NO SERIOUS FOREST FIRES IN

In the annual report of the Crown Land Department submitted to the Legislature recently by Hon. C. W. Robinson, Minister of Lands and Mines, Mr. T.G Loggie, Deputy Minister, refers to the fire problem in New Brunswick as follows:

"There were no serious forest fires during the past year owing to strike when the farmers proposed the generally wet season. 



Here and There

Canada's expert trade grew \$174,000,000 in the first eleven months of the fiscal year ending March 31st.

A recent and popular Canadian Pacific appointment is that of Mr. Walter Maughen to Steamship Pas-senger Manager. The appointment includes management of the com-pany's passenger business on both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans.

Fire insurance companies found 1922 the mest disastrens year for more than 20. The ratio of losses to premiums was 68.64 per cent, British companies suffered mest severely, their losses to premiums being 71.48 per cent, mainly due to the Northern Ontario fire.

A gold rush is in full swing and it is expected to bring about the development of more mining camps in the counties of Temiskaming and Abitibi. Gold was discovered in these two counties early in 1922, and a rush of prespectors began in March of that year. In October, 250 claims were staked, comprising 50,000 acres of land, and to date about 90,000 acres have been staked.

In the last fiscal year, Canada imported 1,863,000 pounds of butter from the United States, 297,000 pounds from Australia and 2,254,000 pounds from New Zaaland. The total exports of Canadian butter were 8,430,000 pounds.

It is announced that the running schedule of the Trans-Canada Limited, which will operate between Montreal. Toronto and Vancouver, commencing May 20th, has been cut down one hour. This makes possible a through service from London, England, viz Canadian Pacific Atlantic Empresses to Quebec and rail to Vancouver and via Canadian Pacific Empresses to Hong Kong under 28 days.

During—the year 1922 the Canadian Pacific Railway handled a total of 8,435,825 pieces of baggage as compared with 8,732,674 for the previous year. Of this amount 5,175,203 pieces were passengers' baggage which compared with 5,483,455 for the previous twelva months. 9,687 bicycles were handled, 19,336 dogs travelled as baggage and 23,988 baby carriages were moved. There was also a considerable increase in the mevement of milk. increase in the mevement of milk. In 1922, the Company moved 1,623,-707 cans as against 1,614,791 in 1921; and it is remarkable that most of this increase was in the three provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, which is an apparent indication of the further development of mixed farming in those provinces.

France And Germany

It is said that Germany is more in clined to negotiate directly with France and that Britain and some other nations are encouraging her to do so, but she insists that she must be given guarantees that the Ruhr Valley will eventually be evacuated when an agreement is reached. It is not anticipated that such negotiations will begin at an early date. Every move of the French indicates that they are exptcting a lengthy occupation of the country.

A vigorous campaign to rid the tuhr of German Nationalists, who have been strenuously opposing the French and Belgians since they marched into the valley January 11, has been started by the armies of occupation. The Nationalists are held responsble for the outbursts of violence which have taken place late ly against French and Belgian officers and soldiers.

Many leaders and members of the party have been arrested in Essen during the last few days, and are threatened with deportation.

On last Saturday a collision tool place between German workmen and French soldiers at the Krupp works in Essen in connection with which nine Germans were killed and thirtyiour wounded. Four of the directors have been arrested for inciting the trouble.

According to the French version of the affair, the lieutenant and soldiers went to the Krupp works for the purpose of requisitioning automobiles and were set upon by a mob various ly estimated to number between 2,000 and 3,000, which was called together by the factory siren.

The mob showered stones upon the soldiers, the French say, while many of the workmen, armed with revolv rs, fired shots. The soldiers returned the fire, shooting over the heads of the mob at first but, when the workmen refused to disperse, finally aiming to kill.

This unfortunate event will greatly intensify the friction between the people and the occupying army.


