TAMMANY CARRIES **NEW YORK CITY**

Geo. B. McClellan Has a Majority Approximating 70,000.

BIG BILL DEVERY WASN'T IN IT

Pennsylvania and Massachusetis Go Republican, Maryland Democrat.

New York, Nov. 3. - After a remarkable campaign, in which there was united against him nearly all of the newspapers and practically every minister of religion in the city, Geo. B. McClellan, son of the civil war general of that name, was today elected Elected Mayor of New York by 70,900 third mayor of the Greater New York, over Seth Low, Fusionist, the present mayor, by the large plurality of about 70,000. Edward M. Grout, was elected comptroller, and Chas. V. Fornes, president of the board of aldermen. These two men were originally on the Fusion ticket and were indorsed by Tammany, whereupon the Fusionists took their names from the Low ballots and nominated other candidates. It was the nomination of Grout and Fornes by Tammany that caused Hugh McLaughlin, the veteran leader of the King's county Democto bolt and declare that he would not support men who were not Democrats. In spite of his defechowever, McClellan, Grout, and Fornes carried King's county The management of their campaign there was taken over by State Senator Patrick H. McCarren, when McLaughlin refused his aid. A sur-prise was the little voting for Wm. S. Devery, former chief of police, who ran on an independent ticket, which was given practically no support. The result shows a tremendous change of public sentiment since Low's election two years ago, when he won by 31,632. At that time he carried all the horoughs but Queen's. His plurality in Manhattan and the Bronx being 56,663, Brooklyn 25.767, and in Richmond 763. In Queen's, Sheppard, D McClellan carried Manhattan and the Bronx by about 58,000 63,000; Brocklyn by about 6,000-a gain of 3,000, and Queen's by about 5,000a gain of more than four thousand. This makes a total net gain for Mc-Clellan of about 103,000, as compared with Sheppard's vote of two years Low carried only one borough. The result was known early and

The campaign was one of the most interesting in the history of New York city. From the day Mayor Low was renominated, his supporters urged his re-election on the ground that no partisan question was involved, but that every man should vote to uphold the existing administration, because it had given the city a busi-nesslike conduct of affairs, and because it had done much to swamp out the "red light" evil of the east side. It was argued by Fusionist orators that the return of Tammany men to office would mean a "wide open town." TROOPS ARE WITH THE PEOPLE

A Squadron of United States War ships Are Hurrying to the Scene.

Panama, Nov. 3.-The independence of the isthmus was proclaimed at 8 p.m. today. A large and enthusiastic crowd of all political parties assembled and marched to the headquarters of the Government troops, where Generals Tovar and Amaya, who arrived this morning, were imprisoned in the name of the Republic of Panama. The armed.

The battalion of Colombian troops at Panama favors the movement, which is also thought to meet with the approval of at least two of the Government transports now here.

Washington, Nov. 3.-The following cablegram was received at the United States navy department at 10 o'clock tonight from Panama: "An uprising took place at Panama tonight. Independence was proclaimed. The Colombian army and navy officials were made prisoners. A government was to be organized consisting of three consuls and a cabinet. It was rumored at Panama that a similar uprising was to take place at Colon.'

Later the following announcement was made regarding affairs at Panama: A number of confused and conflicting dispatches have been received from the isthmus indicating rather serious disturbances at Both Panama and Colon. The navy department has dispatched several dispatches to these ports with directions to do everything possible to keep transit open and maintain order along the line of the railroad. The sensational advices from the isthmus were not entirely unexpected, in view of other advices that had come to the department very re-The reception of the news of American interests at the isthmus.

Orders have been issued by the United States State Department, through the Navy Department to the Divie which is now on her way from Jamaica, to proceed at once to Colon, and to the Boston, which is now at San Juan del Sur, to go to Panama. The Wyoming, Marblehead and Concord, which compose Rear-Admiral Glass' Pacific squadron, are under orders to remain at Acapulco for orders to proceed to the isthmus if the situation becomes worse. The Baltimore is now on her way to San Domingo, but because of the disturbed conditions will probably be ordered to the isthmus. The Dixie, it is stated, has 400 marines on board. The only advices received by the Navy Department stated that the Nashville had arrived at Colon, and that the situation is serious. So far as known no marines have been landed. In addition to the other order given above, late tonight orders were issued to the Atlanta to proceed at once from Jamaica to Colon. Calixte Duprat, of Chatham, and his sister Celina Duprat, leased to Narcisse Daniel, for the term of their lives, 50 acres of land in consideration of being granted maintenance. Subsequently to the death of Father Duprat, his sister brought an action to set the lease aside, alleging that as it was made on Sunday was not valid. The court holds that as there was a part performance of the contract before the execution of the document, and as it is, in no event, a sale of land, the plaintiff has no right of action. 




