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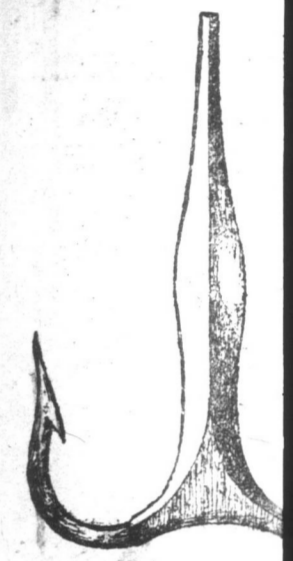

Household Notes.

If the sewing machine band is too loose drop a little castor oil in the groove of the wheel and turn the wheel very fast for a few moments.

To secure the threads in machine sewing so that they will not rip, nor need to be tied, turn the goods around and stitch backward for half an inch.

When making cream of onion soup use half a bay leaf, a bit of minced parsley and a bit of mace for seasoning. It will be found exceedingly tasty.

Use thumb tacks for fastening the ironing sheet to the board. They will hold it more firmly than pins and are more easily removed than ordinary tacks.

When you sprinkle the clothes for ironing cover the basket with a big, heavy blanket and the clothes will keep moist and not mould-even in the hottest weather.

Liver is delicious cooked as follows: Cut slashes in the liver and thread in to them thin slices of bacon. Season with salt, pepper and thyme and bake for an hour or so.

Delicately colored silk hose should be dried in a dark place.

An easy remedy for a skin of large pores is to wear at night a mask of cotton batting or of chamic, wet with distilled water. This has a sure effect. If persevered in.

A cork full of thumb tacks kept in the work-basket will be found invaluable when cutting out garments, as the tacks hold the patterns securely and do not wrinkle the good.

In the course of a brief prelude he mentioned the main causes which led to the commencement of hostilities between the two countries. Passing on to the later days of the war he gave to the audience an exceedingly simple but comprehensive survey of the main plan of campaign adopted by the Japanese. It was of course obvious to all that in the course of a single lecture it was quite impossible to deal extensively with any one aspect of the struggle. Mr. Allan therefore had arranged to deal mainly with some of the spectacular disasters of the fight, and this he did with unusual brilliancy of language and dramatic description. He described in a very vivid fashion the attempt of the Japanese to capture Port Arthur, and as he sketched a word picture of the sinking of the transport ships at the entrance to the harbor, it was easy to see that he had the rapt attention of the audience. The finest passage of his lecture was without doubt that in which he dealt with the blowing up of the Russian flagship. In a few sentences he portrayed the scene and showed how that ship, one of the finest in the Russian navy, met with a disastrous end through the explosion of a submarine mine. He spoke in an eloquent manner of the suddenness of the explosion. At one moment all was calm, peaceful and apparently safe. And yet in a second that scene of majestic peacefulness was changed into one of the most terrible sights of modern history. A terrific explosion rent the air, and the sea, until then almost unrippled, was lashed into a fury by the plunging of wreckage into its depths. Hayoc was supreme, and the decks of the vessel presented a scene of carnage horrible to witness. For a moment the flagship rested upon the bosom of the water, and then with one last upheaval she was engulfed by the angry sea. On every side could be seen floating wreckage, struggling, shrieking figures—all that remained of the noble ship which but a few moments before had been the pride of every loyal Russian. The lecture was closed with a touching allusion to the death of Admiral Makaroff, who met an untimely end for the unfortunate flagship. With inexpressible pathos he described the scene at the memorial service held in St. Petersburg in honor of the heroic commander, and as we heard of the profound sorrow of the Russian nation at the death of its hero, instinctively we sorrowed with them.

Fear Men are Drowned

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, had a wire yesterday afternoon from the Sub-Collector at Gambo saying that three men—Sampel Barron, Job C. Pritchett and Noah King—left Middle Brook Monday for Hare Bay, but that their boat had been picked up Tuesday, and it is feared the three have been drowned. Search parties sent out could get no trace of them. The men we learn are married and leave wives and families.

Reciprocity.

