

Veronica's eyes flashed and the colour dyed her cheek.


"Degradation, my lord?"



## Household Notes.

If your suede shoes become shiny rub them with fine sand paper.

Put sliced orange in your tomato preserves. It will improve the flavor.

Good bacon is known by its thin rind and firm fat of the pinkish white.

Do not neglect to wash house plants in soap suds—it will destroy insects.

All cooked food should be thoroughly cooled before being placed in the icebox.

One level teaspoon of salt will season one quart of soup, sauce or vegetables.

If new shoes squeak, run linseed oil into the soles—it will stop the squeaking.

One cup of sugar will sweeten one quart of any mixture to be served chilled or frozen.

Rice will absorb three times its measure of water and a larger quantity of milk or stock.

When new eggs are used, allow two level teaspoons of baking powder to each cup of flour.

When cooking rhubarb, add a little lemon or orange rind; the flavor will be very much improved.

Before putting milk into a sauce pan to cook, rinse the pan out in cold water; the milk will not be so apt to stick.

When potatoes are cooked for making sauce, remember that one ounce of butter and one-half ounce of flour will thicken one cup of liquid.

Sandwiches made with nasturtium blossoms and leaves and spread with mayonnaise, are very spicy and delicious.

Always empty all the water out of the tea kettle before filling. The flat taste often is due to using water which has been boiled.

Medium-sized vegetables are best, if they are neither very large nor very small. They can be cooked and served with the least waste.

Pods inclosing fresh peas should be plump and crisp. String beans should not be faded or have an indication of toughness or limpness. If they break easily with a snap they are fresh.

The skin of poultry is frequently very dirty, and before preparing it for cooking should be scrubbed with a soft brush and warm water in which a teaspoonful of baking soda has

been dissolved.

If the window glass has been spattered with paint, it can be entirely removed by melting soda in very hot water and washing the glass with it.

If the skin of new potatoes has a slightly green colouring, they have been sunburned and the flavor will not be good, nor will they cook to be mealy and fluffy.

A delicious peach pie is made by baking the under-crust before filling and it is then filled with fresh sliced peaches, sweetened and covered with whipped cream.

Laces which have become stained with perspiration can be successfully washed in cold water and soap, and after the stains are removed put them into warm water.

A very delicious salad is made of apples and oranges. Cut into small pieces one apple, two oranges, lettuce, ground nuts; serve with lettuce leaves with salad dressing.

their place taken by rice or spaghetti, as the last named foods are lighter and easier of digestion.

In making cup custards, allow four eggs to each quart of milk; allow from four to six eggs to each quart of milk when making a custard which is to be turned from the mold.

After a cake is baked, stand the tin on a cloth which has been run out of hot water. Leave it a few moments and the cake will come out of the pan without any trouble.

A newly painted room should not be slept in until the smell of paint has disappeared. A pail full of fresh water kept in the room and frequently changed will help to purify the air.

Watch very carefully the cooking utensils that they are thoroughly clean—cooking utensils that are not clean not only spoil the flavor of the food, but they are dangerous to health.

Before varnishing a piece of furniture, first rub the surface of the wood with sandpaper to make it smooth. Use soft brushes of good quality—then the varnish will not dry streaky.

Ducks to be good must be young and fat, the lower part of the legs and webbing of the feet soft. The under bill, if the duck is young, will break easily. The breast should be plump and fat.

Cabbage should be crisp and of bright color. Cucumbers should be firm to the touch. Lettuce should be firm and not rusty, there is a vast difference between the flavor of truly fresh vegetables and vegetables which are stale.

Coffee beans, if thrown on hot coals, will serve as a deodorizer. Put the coals on a fire shovel and sprinkle the coffee over them. Then carry this through the room, allowing the fumes to fill the air. The smell of burning coffee is very pleasant.

The dish cloth should be kept sweet and clean by being thoroughly washed and scalded after every dish-washing and if possible dried in the sun. Serious illness sometimes originates in an insanitary dishcloth.



## Pilley's Island Hospital.

The Pilley's Island Hospital, which has now been running most successfully for ten months on money principally raised in the United States will close permanently on October 1st unless the people of Newfoundland, and especially those in Green Bay, who are benefited directly by the hospital, will guarantee the sum of \$1,000 for the maintenance of a physician for the ensuing year. The hospital has treated about one hundred patients for surgical operations, and many more for minor troubles. The physicians in charge have made over 1,500 visits to patients in their homes.



### Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, Aug. 25. London was to-night entirely cut off from telegraphic communication with the rest of the country and with the Continent, and for a time connection with America was severed, as the result of a fierce fire, which broke out in the General Post Office, in which building the Central Telegraph Office is situated, and where all wires of the service are concentrated. No lives were lost, and the damage was confined inside the building. A thousand employees, the majority being women, got out without panic. The telegraph service to end from the capital will be crippled for several days. The fire started at 7 o'clock this evening, and was caused by the fusing of a wire in the test box on the first floor. The building sustained no structural damage, but the losses to cables, instruments and furniture were heavy.

