## ATTEMPT ON LIFE OF **EX-KAISER IS RUMOR** IN HOLLAND VILLAGE TROOPS FINALLY RESTORE ORDER

Man Identified As a German Said To Have Made Attack.

REPORT UNCONFIRMED

Private Secretary To Wilhelm Declares No Trouble Experienced.

Doorn, Holland, June 19.—An attempt against the life of former Emperor William of Germany was made at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, according to persistent rumors here. It is asserted that William escaped without injury. A villager, at first thought to be a Belgian, but later identified as a German. is said to have entered the castle by the use of a false permit and then tried to kill the "kaiser."

M. Pereboom, private secretary to the former emperor, assured the Associated Press this morning that no attacks had been made on William of Hohenzollern.

Dispatches received on Thursday night reported a Belgian who succeeded in gaining admittance to Doorn Castle, the residence of William of Hohenzolthe residence of william of Honenzol-lern, had attacked the former emperor and wounded him in the jaw. Since that time the report has been current that an attack had been made, but no confirmation of it has been received.

The latter arose and grappled with his assalant and grabbed him by the lip, drawing blood.

By this time two companions of the principal in the robbery had appeared on the scene, and together the three bound the merchant with a cord which they had with them, gagged him with a heavy towel which they bound around his head, dragged him downstairs to the basement and deposited him on the floor.

## OF EXEMPTIONS FROM SALE TAX

Wheat Flour Among Free Articles—Exemption For Caps Raised.

OTTAWA, June 18.—(By Canadian Press).—A certain number of articles were exempted from the operation of the 1 per cent sales tax when the bill which imposes this and the new luxury taxes was put through the committee stages in the House of Commons today. Wheat flour, split peas and pea meal were among the articles of food placed on the exemption list, but the minister objected to adding products of wheat to the list, because this would include biscuits, patented cereals and other taxable articles.

Sir Henry Drayton raised the exemption figure for caps not made from fur, for boys and men, from \$2 to \$3, and on his motion the exemption made from taxation on wedding rings was limited to the plain gold variety. He explained it was becoming fashionable at society weddings to have wedding rings of platinum set with jewels. These should not be exempted. Suggestions that the exemption figure for furs should be raised were not accepted.

Real Estate Sales Free.

MAKE THEM PUBLIC.

Very few people will believe that the Government is justified in refusing to place before Parliament the correspondence that passed between Sir George Foster and Judge Robson over the latter's resignation from the Board of Commerce. The matter is distinctly a public one. No branch of the administration has so directly dealt with the people. In no sense can the correspondence be considered private. The letters are public documents, and the voter is entitled to learn of their contents. This is the ground which Commissioner Murdock takes. Mr. O'Connor is opposed to the letters being made public, but surely his view should not be permitted to interfere with this affair of the people. The public wants to know why the Board of Commerce has not made good, and there is every reason to believe the publication of the Robson-Foster letters would enlighten it.

### GOMPERS DEFEATED.

The American Federation of Labor's indorsation of government ownership of railways is a heavy defeat for Samuel Gompers. It is the first occasion since he has been head of the organization that his advice has been turned down. The explanation is that the federationists wish to win the friendship and support of the powerful railway brotherhoods by backing up the railwaymen in their demand for government control. In his humiliation Gompers will at least have the satisfaction of knowing that his attitude on the question is right, as abundantly shown by the stupendous rather sudden swamping of traditional standfailure the United States Government made of its attempt to run the country's railroads. Gompers knows not only that the idea is all wrong, but that the general public disapproves of it. By expressing a desire to help force on the people a system of government-owned railways that will benefit the railwaymen at the expense of the masses, the Federation invites the active

A TORY OUTCRY.

The Saturday Review is not at all optimistic about the state of the world and its prospects. It would not be the Saturday Review if it were. As a correct Tory journal it has always been panicky over the advance of democracy, and sees approaching revolution in any reform, confiscation of holy property in any tax on the rich. It was terribly upset over the Lloyd George budget in 1910, like most well-to-do old maids and dowagers. Now it is the extinction of the "servant class" that preludes Doomsday.

