ARMED IRISHMEN BATTLE FOR HOURS IN LONDONDERRY STREETS; TROOPS FINALLY RESTORE ORDER

Unionists and Nationalists Engage in Fierce Encounter—Many of Unionists Were Returned Soldiers—Large Number of Men Reported to Have Been Wounded in Fighting.

Londonderry, Ireland, June 19.—This city spent another night of terror last night as a result of violent pistol and rifle fighting between Nationalists and Unionists. There was a two-hour pitched battle at the riverside. Comparative quiet was finally restored by the soldiers. Many of the Unionists engaged in the hostilities were ex-soldiers.

Decision Is Made by Hydro Commission Following Labor Troubles. CAME AS SURPRISE Sir Adam Beck Declares the Undertaking Will Be Too Expensive.

Niagara Falls, June 19.—Following a succession of labor troubles, work on the Chippewa Canal of the Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission stops today. The commission has temporarily suspended the big development work.

AMERICAN DELEGATES MAY BE ADMITTED TO SEAMEN CONFERENCE

Motion Submitted at Geneva Convention To Be Considered.

The decision came as a surprise to the Niagara Trades Federation, and the workers in the various camps on the "St. Lawrence" canal, although Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the commission, stated he might take this course if a settlement of the eight-hour day and wage questions were not reached.

The significance of the closing down of the Chippewa canal is that the hydro commission seems to be considering coming to terms with the labor union and to desire to save the expense of building two or three hundred men maintained at the works in a state of readiness.

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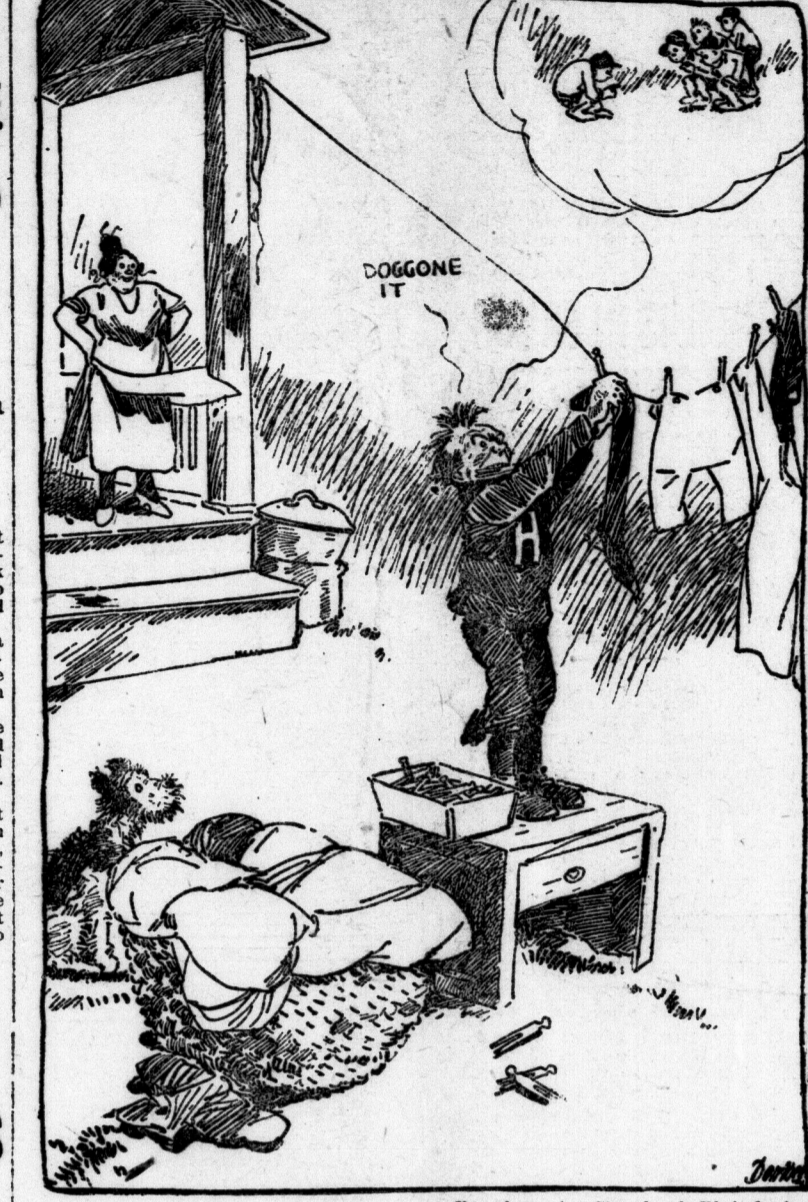

VALERA'S PALS DOUBLE-CROSSED HIM, IS CLAIM

Bitter Feud Prevails Among Sinn Fein Factions. SPLIT IS SERIOUS

"Friends of Irish Freedom" Worked Against the "President."

