

THE MYSTERY AT DUTTON, ONT.

Many Strange Circumstances Surrounded the Death of W. C. Urlin.

lovernment Detective Sent for to Investigate-Post Mortem Being Held.

Dutton, Ont., Dec. 17.-In connection with the tragic death of Wm. G. Urlin, whose body was found in a chicken coop in rear of his residence, by his brother-in-law, Albert, who lived with him, about 7.40 last Sunday mornng, there are a number of mystifying curcumstances, and the case is one in which, in the interests of the family and public, the fullest investigation will no doubt be made. Crown Attorney Donahue, K. C., has written the attorney-general giving the facts as far as he can learn in regard to the case, and has suggested that it might be in the interests of all parties to have Chief Inspector John W. Murray investigate the affair.

On the one hand the facts point strongly to suicide, and on the other, there are circumstances which appear to require investigation and explana-tion. The deceased had been out of tion. The deceased had been out of employment for ten or eleven weeks past and was reported to be despond-ent and melancholy, and, in fact, according to the evidences of Hertel, he at times gave evidence of unsoundmind to such an extent as to cause apprehension in the family. He was not seen after 3 p. m. Saturday until 7.40 a. m. Sunday, when his dead found in the chicken house, and what is more natural to suppose than that the case was one of suicide? But when the body was taken into the house and examined by physicians was found that there were two bulnds from a 32-calibre revolver back of and close to the right ear, and back of and close to the right ear, and the physicians, Drs. Cascadden, McKillop and Long, without a thorough examination, concurred in the opinion that it would be impossible for a person, if he could inflict such a wound, to inflict two such wounds, because of necessity the first would be fatal. Then there were no nowder marks or Then there were no powder marks or scorching of the hair and flesh to indicate that the revolver had been discharged at short range, as would be the fact in the case of suicide. The revolver with which the deed was committed belonged to Albert Hertel, the deceased's brother-in-law, and had lain, so the evidence shows, in his trunk empty for a year, but when found under where the body of deceased lay, it contained two full and three empty cartridges, though there are said to be only ceased's body. What became of third bullet? The evidence take the one witness at the inquest w the effect that froth was froze deceased's face and forehead, while again report has it that the body when found was warm and that rigor mortis had not set in. Another mystifying phase of the case is the apparent absence for foul play. The deceased was only insured for \$2,00, and that was payable to his wife. In this case circumstances and apparent facts appear to be so conflicting that scope is left for all sorts of conjecture.



Two Hundred Boers Taken Oath of Allegiance-Canadian Casualties.

London, Dec. 17. - A despatch from Lord Kitchener, dated from Belfast, about half way between Pretoria and the frontier of Portuguese East Africa, received here to-day announces that Commandant Kritzinger, the famous Boer commander who has figured so prominently in connection with the invasion of Cape Colony, has been captured, badly wounded, by General French.

Kritzinger was trying to break the blockhouse cordon at Hanover Road.

London, Dec. 17 .- Gen. Kitchener reports to the War Office that Cols. Brander's and Dawkin's columns operating with each other, have captured Commandant Dadenhorst and fourteen other Boers at Starkfontein. He adds that the effect of this import ant capture will be good.

RETURN OF REFUGEES.

Johannesburg, Dec. 17. - Wethin three months 10,000 refugees are expected to return here. Permission has been granted to the mines to start a hundred new stamps weekly. The railway is now able to cope with the increased traffic. Eight new engines were bought in the last few months, and there have also been large additions to the new rolling stock. The Stock Exchange will shortly re-open The Star newspaper will start after January 1. The registry of the Supreme Court will open in January for the issuing of writs. The court will sit in March.

MUSIC IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Of the 100 representative musicians from whom the Public School Music committee received answers as to the best system of music to be taught in the public schools, 39 favored the teaching of staff notation only, and 61 favor the system now followed in the schools ,viz., the tonic-sol-fa in the junior class and the staff notation in the senior grades. Three of the 61 favor making the transition from ton-ic-sol-fa to staff notation somewhat earlier, and 39 favor making it later.

The committee recommnds: That he tonic-sol-fa be taught to the end of the junior second book; that the two systems be taught concurrently from the beginning of the senior second to the end of the junior third; that the staff notation be taught from the beginning of the sen-ior third to the end of the school course.-Toronto Telegram.

The Planet is an ardent admirer of the results obtained from the tonicsol-fa system in the public schools where it is sonscientiously taught. And this great home journal believes, as before stated, that the study of singing should be taken up in a proper manner in the Maple City schools. We do not believe in the advisability of engaging a special music teacher whose visits might be conducive to occasional disorganization of class work, but we believe Inspector Park would act wisely in allotting regular spaces in the school time-tables for this important branch of education and accomplishment,





CURIOUS AND ENTERTAINING HIS-TORY OF THE HAGUE.

