiving, for he declared, and many times repeated after his arrest, that the chimes recalled wrongs ex-

perienced in his native Italy, and at-

## INEW RULES FOR STOCK IMPORTERS

Ottawa, July 15 .- On July 16 there came into effect new regulations regarding the custom entry of animals imported into Canada for the imprevement of stock. Heretofore all certificates of registration which were apparently genuine were accepted by custom officers for the purpose of free


