PROGRESS OF THE WAR
[September 14 to September 20]
No event of outstanding importance in the war distinguished the week under review, which was nevertheless one of much activity on several fronts.

THE CALL TO ARMS
SERGEANT BILL O'DELL, a returned war veteran, and a party of eight men, are erecting a pile on Chamcook Mountain for the beacon light that is to blaze out on Monday night next, September 25, to call to the colors of the 226th Battalion all the eligible and have not previously enlisted. Similar beacons will be lighted the same night on conspicuous hill summits in other parts of the Province so that the whole Province will see the fiery summons to arms; and in each of the Shire Towns on that night speeches will be made in aid of recruiting.

LETTERS OR PARCELS TO WAR PRISONERS
Owing to difficulties experienced in sending letters and parcels to Canadian prisoners of war Germany the Post Office Department has issued revised instructions regarding the dispatching of mail to Germany. Postage need not be paid on either letters or parcels. Regarding rules as to letters the department reiterates that letters must be left open and should not exceed in length two sides of a sheet of notepaper, and on no account must the writing be crossed. Post cards are preferred to letters, and if the former are sent they must not contain views of warships, camps, docks, birdseye views, and any conspicuous landmarks. Communications should be confined to family news and no reference to the naval, military or political conditions are allowed. Parcels must not contain letters, but outside of that there is no restriction as to contents of parcels so long as they are intended for the benefit of the addressee. No parcel should exceed 11 pounds. Long strong board boxes, tin boxes, strong wooden boxes and several folds of strong packing paper are recommended as coverings; the address should be as follows:

LUMBER OVER THE COUNTER

Before this is done care should be taken to see that chimneys and stovepipes are in good repair, thoroughly cleaned, and rendered safe from fire. Owing to the dampness of the early summer, many stovepipes will be found badly rusted, which an outer coating of enamel will not expose. Examine these carefully and replace defective pipes. Fire prevention is one of the first considerations of the householder.

METEORS ONLY MESSAGES FROM VAST OUTER WORLD

WASHINGTON, July 28.—In considering the wonders of the universe, have you ever realized how conspicuous among them are the meteors, those wonderful messengers, dropped from the sky, for us to wonder at and study?

HOUSE TEA "is good tea"

These phenomena are due to the rapid passage of the objects through the air, and a consequent rise in temperature, sufficient to produce fusion of the outer surface and even ignition, thus giving rise to the thin, dark, glass-like crust which is found to cover all stony meteorites.

We have little to guide us in estimating the speed at which a meteorite reaches the earth, and its consequent power of penetration. The velocities as given by various observers vary between two and forty-five miles a second.