We direct the attention of our readers to the letter from the Hon. John Harvey in reference to some remarks we made yesterday on Reciprocity. We pointed out that any overtures for Reciprocity would be more welcome to Newfoundland, if Reciprocity between Canada and the States should collapse. There is no argument in Mr. Harvey's letter which bears on that position, which after all, was the main position. But, we went on to express a doubt as to the desirability of reciprocity for Newfoundland should the pact now under discussion at Washington and Ottawa be ratified. Mr. Harvey expresses the strongest conviction that it would be desirable. The opinion is worthy as it is the opinion of a fish exporter, and Mr. Harvey may be able to provide reasons in addition to those which we furnish in his letter which may sustain his position.

As to those he furnishes, they are important, but not conclusive in our opinion. He tells us that Porto Rico consumes 200,000 quintals of fish per annum. His point that Newfoundland may be handicapped in that market to the extent of 84c. per quintal is well taken and an important contribution to the consideration of the matter, but on the other hand he does not tell us the extent of the loss that Newfoundland may sustain from this handicap, although he expresses the fear that Nova Scotia may swallow our fish industry, if Canada obtains reciprocity and Newfoundland does not. The opinion is worthy of attention, but Mr. Harvey should buttress it with facts and arguments.

So far as we can gather, Newfoundland last year provided but a small proportion of the 200,000 quintals consumed in Canada. We are informed that some 18,000 quintals went directly there from Newfoundland and some 8,000 quintals more were re-shipped either to Porto Rico or Cuba. The Canadian Trade Commissioner informs us that the fish products, including codfish and haddock, dry and salted shipped to Porto Rico from Canada for 1910 was 101,309 cwt. It would appear then that a very large portion of the cod consumed in Porto Rico comes neither from Canada or Newfoundland. As to the possibility of Nova Scotia supplying the 200,000 quintals, Mr. Harvey says are required in Porto Rico, it is interesting to note that the total yield of the Nova Scotia dry cod fishery is given in the Dominion report for 1909-10 as 500,000 quintals.

As Mr. Harvey is largely interested in banking, his opinion on the relative cost of banking in Newfoundland and Canada is weighty, but it would be more weighty if accompanied by reasons.

This matter seems to us worthy of discussion and we thank Mr. Harvey for his letter and hope to hear again from him, also from others like Mr. Harvey.

Bishop of St. George's.

News was received in town last night making known to his friends that Rev. M. F. Power, Parish Priest of Harbour Breton, had been chosen as Bishop of St. George's. The information came as a surprise to everybody who gave the subject any thought, not that the new Bishop is not eminently qualified, but owing to the fact that in the discussion of all the possible candidates his name had not been mentioned. Father Power's humility and piety kept him in the background of opinion, but Rome never fails to find out the man possessing those qualities and hence the reason of the many surprises in filling episcopal vacancies. The new Bishop, however, is not alone distinguished by his humility and modesty, but is a deeply learned theologian and a beloved priest. In Harbour Breton he was esteemed and loved by all denominations a fact that was amply demonstrated since the destruction by fire of his Presbytery at Harbour Breton. The Bishop-elect is son of ex-Councillor Power of this city to whom as well as Mrs. Power and the family we extend congratulations. He is the second Bishop of the name in Newfoundland, and on the mentioning of the name of the new Bishop of St. George's the memory of the older and middle aged people of the country will go back to that great ecclesiastic and eloquent prince of the church who filled the See of St. John's from 1870 to 1900. The new Bishop of St. George's was educated at St. Patrick's Schools, St. Bonaventure's College and St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish. After leaving the last mentioned institution he accompanied Bishop McNeil to Rome and spent six years at the Propaganda. Bishop Power was 34 years of age on the 17th February last and was born in St. John's West. His mother was a daughter of the late Mr. Thomas Kelly, of Brigus, a well esteemed emigrant from Ireland, who carried on business for many years at Brigus. Bishop Power is the eldest of a family of thirteen children, eight of whom are living, five brothers and three sisters. He was ordained at Rome in 1906, on March the 10th. Leaving there he travelled in France, England and Ireland during the summer of 1906, and returned to Newfoundland in August, shortly after which he was sent by His Grace Archbishop Howley to take charge of the parish of Harbour Breton, where he labored in the mission up to the present month. Mrs. Power, his mother, has been at Ottawa all the past month with two of her sons and two daughters. Her son Anthony is settled down there in a real estate business and is also Vice-President of a foundry. 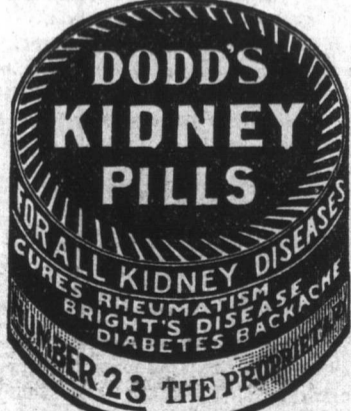

