MAY BE MITIGATED TO ALLOW

Representatives of Allied Nati ons Intend To Give Immediate Consideration To Question-Supplies Would Go Through Territory Held by the Enemy.

Paris, Jan. 9.—The representatives of the allied nations here intend to give mmediate consideration to the question of mitigating the severity of the blockade of the central powers, according to indications today. Such mitigation, it is pointed out, would be granted in order to admit of the passing in of food supplies for Czecho-Slovakia, Poland and sections of Russia and other territory desired to reach and which cannot be reached except through territory which the central powers are holding.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS **NECESSARY AS FIRST** STEP TOWARD PEACE

Lord Robert Cecil Gives Opinion On Formation of a Society of Nations.

NAVIES FOR DEFENCE

Paris, Jan. 8 .- By the Associated Press .- Lord Robert Cecil, who has arrived here with the first section of th British peace delegation, expressed the opinion to the Associated Press today that the definite organization of a lergue of nations is indispensable as a first step toward the conclusion of that enduring peace and a satisfactory settlement of international problems which have arisen out of the war. which have arisen out of the war.

Lord Robert made it clear that his statements were personal views, and not an attempt to give the views of the British Government. the British Government.

"In my opinion a league of nations is recessive as the initial step in the peace negotiations," said Lord Robert. "It is not only necessary to insure peace, but also for the proper treatment of many international questions which must be considered by the peace congress. It is our business to give this league definite form here and now."

Lord Robert made it clear in his talk that he has little sympathy with the view that the peace congress may gradually drift into a proionged session which will ultimately become a league of nations without being definitely and positively organized.

Asked how far armaments can be limited by a league or nations. Lord my opinion, is probably the ult problem the peace conimpossible to prevent individuals carrying arms to protect themselves against outlawry. Laws against the carrying of firearms could not be enforced until the necessity for carrying them ceased to exist. So it is with the league.

"The world did not know how extensively Germany was preparing for war. She might develop another force under the guise of militia. These are the difficulties we have to face, but we must endeavor earnestly to secure co-operation between the powers represented at the congress in a broad policy of demobilization which will correspond with the yearnings of all peoples to be relieved from the burdens they have borne for these last four and a half years."





He expects that a change will be made in the act to allow all incomes from he investment of money in any industries to be legad.

DOUBLE PLATOON

Conditions Is Widely Approved.

From returns that have been made up to the present time, it is estimated that nearly 4,000 citizens have signed the petitions circulated by the city firemen for the establishment of the two-platoon system. LONDON, Jan. 8.—(British Wireless Service.)—According to a story sent by a special correspondent of the Morning Post at Archangel—which it is necessary to treat with reserve—the former emperor of Russia is still alive. The correspondent telegraphs:

"A friend of mine. Prince M—, who has just arrived here from Petrograd, informed me that he had a long talk with Grand Duke Cyril on November 18. The Grand Duke told him that he had just received a letter from Grand Duchess Tatiana, daughter of the emperor, who wrote that the empress and her daughters were still alive, and that the emperor had not been shot. "The Bolshevik officer who was ordered to carry out the sentence of death told the emperor that it was a matter of indifference to him who was shot. He had orders to produce a corpse—bullets in the head of a victim would make identification impossible.

"Count T——, who was present at the conversation, offered to sacrifice himself saving he causidered it was

The emperor protested strongly, but was overruled by Count T—— and the officer. The emperor escaped, but no one knows where he is at the present time.

An Associated Press dispatch from Warsaw, under date of December 24, gave Michael de Tchihatchef, a nephew of Gen. Skoropadski, as authority for the statement that the former Russian emperor and his entire family were still alive. Count Tatichev, the emperor's former personal military attache, was named as the victim who was shot instead of the emperor.
