OTTAWA NEWS.

Mr. Dawson intends to move for correspondence relating to the substitution of new names for ancient and historic ones in the North West Territories.

Mr. Bechy will introduce a bill to prevent and punish wrongs to children.

Mr. Donville's wrath is not appeased and he intends rising to another question for privilege this p. m.

The Tibbits-Glasier claims are likely to occupy the attention of the Senate in a short time, Senator O'Dell having given notice that he will move for the appointment of a select committee to enquire into the circumstances connected with, and the cause of, the non payment of a debt devolving upon the Dominion Government by the British North America Act and now due to the Hon. Benj. Beveridge, James Tibbits and others, the liability for which appears to have been acknowledged by various orders in council and payments made on account both by the late and present administrations, but no final settlement arrived at, and that the said committee be composed of the Hon. Messrs. Brouse, Lewin, McFarlane, Bureau, Brouse, Carvell and the mover, with power to send for persons and papers.

TO CORRESPONDENTS.

WHILE the Editor was absent the two letters which we published today were put in type, else they should not have appeared. The subject with which they deal, though both are written well, is not fit for newspaper discussion, in view of what probably will follow. Certain charges made through newspapers columns against anybody may be with propriety taken up and discussed by another newspaper; but when a newspaper charge takes the character of a monstrous and brutal crime, then the case is for the courts and the jury to deal with, not for the newspaper press.

When a grave crime was committed in St. John the other day, we suspended comment promptly at the request of other papers to deal with the matter, so that they would not be influenced by the sensational and the punishment due the guilty. The crime committed in a

Miramichi paper is so gross and so heinous, that before the Bar of justice it is the only place to bring it: it is a crime committed against the private character of a public man without any reason, actual or stated. It indeed it should not be dealt with there, then may the public look for justice being done in the columns of the Star.

The political effect of the matter our correspondents refer to. Will be a disaster upon the head of the responsible person. If the time should ever come, and God grant it never may, that religion should again be dragged from its sanctuaries to the political platform and that the man of the Catholics choice must be firm in faith, and steadfast in morals, it will be found we hope, that the Catholic people here, aided by their spiritual advisers, will have intelligence, perception and judgment enough within their own body to select that man: but should the day come, when the corporality of the Catholic church shall be deemed ignorant and so factious that she can not of herself choose her man, then pray Heaven, that getting advice from outside, they may get it of some pure, moral and worthy Protestant, who recommending a man for his honesty, will be able to impress the Catholic people that he is honest himself, who recommending a man for his morals, will be able to show that his own life has not been immoral; and above all that in volunteering his services as a spiritual guide to the Catholic people, he is not heaping a gross insult upon that very people, and that those means which he hoped to turn to his own account, will not rebound against himself to his own destruction.

THE FIGHT AT GEOK-TEPE.

General Skobeloff's detailed account of the storming of Geok Tepe shows that the Russian assault was made simultaneously by distinct columns and the final breaches made by the explosion of mines. Several hundred Tekke-Turcomans were buried in one explosion. Hand to hand fighting with the Tekkes on the wall lasted over an hour, after which there was desperate fighting inside the fortress. The day was finally decided by the capture of the hill redoubt of Dengal Tepe. Over 4,000 corpses of the Tekkes were found inside the fortress. The trenches also were filled with corpses. A number were killed during the pursuit. Four thousand families were found in the fortress and 700 Persian prisoners.

The petition sets forth that the clothing was ordered by Col De Rottenburg, and was delivered and worn, but as the petitioner did not need the money at the time he did not apply for it until months after, when he was informed he was too late. The State ball at Rideau Hall, last night, was attended by over 600 guests.

D G SMITH AS CHAMPION OF THE CATHOLIC CAUSE.

DEAR SIR:—

In the last issue of the Advance D. G. Smith opens an unholy war upon the Hon. M. Adams, and has declared that he is the self constituted champion of the Catholic people.

O tempora! O mores!

Now, Sir, I hold that it is not necessary for D. G. Smith (who refuses to allow Mr. Adams the privilege of being a Catholic) to attempt to convince the Catholics of this County that he has any right for them or their religion, they having ere this learnt the lesson he and others took pains to teach, viz: that when anything is to be gained, they are willing to become sympathizers with their Catholic fellow subjects, but the reverse is the truth when any question arises which calls for a sectional war. I do not wish to take Mr. Smith to task about this as we are all too willing to undertake a war of this nature; but I confess that I dislike seeing him assume the role of "Fox" to catch the Catholic vote of the County in favor of some Catholic who is opposed to Mr. Adams (who he terms a "renegade," an "irreligious renegade," a "scuffer" at the Church and Her Clergy etc.) and whom he yet supported at the last election.

Now, Sir, Mr. Smith knew when he advocated the election and re-election of Mr. Adams during the year of '78, that he Adams was a man who caught the Catholic vote by pretending a love for Catholics, who when behind their backs he scoffed at and insulted, and who by doing so caught the bigoted Protestant vote amongst which I suppose was Mr. Smith's, (if he paid his taxes) and who during all this time was a free thinker, thereore a renegade to both denominations. Mr. Smith knew all this and yet advocated his election, and I wish to know just here, what excuse has he to offer to the public for this crime committed by him in advocating the election and re-election of a man so devoid of honor and manhood? and above all what excuse does he offer to the Catholics in whom he takes so deep an interest for allowing them to foolishly go on putting faith in a man who repaid their confidence by offering the deepest insult one can offer to a Catholic? viz. that of scoffing at his religion and his Church and Her Priests. But this is not the whole of the indictment. No! "He Adams also sold his County and his constituents by entering into an unholy alliance with the Youngs etc., determined opponents of his religion he thereby injuring the best interests of his County."