King of the Romans" Was the Founder -It Was First a Chateau Surrounded by a Hedge-Existence at the Chateau Was, However, Not Always Peaceful, and There Were Fierce Struggles From

The Hague was born of a mere price of Count William II., "King of the Romans," who, in 1250, in rder to have a suitable resting-place between Haarlem and his property of S'Gravensande, built a chateau which ne closed off from the surrounding lorest by a hedge whence we have the "Den Haghe" given to the sidence of the "lords of the land." Originally the chateau attracted nerchants and workmen who earned their living from the life within the walls of the domain, which was not only a hunting box, but under the rule of the house of Bavaria, a cenof pleasure and distraction, where festivals of long duration were organized and endless games played; where skating during the long severe winter was indulged in by the nobilty. During carnival time there were great masquerades, in which the luchesses themselves took part, in 1394, under the direction of Lady Alide van Houschesen, the first chamber of rhetoric was founded in

the royal manor. always peaceful, however, was the existence of the chateau, for it was frequently disturbed by the fierce struggles that divided the country, and in 1392 was the scene of the murder of Domoisle Aleida, daugher of Jan van Peolgeert and misress of Duke Albert, brother of Wiliam V. Under the Government of Jacqueline of Bavaria the chateau fell to ruins and the court passed the most of its time elsewhere, a circumstance that seemed to mark the decadence of the city. The house of Burgundy, however, restored the old and in 1432, in the manor, and in 1432, in the great hall, the first assembly of the States was held. The second took place there also, in 1456, the 25th anniversary of the founding of the Order of the Golden Fleece was held there. In 1566 The Hague took an active part in the religious revolution, and two of its leaders, Adrian Monick and Dick Joosten, with the consent of the magistrates, entered the Church of St. James and destroyed all the statues, the church, after the aising of the siege of Leyden, pass-

ng into the hands of the Reformers. During the first year of the with Spain the States-General held sessions in different cities, 1581 it sat in the great hall of the knights to sign the act declaring Philip II. no longer sovereign and to withdraw its oaths of allegiance. Afer the death of William the Silent the States-General decided to meet regularly at The Hague, and the residence of the old "seigneurs" became the centre of the nation's activity. In the eighteenth century that picturesque row of rambling buildings known as the Binnenhof was enlarged to contain a residence for the stathouders, and it was from the Binnenhof that William V. fled the revolution and French invasion to take refuge in England, where he died in 1808. In 1806 Louis Bonaparte came to live in the stathouders, but in 1808 transferred his resi-

dence to Amsterdam. From the sixteenth century down to the present day, therefore, Hague has been the political capital of the States-General, and in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries was the scene of most important diplomatic transactions. time when Louis Bonaparte was King of Holland the jealousy of the other Dutch towns had deprived The Hague of any representation in the States-General, and so it continued to be the largest village of Europe until Louis Bonaparte finally granted

it all the privileges of a city. In 1880 the royal residents only numbered 56,000 souls. In 1899 had 206,023 inhabitants, and is steadily increasing in extent, stretch-ing out into fine suburbs with broad avenues and imposing resi-

dences. In the midst of the woods to the northeast, and a mile and a half from the centre of the city, is the Huis Ten Bosch House of the woods, an unassuming but very picturesque place, belonging to the Queen, approached through the heavily-wooded Benoordenhoutsche Weg, and nestling in the midst of the woods. It is a house with a history-built in memory of Frederick Henry, Prince of Orange, by his widow, Amalia van Solma. The Prince was the stat-houder from 1625 to 1645, under whose presidency the unity of the Dutch republic became consolidated and prosperity of the States reached its climax.

The famous "orange room," where the sittings of the International Peace Conference were held, is situa-ted under the cupola, by which it is lighted. The walls and ceilings are ablaze of color and form a series of huge paintings, which took the pupils of the great Peter Paul Rubens nine years to execute. They depict the life of Frederick Henry the principal wall being covered with allegorical work, by Jordaens, representing the triumph of youth over vice, sickness and all the enemies of early years, as well as the Prince's

triumph over the Spaniards. One of the groups represents peace, while in the centre of the lofty cupola is a finely executed painting of the Prince's widow. The Prince's father, William the Silent, is here represented by a grim skeleton standing behind his son and guiding

QUEER METHODS USED IN HUNTING FISH AND FLESH.

The Way In Which Malays Kill Sharks by the Thousands - Two Schemes For Trapping Tigers-The Python and His Pig Dinner.

If you were handed a fish, a dog and a strip of bamboo and bidden to kill a ten foot shark with these crude implements, the odds are that you would decline the unequal contest. Nevertheless the Malays annually kill thousands of these voracious monsters by this means without incurring the slightest risk.