MEXICO CITY May 11. Later the American Ambassador called on the Mexican Minister of Foreign Affairs to lay before him the movement contemplated on the part of the representatives of Foreign Governments who are stationed here. The details have not been made public.

The Committee representing four hundred members of the House of Commons of all parties, organized for the purpose of giving support to the Anglo-American arbitration movement, went to the House to-day, and adopted a resolution pledging themselves to do all in their power to further the progress of the movement.

NEW YORK, May 11. The war in Mexico will last about two months longer, according to Venues Gomez, General Madero's chief adviser at Juarez. Gomez makes this statement in a telegram sent to New York in response to a letter of congratulation following the rebel victory there.

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WINNIPEG, May 11. This city is tied up by the most extraordinary storm of snow and rain in the history of Manitoba.

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ROME, May 11. Pope Plus to-day talked with the Cardinals and received other visitors. Reports of his illness are incorrect.

Berry wrestled Sam Anderson, middleweight champion of America, last week, the result being a draw, after 2 1/2 hours of strenuous wrestling.

Favours Reciprocity.

Editor, Evening Telegram:

Sir,—In your interesting editorial upon Reciprocity you take the ground that Newfoundland ought to favour a reciprocal agreement with the U. S. provided Canada has no such reciprocal arrangement, but that if Canada concludes her bargain Newfoundland can stand aside. As a commercial man I find this difficult to follow.

It is easy to understand a strong Imperialist being opposed to Reciprocity for either Colony, but in my humble opinion the strongest possible argument for Newfoundland seeking Reciprocity would be that Canada had obtained it.

If Canada concludes the bargain negotiated by Mr. Fielding the first effect will be that it will give her a complete monopoly of the markets of Porto Rico, where she (like ourselves) now pays a duty of 84c. a quintal. Porto Rico consumes in the neighbourhood of 200,000 quintals of fish per annum, equal to about one-seventh of the entire quantity that this Colony exports. The Canadian banking fleet, already growing fast, will be operated more profitably than ever before and very much more profitably than our own.

The natural logic of events under Canadian Reciprocity will tend to a gradual transfer of the American sailing fleet from Gloucester to a Canadian port or ports and at the same time to a similar transfer of the American boneless fish industry. Proximity and access to fishing grounds and to bait centres, together with cheaper costs of fishery supplies, rents, and labour, will tend to bring this about quickly, even though vested interests might delay the change for a time.

Without enlarging upon the situation which will thus be developed, it seems quite certain that Nova Scotia will very quickly augment her present salt fish business, and that with an advantage of 84c. per quintal both in Porto Rico and the U. S., the centre of the salt codfish trade will very speedily shift from Newfoundland to that province. But the catching and the handling of fish will be more profitable there than here. If that is so there must follow a movement of fishing property and fishing population from this Colony to Canada. I venture to think that this change will begin with a transfer of banking, tonnage and banking businesses from Placentia and Fortune Bays across to Nova Scotia. Bankers operating from that country will be able to pay higher wages and still make better profits than those operating from Newfoundland. But the movement will not end with the banking fleet.

My personal belief is that unless we can exclude Canadians from our bait (a doubtful proposition) there will be two possible alternatives and two, viz., before this Colony, One will be to go in for Reciprocity ourselves and the other to go in for Confederation.

Such considerations at least seem to lead to a conclusion very different from your own, viz., that if there is one strong argument in favour of Reciprocity for Newfoundland, it will be that Canada gets it.

H.M.S. Elinor.