Here is a sample of choice old Toryism, naked and unashamed. The Saturday Review laments that

"We have lost our civilization, a far heavier loss than the financial losses of the war. The most famous civilizations of ancient times were based on the enforced servitude of men and women, captured in war. The type of civilization which has made England what it is was founded on subordination, the recognition of orders and degrees. Without the habit of deference, the recognition of superior inferior, concretely, without master and servant classes, there can be no civilization a we have known the term. The sudden and unaccountable disappearance of domestic servants has withdrawn the foundation on which the fabric of society rested. Burke called 'the inbred piety, good humor and integrity of the English race,' has been replaced by atheism, rudeness and roguery. Tribunals are set up to prevent tradesmen from robbing their customers; courts are created to try to make employers and workmen keep their bargains. which every man wishes to keep private, his exact pecuniary position, he is obliged to expose on yellow forms to the scrutiny of offi-

This is rich. The times are bad enough, and yet we could almost wish them worse if that would provoke the Saturday Review to make us still better sport. It is delicious to be solemnly informed that ancient slavery and modern snobbery are the base of civilization. Did Shakespeare write "Hamlet" because he had a servant or was himself a servant to his 'superior"; because he had, or exacted a "habit of deference"? What about Samuel Johnson's letter to Chesterfield? Did that show proper deference? And was Chesterfield or Johnson the truer type of English civilization? "Britons never shall be slaves" must be specially interpreted by the Saturday Review.

The reason for general pracy in business relations is not as much atheism or ever loss of deference to "superiors" as simply the ards for prices and wages. The questions, how much does a man earn, what profit is fair, are decided no longer by traditional standards, and a new solution of these questions is yet to be agreed on. As for the Saturday Review's wail over the showing up of bank-books, not many will see in that the end of civilization.

Why, then, should we not take a lesson from the Italians and acquire the shark-eating habit?

For the past five or six years the writer has been interested in developing a method for converting shark skins into a merchantable leather. As a result of this work, several processes have been devised which have been assigned to a company operating fisheries in the south. This concern alone expects to get up to a catch of 1,000 fish daily, although at present it is not taking this number.

food fish, who at present simply kill the sharks getting into their nets and throw them back into the water. By this wasteful procedure on the part of the fishermen at least 1,000 sharks daily are destroyed along the Atlantic coast. Thus not only is the skin lost to the leather trade, not only is a large amount of fertilizer material made unavailable, but at least 50 per cent of the weight of the shark which would be fit for human consumption goes to waste.

A conservative estimate based on the human consumption goes to waste.

A conservative estimate based on the above figures indicates that for a catch of 2,000 sharks daily, at an average weight of 200 pounds, there would be 400,000 pounds of fish. As at least 50 per cent could be used for human consumption we would have 200,000 pounds daily, or 7,000,000 pounds annually. For Orphan Children.

The rates for orphan children formerly stood at \$30 a month for the first child; \$20 for the second and \$16 a month for the third and each subsequent child. The committee has not altered the rate for the first child, but suggests the rate for the second should be increased to \$24 a month, and the third and each subsequent orphan in a family to \$20 a month.

In addition to a pension allowed to a man totally disabled, there exists a provision for a "helpless allowance" not in excess of \$450 a year. The committee recommends that the maximum helpless allowance should be increased to \$750 a year, and not less than \$250 a year should be paid in any case where the man can be deemed to be helpless as well as disabled.

Death Due to Service.

Heretofore, in the case of men who have been disabled and have died as a result of service, the pension board has been authorized to contribute up to \$100 to cover the medical and funeral expenses of the man, provided his family is not in a position to meet the same. The committee has extended this class so as to apply it to the death of all disabled men, no matter from what cause they may die. The added yearly cost of payment of dual pensions and of continuing pensions for life to children who are unable to earn a livelihood, to increase the helpless allowance, and to contribute towards the medical and funeral expenses of disability pensioners, will amount to about \$500,000.

There are scattered throughout Canada a limited number of men who were disabled in the Fenian raid, the Northwest rebellion and the South African war. The committee proposes to increase or supplement these men's pensions up to the rates paid under the





## LABOR CHOOSES **GOMPERS WITH**

Wilson's Son-in-Law Decides Federation Elects Veteran President For Thirty-Ninth Time.

PLEDGES OF SUPPORT

Workers Say Govt Ownership Resolution Not Repudiation.

MONTREAL, Jun 18 .- The American 'ederation of Labor again expressed its confidence in the leadership of Samuel Gompers, its veteran president, here today in its 40th annual convention, when it re-elected him for the 39th time and returned to office his entire administrative cabinet.