NEW YORK, Aug. 25. A cable to the Herald from Paris, says:—Now that M. Poincare, the French Premier, is back from Russia, events in the near East are again engrossing attention. The belief prevails that the end of the Turko-Italian war is near. That Turkey is anxious for peace is indicated by the statement to the Matin's Constantinople correspondent by the Turkish Minister of Foreign Affairs, who expressed the conviction that before very long our foreign relations will be once more on a firm basis of peace.

### Appendicitis.

BY H. L. RANN.



Appendicitis is an expensive and persistent ailment which seldom attacks anybody but members of the Upper Ten or people who are able to write a check in four figures.

It is caused by the verminiferous appendix swallowing a grape seed the wrong way and refusing to let go. Whenever this happens to one of her common people it is called the stomach ache and the afflicted part is irrigated with alcoholic biters, but the minute one of the Four Hundred feels a shooting pain in the vicinity of his watch pocket he is operated upon before he can see if there are any holes in his stockings.

The richer a man is the harder he has appendicitis. Some people are not satisfied with the first attack and insist upon having it three or four times, until they can tell by the feeling that they have not only lost the appendix, but the glossary and concordance as well.

Appendicitis is always preceded by a deep feeling of melancholy, as if the patient had eaten something which refused to sit down. When it first comes on, people begin to criticise the menu and change rapidly from one boarding house to another, in the hope of securing relief. Sometimes the disease is scared away by these tactics and the family surgeon becomes discouraged.

The appendix was discovered about twenty years ago by a near-sighted doctor who stumbled onto it while he was hunting for a set of instruments which he had mislaid. From that day to this the medical profession hasn't done much of anything else except hunt the appendix to its lair and decapitate it at heavy expense to the abutting property owner.

The first few cases of appendicitis were considered dangerous, and the patient generally drew his will along with his check. Nowadays, however, a man can be operated upon without removing his necktie and get back before the first inning is over. Some people are lucky, and go through life never knowing whether appendicitis starts in the left side or the calf of the right leg.

### Taft Signs Panama Bill.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
WASHINGTON, To-day.  
President Taft has signed the Panama Canal Bill and also sent a memorandum suggesting the advisability of the passage of a resolution which would declare by this Government as a violation of the treaty provisions, regarding the Canal. In discussing the British protest against exemption of American shipping from payment of tolls for use of Canal, Taft says the irresistible conclusion to be drawn from it is that "Although the States owns and controls and has paid for the Canal, it is restricted by treaty from aiding its own commerce in the way that all other nations of the world may freely do. The President argues there is nothing in the Hay-Pauncefote treaty preventing Great Britain and other nations extending favours to their shipping using the Canal, and if there is nothing that gives the States any supervision or right to complain of such action then the British protest leads to the absurd conclusion that this Government in constructing the Canal, maintaining the Canal, and defending the Canal, finds itself shorn of its right to deal with its own commerce in its own way, while all other nations using the Canal in competition with American commerce, enjoy the right and power unimpaird. "The British protest, therefore, is a proposal to read into the treaty a surrender by the States of its rights to regulate its own commerce in its own way and by its own method, a right which neither Britain herself nor any other nation that may use Canal has surrendered or proposed to surrender."

### Telegraph Tie-Up

LONDON, To-day.  
Temporary repairs were started immediately after the fire died out to restore emergency communication with the principal English cities, America and the continent, but the damage to instruments and wires was so great that some days will elapse before work on the normal scale can be resumed. Branch Offices about town have thousands of messages for places in this country and this continent, others still are accumulating. The only communication with the other world for three hours was by telephone to Paris. Telephone lines are in great demand by newspapers. The General Post Office is the centre for telegraph service of entire kingdom. All main cables concentrate there, hence the complete paralysis of system. The greatest sufferers are the Provincial papers, which depend upon London for their continental service. They found telephone wires impossible for long messages. Post Officials say it will be a week before the normal service is possible.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the ex-Provisional President of China, arrived here from Shanghai with the avowed intention of endeavouring to conciliate the rival political factions. The Mongolians who recently attacked Tsunan, Manchuria, have retreated, but still maintain an aggressive attitude.

### Sensational Story From Mr. Grace.

Sergeant Spracklin Arrested and Remanded—Bail, \$8,000.

One of the most sensational cases that the gossip has had to deal with for the past ten years or so, is now the chief subject discussed, and the public are waiting open-mouthed to see where the trouble rests.  
It seems that for several years past, Mr. James Cron had been missing goods from his shop on Water Street and he had laid his complaint with Sergeant R. Spracklin. The sergeant did his best to catch the culprit, and laid several plans but the mysterious person failed to get in the trap. Still at different times goods were stolen and reported to the sergeant who appears to be the only person advised of the burglary. Early on Wednesday morning about 3 a.m., we are informed, Constable M. Grouchy, on night-watch and a man across Water Street, and going west on the water-side, enter Mr. Cron's shop. He immediately proceeded to make an arrest, but was horrified to find Sergeant Spracklin in civilian clothes. The Sergeant told the Constable it was all right, as he had been sent there to watch. He was not a constable, but had picked up one on the previous Monday, and was wondering if it was the one used by the culprit. This satisfied the Constable, but not the District Inspector, who immediately reported to his superiors. The Sergeant has been suspended, and Inspector General Sullivan arrived by last night's train to hold an investigation to-day. Sergeant Spracklin has been nearly 30 years in the constabulary and bore a good reputation for attention to duty, etc., and we hope that he will be able to clear up his point and prove that his one and only aim was the detection of crime.