On Wednesday we inadvertently referred to the Surveying vessel "Elinor" of H. M. S. Newfoundland Survey as a Canadian Surveying vessel. Capt. Coombes, R.N., who is in charge of the Survey writes to correct that statement and to tell us that "the ship has no connection with the Canadian Government but is entirely Imperial." We regret the error and thank Captain Coombes for his correction. He also conveys to us two interesting items of news. "On the vessel's passage to this port a schooner was sighted flying distress signals. On communicating the ship's surgeon was sent on board and found a man in a very dangerous condition, suffering from blood poisoning. He was carefully moved on board where he received great attention and relief, being landed here and conveyed to Hospital. Lieut. Shankland, R.N.R., is now on passage to join the vessel."

How He Was Drowned

Men on the schooner Lillie E., which arrived here yesterday from Hermitage, say that Wm. Northcote, to whom we referred Wednesday, was drowned at Furby's Cove by the swamping of his boat while alone on the fishing ground. The weather became very stormy Tuesday evening and he was caught out in it. The boat was found sunk in 20 fathoms of water, but it is not thought the body will be recovered. Northcote was a widower and two young children survive him.

Seamen Quit Ship.

Several seamen of the S. S. Rossland, left her this morning, being dissatisfied with the rate of wages they are receiving. They have been getting \$28 per month but demand \$30, which all our local seamen are looking for. They say the seamen of the Bonaventure are getting \$25, but they think they should receive a similar wage.

Supreme Court.

(Before the Chief Justice and a Special Jury.)

Joseph Bonavsky vs. the Commercial Union Insurance Company.

This action was taken by G. M. Bonavsky to recover his insurance. Last year he carried on a dry goods business on Bell Island and was insured in three companies for \$3,000, that is, \$1,000 in each. He took this action against the above company for their part of the insurance. The trial occupied two days and concluded last night. Some 12 to 14 witnesses were called by the plaintiff and 6 or 8 for the company. The jury retired at 6 o'clock to consider their verdict and came into court at 8 o'clock with a verdict for the plaintiff for \$891.29, that being the amount the above company has to pay. This is equivalent to a verdict for three times that amount, namely, \$2,673.87. Judgment was entered for the plaintiff with costs. Sir J. S. Winter and F. A. Mews for plaintiff, Furlongs, K.C., for deft. company.

OBITUARY.

Mr. Charles Morris whose death we chronicled yesterday, left here last October and went to work with the A. N. D. Co. up Red Indian Lake and thence on to the camps on Costigan Lake. He was taken ill in March and was attended by Dr. McDonald last week when he grew worse. Last Sunday he was brought down Red Indian Lake on the S. S. Mary. He did not improve at Millertown although Dr. Loomas did everything possible for him he passed away at 8 a.m. Wednesday last. His brother at Grand Falls was informed of his death and also Rev. Fr. O'Callaghan of this city, who broke the news to his friends. The body was brought to town by the express last night and taken by Undertaker Myrick to Stuart Avenue.

Rifle Club Meeting.

The annual meeting of the St. John's Rifle Club took place last evening. The reports for last season showed that the work on the new range had left the Club with a deficit. The members, however, only made renewed efforts on this account to put the balance on the right side. The prizes won during last year's shoots were presented by the Captain of the Club, Mr. J. W. Morris. The election of officers for the coming term resulted in the unanimous selection of the old officials, namely: Captain, J. W. Morris; Vice-Capt., T. M. McNeil; Secretary, W. H. Rennie; Treasurer, W. J. Higgins. The following were appointed as a committee for the year: J. E. Murphy, P. W. Norman, E. MacNab, L. C. Mews, N. H. Alderidge, W. H. Greene.

LONDON, To-day. Captain Montague Parker, who headed a party of English explorers, who have been accused of removing sacred relics from the Mosque of Omar, and who is back in London, announces that his party found the first Jebusites remains ever excavated in Jerusalem.

ANOTHER SALT CARGO.—The S. S. Benedict, Capt. J. Roberts, arrived yesterday afternoon at Bowring Bros. from Cadiz, after a run of 13 days, with 4,014 tons of salt. The ship had variable weather on the run, but had none of a very stormy nature.

Provisional Government Established

Special to Evening Telegram. MEXICO CITY, To-day. A provisional government composed of insurgents has been established by Madero, Jr., as Provisional President. The capital is the captured city, Juarez, where Navarro and the federal troops are held prisoners. The Secretary of War is Carranza, who will have charge of the railways and immediately began repairing the road-bed to the south of Juarez. Gonzalez and Garcia have charge of the mail service and the Treasury, Madero directs the affairs of the Custom House.