His election was practically unanimous, as the only delegate that voted against him was James A. Duncan of the Seattle Central Labor Council, leader of the Progressive wing of the federation.

The delegates gave the aged labor leader a tremendous ovation as he again assumed their leadership, declaring that 'I accept the call to duty, and I will obey." He was much affected by the demonstration of applause and cheers which continued for several moments. Not Closed To Progress.

After asserting that his "mind is no closed to progress, but would continue to attempt to lead the army of workers to victory," President Gompers denied a story syndicated by a news service to the effect that he "had suffered his

elected.

The convention tonight elected Timothy Healy of New York president of the stationary firemen, and Sara B. Conboy of the textile workers, fraternal delegates to the British Trades Union Congress. The convention then adjourned until tomorrow.

Support of Rail Workers.

The support of the organized railroad workers in the federation was pledged to President Gompers by Charles J. MacGowaa, who seconded his nomina-





## SPECULATION IN SUGAR BANNED BY GOVT. BOARD

Drastic Regulations Issued Governing Sale, Prices and Profits.

OTTAWA, June 18 .- (Canadian Press) -Speculating in sugar is now an in-lictable offence in Canada. The board than wholesalers, manufacturers or re-tailers; wholesalers from selling sugar to other than manufacturers or retailers; retailers from selling to other than manufacturers and consumers, and that in quantities greater than the normal requirements of trade and household, and all other persons from selling sugar in excess of the reason-able requirements of the buyer's house-hold. The profit which sugar dealers may make is restricted to 2 cents a

pound, or 5 per cent. The practice of advancing prices on stocks when refiners' prices advance is prohibited and the system is ordered of fixing the price of sugar at a profit of 5 per cent, based on the average

of 5 per cent, based on the average invoice cost of all sugar in stock at the time of sale.

Two Cents a Pound.

Two cents per pound over refiners' prices at Montreal, Chatham, or Vancouver, central points for the three districts of the Dominion, is declared to be the maximum profit. With the refiners' prices now standing at 21 cents or under, a retail price of more than 23 cents a pound is declared to be an unfair profit, taking on general sales and cases where the sale of one pound lots may involve a loss for the dealer a special price of 23½ cents a pound may be charged, or not more than 93 cents for the four pounds, or may require the purchase of two pounds, charged to the control of the taxleab. Before the day ended, shippers and industries resumed active competition for cash corn, and there was simultaneous broadening out of the demand for futures. Country offerings were not large.

HAMILTON MAY GET

More Than 1,265,000,000 Pounds of Latter in Storage.

Chicago, June 18 .- More than 1,265,-000,000 pounds of virgin wool have accumulated in the storehouses of the world since the beginning of the world war, according to statistics compiled by the National Sheep

cumulated in the storehouses of the world since the beginning of the world war, according to statistics compiled by the National Sheep and Wool Bureau of America. When the world's wool slip of 1920 is completed, a few weeks hence this amount will be increased by 2,500,000,-000 pounds, it is expected.

In spite of the high price of wool fabrics, the storehouses of America alone contained 700,000,000 pounds of virgin wool last September, ten months after the signing of the armistice, or 100,000,000 pounds more than the country annual consumption.

Chicago is attempting to force cloth manufacturers to withdraw virgin wool from the storehouses through the passage of the so-called "truth in fabric" bill, which is now before the interstate commerce committee of both Houses of Congress. The bill is designed to compel manufacturers to stamp "wool" cloth with the percentage of cotton or shoddy used in its manufacture. Shoddy is made from woolen rags, and is much less expensive for manufacturing purposes than virgin wool, which is wool that has never passed through manufacturing processes.

In discussing the situation, Howard E. Greene, secretary of the bureau, said: "The reason huge stocks of virgin wool are now lying in storehouses unmanufactured is that the use of unidentified shoddy enables manufacturers to make more money.

"Even the most honest retailers are unable to detect the presence of shoddy in 'all wool' goods, because shoddy is all wool. The purchaser buys his 'all wool' clothing without knowing that he is getting old rags respun, and pays virgin wool prices.

"The truth in fabric bill, when enacted into law, will make the manufacturers come out in the open and tell what their goods are made of. Then people who want virgin wool and are ready to pay for virgin wool can get honest cloth, and goods made of shoddy will take its rightful place and price and can no longer masquerade as virgin wool.


