





Dress your character-not your fig-

This is the first rule for the woman who would be well gowned.

It is not likely to be followed by very many women, because it requires much thought to THINK OUT your glothes. And it is easier to spend money than brain force!

The many things to remember are the time, place and the circumstances of your wearing.

One of the reasons we see so many ill-dressed women is that they buy things because they look pretty as displayed in the stores, and then they wear them for no other reason than that they have them in their closets. No great actress-or mistress of the

art of dress-would be guilty of this. Each of them thinks out sartorially the character she is to represent. Then she has photographed her creation on the mind of her audience before she speaks a single syllable. She has made herself an individual!

Every woman's dress IS more or less symbolic of her nature, and she tells ofttimes more about her real self than she thinks!

For instance, the woman who wears ANYTHING at all because she thinks it is stylish is very apt to be pleasureloving, luxurious, and lazy.

The woman who always wears a style just as it has become so popular that it is being dropped by the most fashionable, is a woman of timid, conventional temperament who rarely does the right thing at the right time, no matter how much she desires to do so.

LIGHTWEIGHT CRACKS WILL MEET TONIGHT

McFarland and Britton Both Confident of Winning in New York Bout.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, March 7 .- In order to watch the workings of the New York State boxing law at close range, Gov. Dunne of Illinois and a party of legislators from that state are visiting New York today. Packey McFarland, known in Chicago as the pride of the stockyards, is to box Jack Britton, also of Chicago, in Madison Square Garden tonight, and the Illinois executive and lawmakers considered this as good a time as another to see just how boxing operates here under state supervision. A boxing bill containing many of the features of the New York law has been introduced in the Illinois Legislature. A few weeks ago McFarland was sumonned before a committee of the Illinois Fegislature, and with a sparring partner the lightweight demonstrated how innocuous the game of fisticutifs had become under scientific handling. boxing law at close range, Gov. McFarland and Britton are trained to the minute, and both confident of victory tonight. Each man has an enthusiastic following, including many admirers from their home city, who expect to witness the bout. Arrangements were completed today for accommodation of 10,000 spectators

McFarland has never suffered a defeat of any kind in a glove contest. This record has made mm a favorite in tonight's bout, but Britton's skill has been developed since his former meeting with McFarland in Memphis two years ago, when the referee decided that their eightround bout was a draw, and Britton's followers declare that McFarland's confidence this time may receive a setback. McFarland is acknowledged in both camps as one of the most scientific boxers in the world, possessing dazzling speed with both hands and feet, coupled with quick thinking. He is 24 years old, and is said to have made a fortune of \$200,000 in his eight-year career in the ring.

Britton appeared as a boxer at about the same time as McFarland, but has taken much longer to show his ability. He is in his 28th year, and is exactly McFarland's height, which is 5 feet 8 inches. American Apple Growers Ship Fruit in Attractive Boxes, and Not Barrels.

SOLD 65 CAR LOADS

While Only Fifteen Shipped in Barrels Could Be Disposed Of in Moose Jaw.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Glencoe, March 6. - Farmers from all over the district were here for the agricultural meeting in the town hall yesterday. The keenest interest was taken in the addresses on fruit grow-

ing, and especially in apple culture. Mr. F. W. Kydd, of the agricultural department, Toronto, was the first speaker. He demonstrated the best methods of packing apples in boxes, with and without wrapping the fruit in paper. He said that box-packing was preferable to barrel-packing for several reasons. To compete with the farmers from the States and British Columbia, who are shipping in boxpacked apples to the west, it is necessary to pack in boxes.

Forty per cent of the apples coming into the west are from the States, and a duty of 30 per cent is paid on them. The reason why the Americans can successfully compete against the Canadians with their fruit, in spite of this duty, is, Mr. Kydd said, due to the fact that Canadian apples are not honestly packed.

Mr. Kydd advocated putting up Ontario fruit in a more neat and attractive condition. At a fruit fair in Winnipeg, he said, the best cherries from British Columbia sold for 50 cents per quart, while the best from Ontario sold only for 25 cents. The reason is that the Ontario cherries were not so attractively put up.

Caring for Orchards.