New York, June 19.—The New York Evening Post said editorially last night: "It is difficult to see how the split between the De Valera and Cohan factions in the Irish campaign here are removed by the Irish republican attack on De Valera's intrusion at Chicago. Various hypotheses for the failure of the proposed Sinn Fein planks have been offered. The Gaelic-American explains that Cohan's committee of the Friends of Irish Freedom drafted an 'immoderate' plank approving the claims of Ireland to self-government. But De Valera insisted on a plank pledging the Republican to formal recognition of the Irish Republic. A counter-explanation credits Cohan with convincing the defeat in order that the Democratic convention might bid for Irish votes. The bitterness of the Gaelic-American is equaled by the bitterness of a De Valera organ, the Sinn Fein.

### JEWISH BOYCOTT FORCES MEAT SHOPS TO CLOSE

Toronto, June 18.—A boycott by the Jewish people of those butcher shops from which they ordinarily buy their meat is being well cared for there. Of the 42 shops in the Jewish district only four or five are open. The boycott began Saturday night, when the Jewish people decided that an increase of 5 or 6 cents a pound for meat at a jump was too much.

### Told Jurors He Was Prizefighter; Got Six Months

Chicago Wholesale Grocer Admitted Intimidating Fellow-Jurymen.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Samuel Hadesman, local wholesale grocer, was sentenced today to six months in jail for contempt of court after he admitted intimidating fellow-jurors in a murder trial by telling them he was a prize fighter.

The jury disagreed and investigation later by the state indicated that Hadesman had refused to concur with the other eleven, who favored conviction.

**EXONERATED FROM BLAME.** WINDSOR, June 18.—Joseph Lontin, driver of the automobile which struck Sylvia Marchand of Tilbury North on Sunday last, causing instant death, was totally exonerated from all blame in connection with the fatality by a coroner's jury which conducted an inquiry.

### AUTO BANDITS TAKE \$50,000 IN DIAMONDS

Trio Rob Toronto Jeweler—Get \$5,000 in Victory Bonds Too.

TORONTO, June 18.—Three armed auto bandits got away with \$50,000 worth of jewelry, chiefly diamonds, and about \$5,000 worth of Victory bonds in Abraham Rosenthal's jewelry store here in broad daylight this afternoon and left Rosenthal wounded in the head and tied and gagged in his cellar. The robbery occurred between 6:15 and 6:30 o'clock, and the robbers made their departure from the vicinity of the store in a seven-passenger car.

The police claim that the trio were American crooks, but the only clues left behind are a Salvation Army cap, which one of them wore, and a handkerchief that is stained with blood which Mr. Rosenthal drew from one of the bandits' lips in a tussle which occurred before the merchant was overpowered and stowed away in the cellar. Had Closed Store. Mr. Rosenthal had closed his store for the day when the man who wore the Salvation Army cap appeared at the door and asked to be admitted. At he had paid three previous visits to the store in the last few days and made purchases the proprietor had no hesitation in opening the door to him. No sooner had the supposed Salvationist entered, however, than he drew a revolver and feigned Mr. Rosenthal with a blow with the butt end of the weapon. The latter arose and grappled with his assailant and grabbed him by the lip, drawing blood.

By this time two companions of the principal in the robbery had appeared on the scene, and the three men bound the merchant with a cord which they had with them, gagged him with a heavy towel which they bound around his head, dragged him downstairs to the basement and deposited him on the floor.

Then they went back and helped themselves to things in the store. They emptied trays of diamond rings and brooches in a bag, while one of the men took the Victory bonds out of the safe, walked out the front door to their waiting machine and whirled away. The police were not notified of the affair for almost an hour. A citizen witnessed the escape of the men and had noted that one of them carried a handbag.

