Separate Schools and the Northwest.

The constitution of the Northwei Territories (since amplified by the Laurier Government) was granted by the Mackenzie Government in 1875. A reference to Hansard of that year will throw some light upon the school question, which has been forced on public attention by the proposed grant of Provincial autonomy. The Act respecting the Territories was introduced by Hon, Alexander Mackenzie, on March Hon, Edward Blake, then ar independent Liberal, said he believed was "essential to our obtaining that a general principle should be laid down in the bill with respect to public. instruction. To quote further:

"It seemed to him, having regard to the fact that, as far as we expect at present, the general character of that population (of the Territories) would be somewhat analogous to the population of Ontario, that there should be some provision in the constitution by which they should have conferred upon them the same rights and privileges in regard to religious instruction as those possed by the people of the Province of Ontario. The principles of local self-government and the settling of the question of public instruction, seemed to him ought to be the car dinal principles of the measure.

The Premier, in reply to Mr. Blake read the school clause, which he proposed to insert in the bill. It provided that the majority of ratepayers in a school section might establish schools and impose such necessary assessments as they saw fit; and that the minority of ratepayers, whether Protestant or Catholic, might establish separate schools and be liable only for the educational assessments they imposed upon themselves.

Mr. D. A. Smith, now Lord Strathcona, approved of the insertion of a school clause in the bill.





> The following is the text of the judgment in the case of Archer vs. the Sacred Heart, which was dismissed with costs by Moss, C. J. O., Osler, Maclennan, Garrow and Maclaren, J. J. A. It will be remembered that the plaintiff won her case in th assize court in London, but the Sacre peal was allowed.

"I think that the action was pr

perly dismissed as against defendant the Mount Hope Institute. That de fendant is clearly a separate corpora entity, incorporated by a Canadia statute. And with it as a separa corporation there is no pretense saying that plaintiff ever had contract or other connection w ever. And I think, also, for a s reason, that the action should h been dismissed against defendant Elizabeth Sheridan (superior of convent in London). Plaintiff never had a contract of any kind with her. The jury have by the verdict absolved her from all liability in tort, and the result must be that she, too, is entitled to be dismissed from the action. By the vow of poverty she (plaintiff) promised to divest herself of all her property of every kind, present and future, retaining absolutely nothing for herself. And by the vow of obedience she promised implicit obedience at all times in all things to the order whether reasonable or unreasonable or the superior.

"The plaintiff was not importune nor coerced, nor in any way impos upon by the society or its agents concludes the judgment in deali with the matter of the docume signed by Miss Archer in which agreed to forgo all claims against Sacred Heart on the payment by the latter to her of \$300.
