### FLIERS MAKE READY TO START RETURN TRIP ACROSS U.S.

Lieut. B. W. Maynard, the "Flying Parson," Is Leading Contestants.

Mineola, N. Y., Oct. 14 .- With 12 of the 62 original starters safely accross the continent and preparing to start the return flight the first half of the army air service transcontinental race between Mineola and San Fancisco entered on its final phase today. By sundown it was expected that the majority of the remaining contestants would have checked in at two control stations. Only two of the fifteen original San Francisco starters still in the race remain to check in at Mineola. Five already have arrived and the other eight have been forced out along the route by accidents.

### LEPERS COMPLETELY CURED OF DISEASE

Honolulu, Hawaii, Oct. 4.— Correspondence of the Associated Press.— Announcement has been made here that complete cures of leprosy are being made at the Kallini Territorial Hospital in this city, and that within the past few months 20 patients have been paroled, without one recurrence of the disease.

Blood tests of the discharged patients have revealed no trace of the leprosy germ. Patients now under treatment are showing marked improvement. Chaulmoogra oil, which is obt ined from the seeds of the taraxogenes kurzii, for 50 years known as the specific cure for leprosy, was the only medicine used in effecting the cures, the oil having been perfected by a refining process discovered by Dr. A. L. Dean, professor of chemistry and president of the University of Hawaii.

### BOMB MANUFACTURER BRITISH TROOPS PUT UNDER ARREST

**Evidence Secured That Clears Up Recent Terrorist** Plots.

Chicago, Oct. 14 .- Federal authorities at Gary, Ind., where military control was established by Major-Gen. THE BALTIC FLARE-UP. A few weeks ago the Adriatic question threatened to plunge Europe into a new war. Now it is the Baltic question that holds danger of another struggle. The two cases are somewhat alike. D'Annunzio defied the Allies and seized Flume for the glory of Italy. Von der Goltz with the only considerable army in Germany holds the Baltic Provinces in defiance of the allied council. He has been outlawed by the German Government, but has paid no heed to this repudiation, and being a true Prussian will not likely be influenced by the hunger blockade the Allies threaten to enforce against Germany. Von der Goltz is determined at any cost that the Finns, Esthonians and Poles shall not retain the territory granted them by the Versailles conference, and to accomplish this has joined hands with Lenine and Trotzky in an attempt to seize Riga. Herein lies the great peril to Western Europe, for if the armies of Von der Goltz and the Russian Reds can sweep through the Baltic Provinces they will be in an admirable position for a campaign against Germany. Von der Goltz, as a real Prussian, has no regard for Bolshevism any more than he has for the socialistic government that rules at Berlin, but with the ruthlessness of his caste he is quite willing to use the dreadful weapons of Lenine if it will embarrass the Allies and bring fresh turmoil at home that will give the junkers another chance to rule. The whole dangerous business is another spectacular instance to prove that the old Prussian spirit of dishonesty and ruthlessness is still alive and that the allied

#### vigilance must never be permitted to slacken. NATIONALIZING THE COAL MINES.

If the nationalization of the British coal mines becomes a matter to be settled directly by the British people themselves, there might be better ways of doing it than by making it the issue of a general election, but even with all the confusion that method entails it cannot be charged that there is lack of information to guide the nation in arriving at its decision. There is a tendency today to contrast the output of British coal miners with that of American workmen engaged in the same industry. Like most hasty judgments of that kind some of the essential factors are overlooked. That confidence has unquestionably been sadly shaken in Great Britain. Hon. C. G. F. Masterman, writing in the Atlantic Monthly, on social unrest in Great Britain, says that it is not Bolshevism or Socialism or even the war itself that is responsible for the upheaval that is so evident. The real cause of it all he places in the "monstrous inequalities of fortune." While some few thousand persons divide between them some hundreds of millions of the national income, more than 95 per cent of the population die possessed of property so trivial in amount as not to be worth the cost of valuing for estateduty taxation." ### From Here and There

### STEEL EXTRAORDINARY,

Steel that may be driven through a piece wrought iron over an inch thick-that is hard enough to cut glass like a diamond, and yet so place in life save as instruments for grinding out flexible that it may be bent without breaking-is described in the Scientific American (New York, August 2), following the anouncement of an American company that manufactures all grades of electric tool steels. This steel, the manufacturer states, has a wide temperature range, as it may be heated anywhere between 1,650 and 1,950 degrees Fahrenheit, and yet give good results. We read:

"The steel seems to heve its greatest value when heated to 1,750 to 1,800 degrees, quenched in oil and slightly drawn. The drawing, it is stated, does but it not seem to affect the harness of the steel, but it helps the toughness. Many theories can be evolved as to just why this slight drawing is of such ance to this steel, but metallographically there is no evidence of difference between straight hardenening and hardening and drawing. The same structure can be produced as seen under the microscope, yet there is a great deal of difference between

the two heat treatments.
"A point emphasized is that the head of chisel made of the new steel will not sliver. It is also stated that the head of the chisel can be heattreated so that it may be filed, yet it will not break out or crack. It will spread, but it will not split, yet the top of the head does not take on a very glassy surface, and seems to have a grip on the hammer-face when it is struck.