Mr. Smith knew at the time that the alliance was detrimental to the County, and to the Catholics in particular, and yet this good man, this lover of Catholicism sat quietly inactive, or if active, it was in the cause of Mr. Adams, viz: as he says by, "advocating his reelection without opposition," and his only excuse is: "I wanted to serve Snowball." Remember Sir, that he Smith was willing that the dearest rights of Catholics should be trampled upon, that the best interests of his County, should be ruined, that a renegade should take a seat in the Government, that in fact the County should go the way of the "Ass," so long as the political welfare of J. B. Snowball was conserved.

Now, Sir, I ask you and the rest of the public whether a man condemned out of his own mouth, of having committed the greatest political crime on record is one fit to choose a man as the Catholic representative of this County, and yet this is the manner in which Mr. Smith intends condoning to the County for his fault. He is going to offer a good Catholic. One who does not scoff and insult his Co. religionists when among his Protestant friends, one who does not defy the authority of his Church and Her Priests, and one in fact who is a Catholic in the most strict sense of the word, and who will have no interest at heart, but the good of his religion. But Sir, will the Catholics be willing to accept anyone offered by Adams? the man who knowing what Smith was yet advocated his election. I think Sir that the people having found that there is neither honesty nor honor in Smith will be very chary in accepting the person he so kindly offers as a sacrifice upon the altar of political preference. I think Sir that Smith has lost his equilibrium and we must forgive him, and do him the justice to state that his driving off to day will have no effect other than making him who has heretofore done the guise of a knave to appear in his true colors, those of an "Ass."

He declares to day that he was in favor of seeing the County represented by a man without honor or honesty if by he could see his master take his place at Ottawa. He was willing to advocate a policy detrimental to its best interests, to support a man who while using the name of Catholic to catch Catholic voters, scoffed at them when in the company of Protestants to whom he

pretends to be friendly, but was during the whole time a free thinker and therefore a renegade of both denominations. He was willing to do all in his power to further this man's interests, and place him in a position both lucrative and honorable, and for what? Why to obtain his silence at the Dominion election to be held soon thereafter.

Now Sir, these are the whole facts of the case stated by Smith, and yet he dares ask the people of this County to condescend to this conduct. I answer him that he who has once shown himself so devoid of honor and manhood, and who has been so exposed to the public without remorse and had men, to gratify his own or his masters interests, would again when opportunity offered sell again his County for a mess of pottage or the few points of Ottawa. No petty quarrel with Mr. Macdonald or Mr. Smith, will defeat Mr. Adams at the next election and his charge against Mr. Adams in connection with Crown Lands arises alone from malice, inspired by the fact that he cannot injure him one iota in the estimation of the public Mr. Smith knows that Mr. Adams has no more right to commence actions in behalf of the grantees of Crown Lands, against the merchants of the river than Smith has, and yet he charges him with "allowing others to rob them of their lumber without compensation." Well, sir, that charge might well be laid to parties nearer in interest to Mr. Smith than Mr. Adams is.

But this article is the worst blundering of the Editor and I will follow it no further "His drivelling makes even the clamorities of his own complaints ridiculous. And he must state some facts as to Mr. Adams in his capacity of representative ere he commences a war politically, personally or religiously upon him. I have nothing to do with Mr. Adams's religion and consider it too sacred for a newspaper and every good citizen must today execrate the man who for purposes of political preference to his master dare take upon himself the office of judge of any man's conscience, a right which belongs to God alone.

No religion, not good government, not honesty, not intelligence, not attention to duty, nor any other one of the many good qualities which contribute to make up a good representative, may think to do so with Smith's hostility to Mr. Adams, but it arises from the fact that Mr. Adams had opinions which he was honest and only too right to express and make at the last Dominion election and that is truly "the very head and front of his offending."

I put the question fairly before the public today. Whether or not they think it would adhere to the principle, that before electing a man to be our representative he must first promise to renounce any great sectional interest which affects the interest of all? As the right of free speech is one of the birthrights of liberty which is a birthright descended from our fathers, will they advise sweeping it away because it interferes with the political prospects of J. B. Snowball. I have the answer, wringing "No" from the mouths of the majority of the other, from the lips of every man who loves freedom and they are legion while the disaffected ones might all be enumerated under the name of Smith.

Sir.—The leader in the last issue of the Advance is deserving of the reprobation of every true citizen. The man, who, to serve personal spite or political malice, would drag into the mire of politics the pure form of holy religion, writes himself on his brazen forehead an immoral sheet anyway that he should set himself up as mentor to any religious denomination? When the Advance was in the pay of the Government at the time of the Caragnet riots, it supported Kelly and Young. It grossly attacked the Hon. Mr. Anglin, whom it now besetters. Now when the pay has ceased and when the religious question that then agitated the country is in abeyance, it is its policy to attack Young, to wreak a mean spite on Adams. Is a paper with such a record the one to nominate a Catholic representative?

Let Adams be judged by his politics, not by his religion. If he has failed in his duty or been unfaithful to his trust, let him be condemned.