### SEERGEANT R. SPRACKLIN ARRESTED.

Shrouded in mystery for several years one of the most sensational robbery cases in the history of our police courts has been brought to light at Harbor Grace in which Sergeant R. Spracklin, almost a life long member of the police constabulary is charged with complicity. The officer has been arrested and remanded for eight days. Bail would be taken for \$8000.00 but up to the present the accused has no bondsmen.

The story of the robbery briefly is: For ten years past Mr. James Cron, who conducted a substantial establishment at the Metropolis, had been missing goods from his store at different intervals throughout the year, and particularly at night time. The first one he acquainted that the theft was going on was Sergeant Spracklin who undertook to clear up the mystery and bring the crime home to the culprit. The officer consisted every idea and worked many schemes to make an arrest but the mysterious person evaded vigilance. A few months ago quite a considerable amount of goods disappeared from Mr. Cron's store and ultimately the populace of the second city became alarmed as to who the perpetrator was. Meanwhile the owner of the stolen property, who was being victimized, acquainted every other police officer of the settlement about the robbery. However, at two o'clock on Wednesday morning last as Constable M. Grouchy, who was on night duty on Water Street, he observed a man crossing the street a hundred yards in the distance and enter Cron's shop. He at once went to investigate as he believed he had the man he was looking for caught. On entering the building the Constable was speech-bound to find there ahead of him Sergt. Spracklin, who was in plain clothes. The latter informed the policeman that he had been instructed to dress in civilian clothes to watch for the culprit. He had in his possession a key which he told Grouchy he had picked up two days previous and that it was dropped by the man who ever he was. The constable was satisfied for the time being and the excuse offered by his superior officer but reported what happened to the District Inspector, who notified Inspector General Sullivan of the matter. Spracklin was forthwith suspended in accordance with instructions given by the Inspector General and on Friday last was placed under arrest by Constable Grouchy. The name of I. G. Sullivan for Harbor Grace to conduct an investigation. The accused appeared in court on Saturday when the preliminary enquiry was held. The prisoner was remanded for eight days. Bail would be taken for \$8,000 but there were no bondsmen.

### The Harbor Grace Regatta.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir,—In the issue of the Daily News of the 20th inst. appears a budget of news from the regular correspondent of that Journal in Carbonear, purporting to give a true statement of the Regatta held at Lady Lake, or, at least, of that portion of the event in which the Carbonear crew figured so conspicuously as usual. The correspondent endeavours to pen his lines in a somewhat witty style, and has succeeded in so doing in about the same category as would be an exhibition of a memento mori in a Punch and Judy show. The correspondent of the Daily News should never attempt wit, because there is none in his composition. He should first and foremost endeavour to get at the truth of affairs and leave wit severely alone, or hand it over to those who are qualified to use it naturally. **Reals Facts of the Question at Issue,** because reports received second-hand are usually far wide of the mark, and are liable to subject such a good-goddy gentleman as this correspondent of the News to the imposition of the general public that he has been trifling or twisting one of those precepts which command that "Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour." Now, our answer to this charge is: George Pike, Thomas Kennedy, Charles Snow and Graham Duff rowed in the race boat in the Brigade Race. Pike's, Kennedy's and Snow's certificates of age were received by the Committee from the clergyman of the denomination to which they belong, and these certificates clearly and distinctly stated that neither was Duff, he was not born in Harbour Grace, but his father who is one of the most prominent business men and respected citizens of this town has certified in writing that his son is also under

It is necessary to publish these documents for the doubting Thomas of the Daily News? Again, the correspondent states: "Some people have a way of doing things, which show an unique peculiarity. Their modes are first and foremost conceived upon such patriotic principles, and their intense interest in the execution of them is a self-absorbing that obliviousness to anything beyond their horizon is not a cause for wonder." first five names recorded above, the name of Davis not appearing on the list nor being called out by the Committee. The Secretary of Committee then asked the coxswain if there was not a man named Davis, of Freshwater, in the boat? To the credit of Davis he rose up and stated: "Yes, I am the man" Now, Mr. Editor, where does the sweeping of a radius come in, and

**Who Were the Active Participants in This Sweeping Business?**  
When did Freshwater men become transferred to Carbonear District? Again, the correspondent says, "Protests which were at first admitted were subsequently set aside when the Carbonear crew took their positions for the starting of the race, etc." In answer to this, we say, we know of no protest being put before us, except it is that the Carbonear crew protested against Bristol's Hope contesting in this particular race on the ground that Bristol's Hope is in Carbonear District. Now the rules in connection with the Archibald Cup expressly and clearly stipulates that a crew from any particular town or settlement in the Island are qualified to row. 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
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