"It is pointed out that metallographically the steel is peculiar. It seems to have a very fine structure, which is difficult to define. It may be a solid solution, which is generally regarded as ustenite, or it may be martensite. Ie seems under the microscope to have an appearance at lower magnification of the whole range of solid solution steel, yet it has the characteristics of none. Under high magnification of 1,200 diameters the structure appears to be somewhat like martensite, yet the martensite appears to be lamellar rather than the

usual 60 degrees marking. 





The resolution made public on Fri-day will appear on the order paper tomorrow for the first time, and under the rules of the House it is hardly possible that it can be proceeded with before Wednesday, as it is customary to give formal notice of the day on which discussion is to be commenced It is practically certain that when such notice is given the Liberals will ask for information as to the holders of the Grand Trunk stock to be acquired, the obligations to be immediate ly and ultimately assumed by the country, including those by the Grand Trunk Pacific receivership.





### AGRICULTURE

The Agricultural industry in Ontario is in a prosperous and thriving condition. Appropriations in 1904 amounted to \$475,-000; in 1919, \$1,675,000. Last year the value of the farm products of Ontario was \$550,000, 000, and the value of the combined farm assets was one and a half billion dollars. Within the last three years ten thousand farm mortgages have been paid off. Encouragement has been extended to every branch of the industry, education has been fostered, and social conditions have been improved. Agriculture has received the "earnest and unremitting attention of the

### HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Hydro is to-day the most ex-tensive public-ownership enterprise of its kind in the world Since its inception Hydro-Electric has saved to the consumers of electric power in Ontario over fifty millions of dollars. Hydro displaces annually 5,000,000 tons of coal. Hydro develops and distributes 350,000 horse power to over 230 municipalities, 175,000 domestic consumers and 6,000 customers for power. The Queenston-Chippewa undertaking will provide an economical development vide an economical development of 400,000 horse power, and the prospective ultimate development in the whole Province is over 1,000,000 horse power.

### **EDUCATION**

Ontario's educational system is designed to provide the efficient training possible for the boys and girls who are to be-come the future citizens of the state. Under the leadership of the Minister of Education no worthy expenditure has been denied to accomplish this purpose. Generous grants have been made for agricultural, technical and vocational training; returned soldiers are encouraged to enter the teaching profession; teachers' salaries have been raised and a superannuation scheme inaugurated. This year nearly \$4,000,000 will be spent on education in Ontario.

Ontario's public health service is not excelled on the continent. Public health education, child welfare, sanitary engineering service, and the free distribution of antitoxins and serums have conserved life and prevented epidemic. A scheme of pensions for mothers is to be established. The Provincial Board of Health supplied all the typhoid vaccine used by the Canadian troops in the war. This feature of the work has brought about a saving of over \$100,000 a year to the people of the Pro-

### HIGHWAYS

Good roads add wealth and comfort to rural life. The highway improvement programme of the Ontario Government is applied to both urban and rural districts. A complete system of roads, including provincial roads, provincial county roads, county roads and township roads, with a mileage of 12,500 miles, has been worked out and will be constructed. The entire motor license revenue, with a large amount added, will be spent annually on this work.

### WAR WORK

Ontario gave in men 232,895; in contributions \$54,532,188; to Victory loans \$540,465,550. Ontario provided 50 per cent. of Canada's war effort. The Ontario Government spent in war work over \$10,000,000; maintained in England the most efficient military hospital in Europe; furnished club houses for the soldiers in London and Paris; made gifts of food and guns to the Mother Country; made large grants to the British Red Cross, Belgium, Serbian relief and other worthy patriotic objects, Ontario's war effort has made the name of Ontario resound in every corner of the world.

As a war measure the Ontario Temperance Act was passed, suspending for the duration of the war the retail sale of liquor. The promise was given that as soon as the war was over the whole question of the character of the liquor legislation of Ontario would be submitted to the people by Referendum, and the will of the people would prevail. 