The method is as follows: The bamboo is split into a strip measuring about four feet in length by one inch in width. Having been well charred at each end and pointed, it is coiled into the smallest possible space and sewed into the fishskin. The dog is next killed, trussed and his interior cavity refilled with the delusive fishskin. Forthwith Jack Shark swallows the

dog at a gulp, and his doom is sealed. Three or four days later, when he has digested the dog and the fishskin, the bamboo flies apart and gradually penetrates the great brute's side with fatal effect. It is not pretty sport, but it is marvelously effective and absolutely safe. Were you handed a piece of meat, a bundle of leaves and a pot of birdlime you would scarcely feel yourself a match for a Bengal tiger, but the little Bengal-

ese are particularly successful in catching Mr. Stripes with these crude implements The meat is first of all tied to the bough of a tree some twelve feet from the ground. The leaves, which are the size of large plane leaves, are next smeared with the birdlime and thickly strewn, sticky side uppermost, beneath the bough. Mr. Stripes, perambulating past, smells the bait and makes a leap for it. He misses for the very good reason that it has been purposely placed a couple of feet higher than he can reach. Again and again he springs for it, and each time he alights upon a fresh lot of eaves, which stick fast to his huge feet.

Now he notices them and starts to try to lick them off, with the result that he transfers them from his claws to his face. He gets impatient, the lime gets into his eyes and makes them smart, and he redoubles his efforts, only to redouble the number of leaves. Finally he loses his temper and, half blinded with rage, fear and birdlime, rolls over and over until he looks like a jack in the green. Then, when he is no longer capable of rational resistance, the wily native emerges and

jabs him in some vital part. Sometimes, however, Mr. Stripes is des-tined for some great menagerie. Then the procedure is different. 



Unildren Cry tor CASTORIA THEY HAVE NO INFLUENCE WHAT EVER UPON THE WEATHER.

Some Superstitions That Still Exist Upon the Subject-Moon Theories That Are Mere Survivals From a Past Credulity.

A belief prevails that the moon's phases and changes have a controlling influence over the weather, but so great an authority as Professor C. A. Young of Princeton has assured us that the moon has absolutely nothing to do with the weather.

Such a belief is in the strict sense of the word a superstition-"mere suryival from a past credulity. It is quite certain that if there is any influence at all of the sort it is extremely slight, so slight that it cannot be demonstrated with certainty, although numerous investigations have been made expressly for the purpose of detecting it. We have never been able to ascertain, for instance, with certainty whether it is warmer or not or less cloudy or not at the time of the full moon. Different investigations have led to contradictory results.

"As to the supposed connection be tween 'changes of the moon' and changes of the weather, it should be enough to note that even within the United States the weather changes are not simultaneous (in Kansas and Maine, for instance), as they should be if they were due to the changing phases of the moon. Since, however, a change of the moon occurs every week, every weather change must necessarily occur within about three days and a half of lunar change, and half of them ought to fall within about forty-five hours, even if perfectly independent.

"Now, it requires only a very slight prepossession in favor of a belief in the effectiveness of the moon's changes to make one forget a few of the weather changes that occur too far from the proper time. Coincidences enough can easily be found to justify a pre-existing belief."

From a very remote antiquity, in the twilight of natural astrology, a belief arose that changes in the weather were occasioned by the moon. That the belief still exists is clear to any one who is acquainted with current literature and common folklore. In fact, it just be admitted that even intelligent and well informed people have been

known to accept the theory. The idea that the weather is affected by the changes in the moon is still held with great vigor in England, and one of our proverbs is, "So many days old the moon is on Michaelmas day, so many floods after." If it rains on St. Swithin's day, we are told to expect rain for forty days after. An equally wise prediction is that if Christmas comes during a waxing moon we shall have a very good year, and the nearer to the moon the better, but if during a waning moon a hard year, and the nearer the end of the moon so much the worse.

Another belief is that the condition of the weather depends upon the day of the week on which the new moon chances to fall. New moon on Monday. or moon day, is everywhere held as a of good weather. Friday's new moon is much disliked, while Saturday

is unlucky for the new and Sunday for the full moen. In Scotland the farmers believe that a misty moon is a misfortune, and an

agricultural maxim among them teaches that If the moon shows like a silver shield,

You need not be afraid to reap your field, But if she rises haloed round Soon we'll tread on deluged ground.

Another weather guide connected with the moon is that to see "the old moon in the arms of the new moon" is reckoned a sign of fair weather, and so is the turning up of the horns of the new moon. In this position it is supposed to retain the water which is imagined to be in it and which would run out if he horns were turned down.

he country people in Scotland foretell the changes of the weather from the changes in the appearance of the new moon. If she "lies sair on her bac..," it is a sure sign of bad weather, or when her horns are pointed toward the zenith.

At Whitby when the moon is surrounded by a halo with watery clouds the seamen say that there will be a change in the weather, for the "moon dogs" are about. There is also a belief prevalent among sailors and seafaring men that when a large star or planet is seen near the moon or, as they express it, "a big star is dogging the moon," this is a certain sign of stormy weather.-Exchange.


