

It is announced semi-officially from Berlin that Dr. von Kuehlmann, the foreign BRITISH AND ARABS secretary has gone to Bucharest to discuss peace with a Roumanian emissary and therefore resumption of negotiations with the Bolsheviki will have to be postponed. Leon Trotzky, the Bolsheviki foreign minister, is reported to have left Petrograd for Dvinsk to seek an early conference with the Germans.

HUNS PRESSING ON

Bolsheviki resistance seemingly depends on whether the Germans will accept readily the capitulation of the government. It is apparent, however, that the Germans, with the Roumanian negotiations as an excuse, are going to push their campaign in the Baltic provinces before answering the Russians. In the region east and north of Dvinsk and along the Gulf of Finland, the Germans have advanced further than in the south, where east of Minsk, they are nearing the line of the Beresina, in crossing which, in 1812, Napoleon suffered a serious defeat while retreating from Moscow.

GUERILLA WARFARE

With the regular army and navy seriously demobilized, the Bolsheviki leaders are placing their faith in the Red Guards and guerilla warfare by the inhabitants of the placing their faith in the Red Guards and guernia warrare by the inneeded districts.