**ENLARGES LIST OF EXEMPTIONS FROM SALES TAX**  
Wheat Flour Among Free Articles—Exemption For Caps Raised.

OTTAWA, June 18.—(By Canadian Press).—A certain number of articles were exempted from the operation of the 1 per cent sales tax when the bill which imposes this and the new luxury taxes was put through the committee stages in the House of Commons today. Wheat flour, and meal and pea meal were among the articles of food placed on the exemption list, but the minister objected to adding products include biscuits, patented cereals and other taxable articles.

Sir Henry Drayton raised the exemption figure for caps not made from fur for boys and men from \$2 to \$3, and on his motion the exemption made from taxation on wedding rings was limited to the plain gold variety. He explained it was becoming fashionable at society weddings to have wedding rings of platinum set with jewels. These should not be exempted. Suggestions that the exemption figure for furs should be raised were not accepted.

The House spent a quiet day, chiefly in the consideration of estimates, the departments of public works and mines being under discussion. A certain amount of progress was made.

**Real Estate Sales Free.** J. A. Robb strongly urged a tax on real estate sales, but the minister said that the proposal had been found to be difficult of administration. He would like very much to tax real estate sales if it was practicable. A number of members urged that jam and marmalade should be exempt from sales tax. They were more valuable foods than canned goods, which are exempted. The minister added split peas and pea meal to the articles exempted.

**Tax on Overdrafts.** The clause imposing a tax of 2c per \$100 on overdrafts was also amended. Under the amendment an advance will not be deemed to be outstanding under the fourth day after the account is overdrawn.

The bill was then reported and will be read a third time at the next sitting. The House sat till 8:30 to complete consideration of the bill, and then rose till 8:30 this evening.

### Another Oil Well Struck on Farm Near Thamesville

Pump Will Be Placed Over Flow On Boothroyd Farm Today.

THAMESVILLE, June 18.—The Inland Oil Company struck oil this afternoon at a depth of 270 feet about one hundred yards from where the former well was sunk on the John Boothroyd farm. The well struck today gives promise of being much better than the old well. It overflowed. A pump will be placed in position on Saturday morning. The old well flowed from sixty to seventy barrels a day for several days. Drilling on the new well stopped when the big line was reached.

### FIFTEEN SQUARE MILES OF FARM LAND RUINED BY BIG HAILSTORM

Area Around Clachan Laid Waste—Thousands of Dollars Lost.

ST. THOMAS, June 18.—An area five miles long by three miles wide around Clachan was devastated and left as waste lands, so far as this season is considered, by the big hailstorm which passed that part of the country recently.

The hailstones broke the windows in many farmhouses and barns and out-houses were overturned by the wind. Everything that was growing was levelled, and means the loss of many thousands of dollars to the farmers. The season is too far advanced to replace any of the crops which were looking so promising, so that the district covered by the storm must lay idle and untill the remainder of the year.

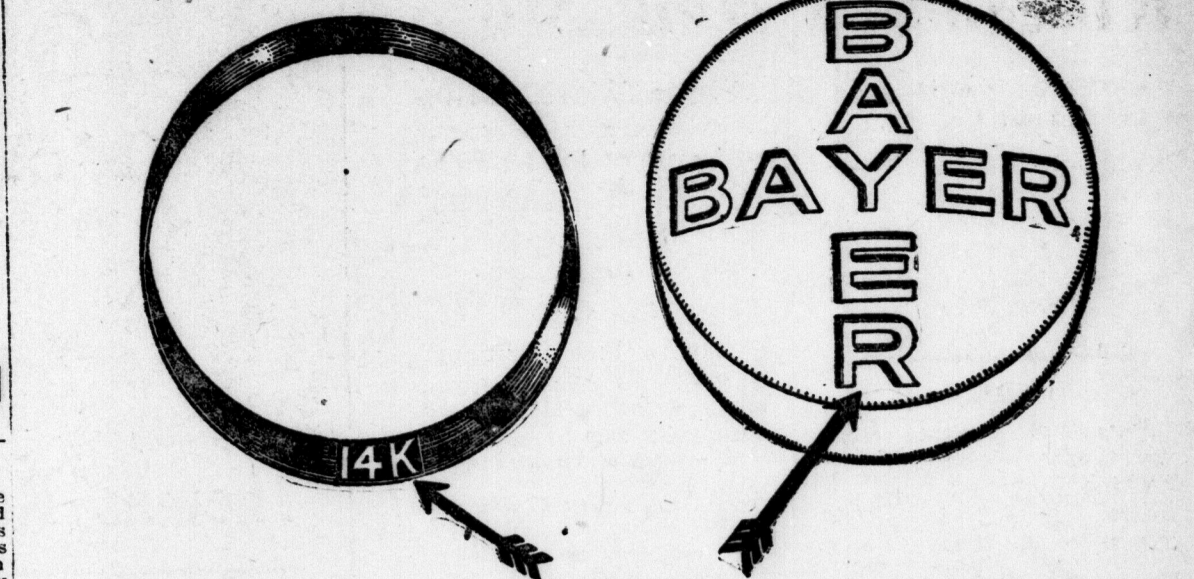

Presiding Bishop of Protestant Episcopal Church Scored in New York.