Rebels Still Winning.

Special to Evening Telegram. MEXICO CITY, To-day. An atmosphere of gloom has settled over the administration circle, and the spirit of hopefulness manifested during the past ten days has disappeared. The Minister of Foreign Relations while cast down by the failure of the peace negotiations has still some hope that means will be found to achieve the settlement with honor. More bad news reached the Government from Camerogo, that the border town Tamaulipas, which hitherto has been in an undisturbed state, is now besieged by a strong force of rebels and must surrender.

Rev. H. C. Hatcher, B.D.

The Newfoundland Conference of the Methodist Church has again been called to suffer bereavement by the death of the Rev. H. C. Hatcher, B.D., which took place at Catalina on Wednesday night. Mr. Hatcher had a severe fall a few weeks ago, from which he has never recovered, but passed peacefully away, paralysis being the cause of death. He had laboured for 37 years in the ministry of the Methodist Church, and during that period he had occupied the pastorate of such important circuits as Western Bay, Pouch Cove, Burin, Twillingate, Blackhead, Bonavista and Catalina. He has also laboured on several of the mission fields, such as South Island, Red Bay, Little Bay Islands and Agreton's Harbor. On all these circuits and missions he has won hosts of friends who will sincerely mourn his death. Gordon, attending College in Montreal; Charles, an assistant in the dry goods department of Messrs. Ayre & Sons, Ltd.; Prof. Albert G. in connection with the Naval College in Halifax; and William H., of the Parcel Department of the General Post Office, St. John's. Prayer for the sustaining grace of the Almighty will be offered for the bereaved family and church, and in the assurance of this sustaining grace we bow thankfully, realizing still that the "best of all is God is with us."—M.E.

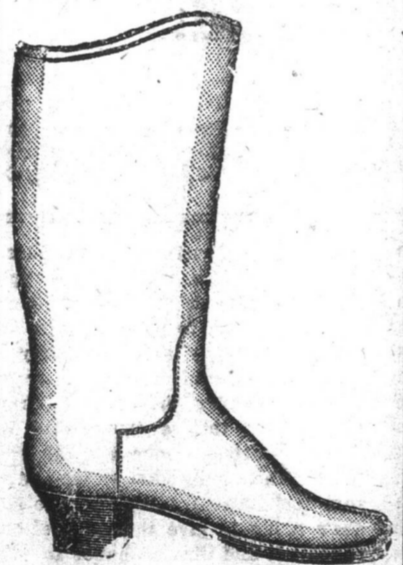

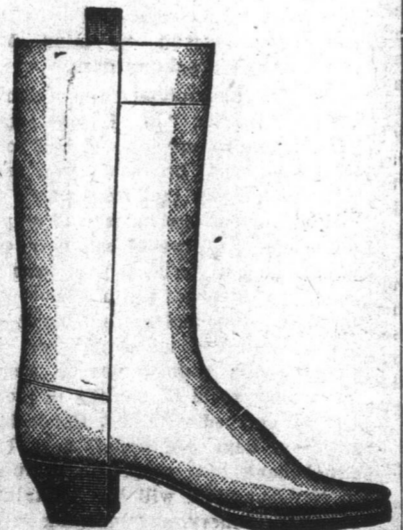

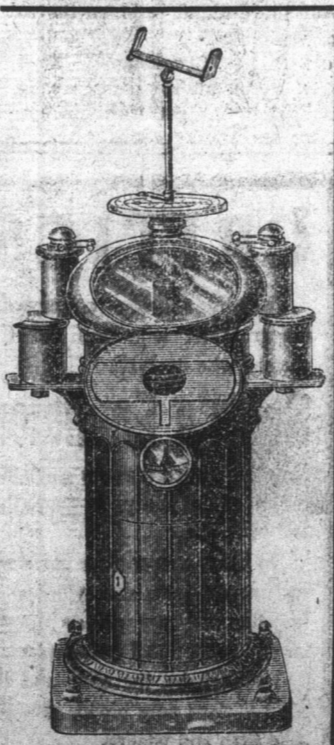
