

KELLIHER ON OVERLAND TRIP TO PRINCE RUPERT

Chief Engineer of Grand Trunk Pacific Completes Trip from Edmonton -Made Journey to Inspect Construction Work Between Two Points.

Vancouver, Sept. 1 .- An interesting trip was recently completed by B. B .Kelliher, chief engineer of the Frand Trunk Pacific Railway. Travling on horseback and by canoe, he vered the thousand odd miles from dmonton to Prince Rupert. The rip was primarily undertaken to inpect the route of the Grand Trunk Pacific line as well as to inspect the onstruction work in progress on the

past section and east of the Rockies.