New York, June 18.—Rev. Dr. Percy Sticney Grant, rector of the Church of the Ascension and promoter of the use of churches as public forums, is described as the "pampered pet of a group of rich men and women" by Right Rev. Nelson, registrar of the Episcopal Church in the New York Diocese, makes a statement to the effect that Dr. Grant "sounded a false alarm" last Sunday when he denounced from his pulpit "Will the Episcopal Church split in two?"

GANG ATTACKS YOUNG COUPLE; HELP COMES

While passing a lonely spot between Hamilton road and Trafalgar street, on Highbury avenue, which lies in the eastern outskirts of the city, a young man and his lady friend were attacked and dragged from the street on Tuesday night by a gang of ruffians, who were lying in wait among some bushes. The screams for help aroused some farmers living near. They arrived on the scene just in time to rescue the couple from injury. The spot is a dark, abandoned road, fringed with bushes and running from Highbury street and the city's boundary for a short distance into the country. The road is little used, as no one lives on it. The thick bushes which cover the road make an ideal hiding place for the gangs which infest the district. According to the people living in the neighborhood it is not the first time that passersby have been molested. They asserted that they knew of several occasions in which people have been attacked. As the road is public property no one but the county police can interfere with the men and boys who stay around there. Up to the present time the residents of that part of the county say that the police have made no investigations.

SHARK MEAT SUPPLY FOOD AND LEATHER Expert Tells Virtues of Much Maligned Denizens of the Deep.

From time immemorial the shark has been considered as an enemy to man and a scavenger of the sea. It has been pictured as the cannibal of the deep, and in fiction has been painted as the monster who lurks about the deserted ship in order to devour the unfortunate who may have met their death in the gulf on the reef.

The principal species considered a man-eater, the tiger shark, probably has seldom had the pleasure of this delicacy. Sharks, like all other fish, live on the smaller fish, the upholding the proverb that the big fish eat the little ones.

Sharks are found most abundant where food fish are plentiful. They are especially fond of the mull, menhaden, mackerel and sea trout. Thus it will be seen that the industry might have a few points in its favor.

Thus their diet of such times is not unlike that of our domestic hog and poultry. It is claimed by a fisherman of the coast that he will not eat shark food, which shows him even more particular than our friend the pig, for the fisherman will not eat his own food.

