

SYDNEY STRIKE

Trouble Between Men and Company Under Debate.

MR. O'DONOGHUE CRITICISED

Accused by the Opposition of Being an Organizer of the Liberal Party.

Ottawa, June 2. - The House settled down to routine business today, oroken by two or three items of more than usual interest. Hon, Sydney Fisher announced this evening that to encourage the exhibition of Canadian live stock and poultry at the St. Louis Exposition the Government were prepared to duplicate the prize money which was awarded to them. There are a considerable number of applications pending. The amendment provides that the bounty may be paid on ores mined and delivered at a smelter in Canada after July 1, 1903, and shall cease on June 30, 1908.
