Heres the biggest cheese. It weighs 12,361 pounds, and is five fet in the world ever came anywhere near being as big.

This record chese was made at Appleton. Wis., to be exhibited at the national dairy show at Chicago, Oct. 2 6 to Nov. 4. It cost nearly \$6,000 to make it, almost half a dollar a pound. Twelve hundred dairies contributed the milk of 600 registered Holstein and Guernsey cows, and to make the cheese just right the cows had to be milked at the same hour, and all the different milkings cooled to the same temperature. Thirty-two chese factories made the curd, which was all shipped to Appleton for the final process.