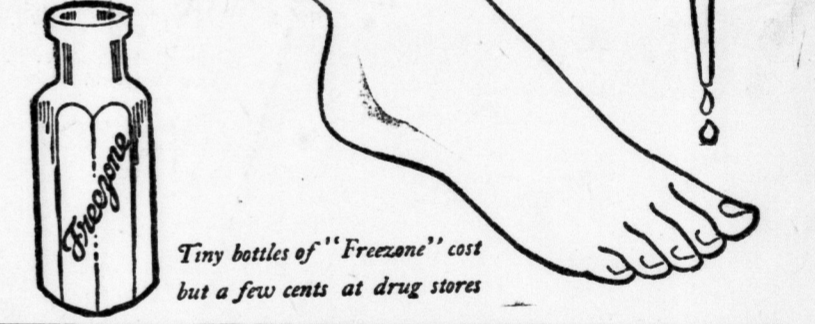

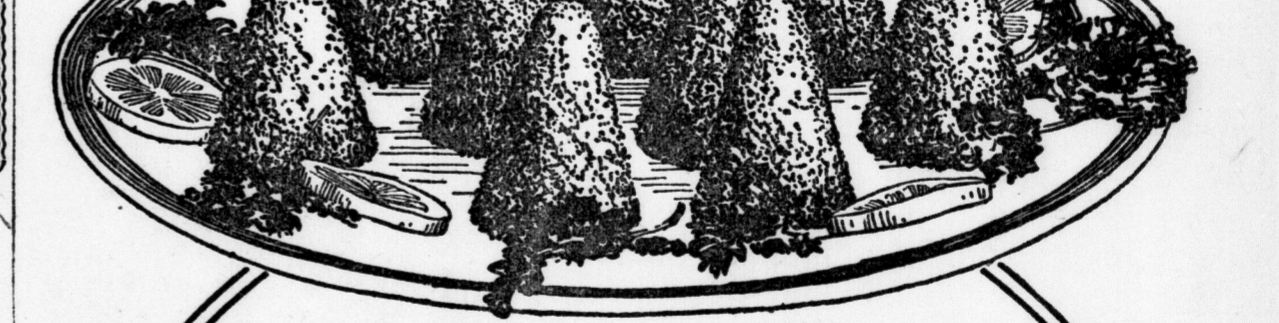

INCREASE IN PENSIONS AND GRATUITIES FOR DEPENDENTS IS SURGED BY COMMITTEE

Cronyn Reports For Special Committee Also Favoring State Insurance For Returned Soldiers—Pensions Increase Is Likely To Be Made by Means of Increased Bonus.

OTTAWA, June 18.—(By Canadian Press.)—Marked increases of pensions, state insurance for returned soldiers and the grant of a war service gratuity...

The main pensions increases are made by means of an increased bonus. The increased cost to the Dominion will be in the neighborhood of \$8,000,000.

Several important amendments to the pensions act are suggested. Pensioners with less than 14 per cent disability are given the option of commuting their pensions.

Pensioners under the recommendations are based on the 1918 rate. For those pensioners resident in Canada the bonus recommended is 50 per cent over the basic rate...

For Higher Ranks. The pensions applicable to those of higher rank than private also have been increased...

The committee confirms its opinion against granting a further cash gratuity on the basis of war service. The question of loans to returned men was considered by the committee...

The bonus recommended by the committee will not apply only to the totally disabled, but in a proportionate degree to those with less than 100 per cent disability.

Further Liability. The above increases suggested for wives and children will add a further yearly liability to the pension bill of the country of about \$1,000,000.

Up to the present time, under the present law the payment of a pension is only awarded to one of his parents, or if he had been maintaining in addition to his wife and family either his father or mother or both...

Pensions to Children. Pensions to children continue in the case of a boy until he attains the age of 18 and in the case of a girl until she is 17 years old...

There is at present no provision for continuing the pension beyond the age of 21, even when a child is mentally or physically incapable of earning a livelihood.

Death Due to Service. Hereafter, in the case of men who have been disabled and have died as a result of service, the pension board will be authorized to contribute up to \$100 to cover the medical and funeral expenses of the man...

There are scattered throughout Canada a limited number of men who were disabled in the Fenian raid, the Northwest rebellion and the South African war.

LABOR CHOOSES COMBERS WITH ENTIRE CABINET

Federation Elects Veteran President For Thirty-Ninth Time.

PLEDGES OF SUPPORT

Rail Workers Say Govt. Ownership Resolution Not Repudiation.

MONTREAL, June 18.—The American Federation of Labor again expressed its confidence in the leadership of Samuel Gompers, its veteran president, here today in its 40th annual convention.

His election was practically unanimous, as the only delegate that voted against him was James A. Duncan of the Seattle Central Labor Council, leader of the Progressive wing of the federation.

The delegates gave the aged labor leader a tremendous ovation as he again assumed the leadership, declaring that he would accept the call to duty, and I will obey. He was much affected by the demonstration of applause and cheers which continued for several moments.

Not Closed To Progress. After asserting that his "mind is not closed to progress, but would continue to attempt to lead the army of workers to victory," Gompers denied a story syndicated by a news service to the effect that he "had suffered his first defeat in the executive council, when he had failed to get the council to ask the Republican and Democratic parties to declare for light wine and beer."

The entire executive council which is President Gompers' cabinet, was re-elected. The convention tonight elected Timothy Healy, New York president of the stationary firemen, and Sara B. Conboy of the textile workers, fraternal delegates to the British trades union convention. The convention then adjourned until tomorrow.

W. D. Mahon, Detroit, Mich., fifth vice-president, and T. A. Rickett, Chicago, fourth vice-president, were unanimously re-elected.

W. H. Johnston, international president of the railroad workers' organizations, opposed Jacob Fischer of Indianapolis for Chicago vice-president, but was defeated by a vote of 18,195 to 17,329.

Matthew Wolf of Chicago was unanimously elected eighth vice-president.

Attorney-General Asks Hicks and Taylor To Tell What They Know.

RANEY TO TAKE HAND IN HICKS BRIBERY AFFAIR

Attorney-General Asks Hicks and Taylor To Tell What They Know.

TORONTO, June 18.—Attorney-General W. E. Ranev has written to Andrew Hicks, U.F.O. member for South Huron, and D. M. Taylor, U.F.O. member for North Grey, asking them to come to Toronto and make their statements to members of the Government about alleged attempts at bribery to influence legislation. If either Mr. Hicks or Mr. Taylor both decline to tell the Government what they know about the attempts at bribery which they have spoken of at U.F.O. picnics the Government will appoint a royal commission to investigate the allegations.

The attorney-general has a disposition to see the thing through, now that public attention has been focussed upon the Hicks and Taylor and their charges.

DEFENCE CLAIMS WIFE COMMITTED SUICIDE

Former Soldier On Trial On a Charge of Murder.

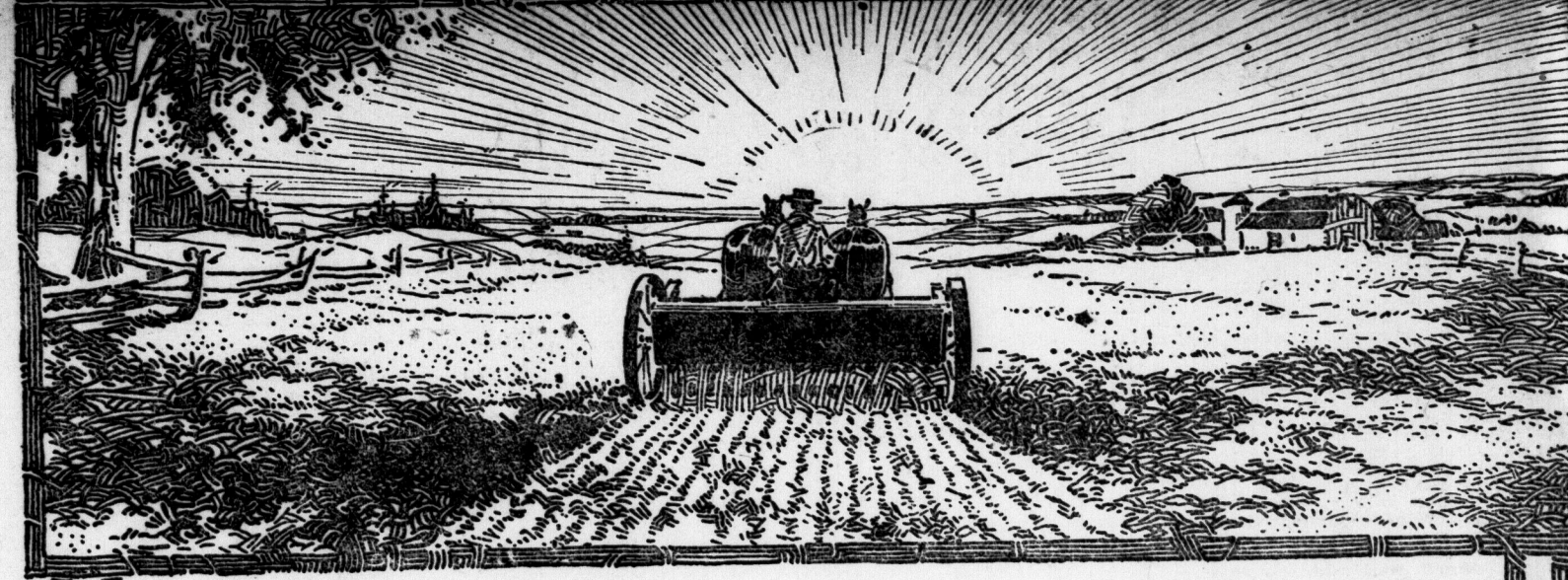

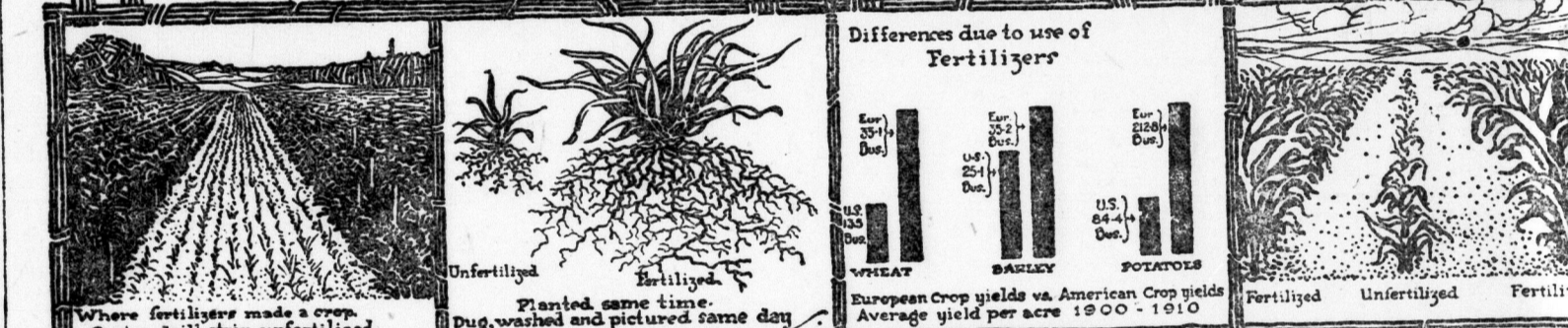

**WORLD IN SHODDY, WOOL IS HOARDED**  
More Than 1,265,000,000 Pounds of Litter in Storage.  
Chicago, June 18.—More than 1,265,000,000 pounds of virgin wool have accumulated in the storerooms of the world since the beginning of the world war, according to statistics compiled by the National Sheep and Wool Bureau of America. When the world's wool supply of 1920 is completed, a few weeks hence, this amount will be increased by 2,000,000,000 pounds, it is expected.

Chicago is attempting to force cloth manufacturers to withdraw virgin wool from the storerooms through the passage of the so-called "truth in fabric" bill which is now before the interstate commerce committee of both Houses of Congress. The bill is designed to compel manufacturers to stamp wool shoddy used in its manufacture. Shoddy is made from woolen rags, and is much less expensive for manufacturing purposes than virgin wool, which is wool that has never passed through manufacturing processes.

In discussing the situation, Howard E. Green, secretary of the bureau, said: "The reason huge stocks of virgin wool are now lying in storerooms unmanufactured is that the use of unidentified shoddy enables manufacturers to make more money."

"Even the most honest retailers are unable to detect the presence of shoddy in 'all wool' goods, because shoddy is all wool. The purchaser buys his 'all wool' clothing without knowing his shoddy is getting old rags respun, and pays virgin wool prices."

"The truth in fabric bill, when enacted into law, will make the manufacturer come out in the open and tell what their goods are made of. Then they will be ready to pay for virgin wool and honest cloth, and goods made of shoddy will take their rightful place and prices can no longer be masqueraded as virgin wool."

"The world produces scarcely a third less wool than it needs annually. With proper encouragement, farmers would increase their flocks of sheep, and that, in the long run, would mean more and cheaper wool and more and cheaper lamb and mutton. Every voter is vitally interested in honest cloth, cheaper wool and cheaper meat, and should write his congressman and senator at once and urge that the truth in fabric bill be reported out of committee and made into law."

**10,000 "PEG" CLAIMS IN NEW DIAMOND FIELDS**  
CHICAGO, June 18.—Ten thousand people, including many women, pegged claims in the new diamond fields at Taungas in Bechuanaland, South Africa, on opening day, according to a cable dispatch.

The district is 100 miles north of Kimberley in a waterless, treeless, nameless desert. Reports of its wonderful prices became rife when diamonds were found there several months ago. Fortune hunters and adventurers flocked to the scene from all over South Africa.

When the government's opening proclamation was read, the crowd was muzzled behind a flag line. A revolver shot started the race. The mob burst across the sands in a mad scramble. They fought and clawed and knocked each other down, while those behind trampled over the fallen. Some hired professional sprinters to do their running. One of these stumbled and impaled himself upon an iron spike. He died untended and unnoticed, and the gamble of claim staking went on about his corpse.

No diamond field was ever exploited at a more opportune time for quick riches. A bonanza market awaits all the diamonds found with an insatiable world demand at the highest prices in history. Digging began a few hours after the stampede was over, but no reports of success or failure so far have reached the outside world. The next few weeks will tell the tale. The Bechuanaland desert may prove a false alarm or a new Golconda.


**NEW ENGLAND PASTOR ASKS SUNDAY BALL**
