## War News

Messages Received Since Last Issue and Previous to 9 a.m. to-day

ST. ELOI RE-CAPTURED. LONDON, March 16.

To Governor, Newfoundland: The French Government reports that British troops, who at first were compelled to fall back before a violent attack on St. Eloi, have recaptured the village with almost all the neighboring trenches, despite enemy counter attacks.

By a violent attack, French infantry carried three lines of trenches north of Arras, capturing one hundred prisoners and two machine guns. Fresh progress has been made. Champagne and there is considerable activity at other points.

The Russian Government reports progress on the whole front in the region of Przasnyz and the enemy heavy siege batteries put out of action by the guns of Osowiec.

ST. PIERRE BULLETINS.

PARIS, March 16.—(Official.) The Belgian army made continued progress in the curve of the Yser and south of Dinant. The British troops were violently attacked last night at St. Eloi, south of Ypres and were forced at first to withdraw, but in a counter attack they re-took a part of the lost ground. Fighting continues at that point. In the region of Neuve Chapelle there is no change. In the Argonne the enemy attempted late in the afternoon of yesterday a third very violent counter attack at Polante to try and recapture the trenches taken by us between Polante and Tour de Paris. This assault was repulsed, as were all previous ones.

The day was marked by numerous attacks, all favorable to us, in the region of Lombardzyde. The Germans tried to recapture a small fort taken by us during the night of March 11th and 12th, but they were repulsed, leaving fifty dead on the ground. Our losses were very few. The British Army, which had withdrawn further inland than St. Eloi before a German attack, recaptured this village, as well as most of the neighboring trenches, notwithstanding several German counter attacks. North of Arras our infantry, by a very brilliant

attack, captured in one run three series of trenches on the height of Notre Dame de Lorette and attained the heights of the Plateau. We have captured 100 prisoners, including officers, destroyed two machine guns and blew up a depot of ammunition. Further south in the Ecurie-Roglin-court region, on the road to Lille, we have blown up several German trenches and have kept the Germans from receding. In Albert region, near Carroy, the Germans blew up a mine underneath one of our trenches and occupied the excavation. We repulsed them, they retook it, but after the last counter attack we finally recaptured the position, maintaining ourselves there and succeeding in organizing its defence.

THE COMMONS ADJOURNED.

LONDON, March 17. The House of Commons adjourned today, until April 14th.

ACTIVE OFFENSIVE IMMINENT.

LONDON, March 17. With the increasing activities of the British, French and Belgian armies, the re-appearance on the coast of Belgium of British and French warships and the time near for a big effort in the west, the public is following with renewed interest the daily reports of operations. The Belgians, who are being supported by the warships of the Allies, have consolidated the ground which they have won in the last few days, while the British have done likewise with the strip of territory which they took from Germany near Neuve Chapelle, and have recovered most, if not all, of the trenches which they lost in the region of St. Eloi. All these operations are believed here to be preliminary to a general offensive which the Allies will undertake when the ground becomes enabling a more rapid movement of troops and guns and use of cavalry which has been out of action all the winter, except where the troops left their horses and took to the trenches. The Russians on the eastern front are even more active than their western allies. The Russians have themselves undertaken the offensive, and according to their own reports are advancing successively along both banks of the Orxve River, and have occupied the village of Stigna, which is on one of the main roads leading to Przasnyz from the northeast.

The allied fleet continues operations in the Dardanelles and off Smyrna, but no official report of the progress of the warships has been made for several days.

The interesting statement was made to-night by Lord Southwark, at a meeting of the Associated Chambers of Commerce, that since the outbreak of the war Britain's output of war material has increased three hundred fold.

GERMAN DEFENCE WORKS SHATTERED.

PARIS, March 17. The events of yesterday on the French and Belgian army front are described in a statement from the War Office. The British Army, after having retaken St. Eloi, has also recaptured the trenches to the southwest of the village and compelled the enemy to evacuate the trenches to the southeast of the same point, which have been completely demolished by artillery. In the Champagne, fresh progress has been made to the north-east of Bondy. In the forest of La Pretre we have recaptured from the Germans the remainder of the trenches won by them yesterday morning, or to be precise, the site of these trenches, for the defensive works have been completely shattered by

mine explosions. On the southern slope of Great Reich Ackerkoepf, an attack by the enemy yesterday morning carried a trench. We have retaken it and made some prisoners.

ANOTHER SUBMARINE SUNK.

GLASGOW, March 17. The captain of the British steamer Apollo reported to-day that his ship had collided with a German submarine while en route from Rotterdam to Bristol. The submarine sank immediately, he said.

HEAVY BRITISH CASUALTIES.

PARIS, March 17. Heavy casualties among British officers was a distinguishing feature of the four days' fighting at Neuve Chapelle. The estimated British loss is nearly 10,000 men in killed, wounded and missing. Of these, about two hundred were officers. It is reported that the German soldiers were under special orders to pick off British and French officers, but the more likely cause for the heavy losses among men of rank is their reckless bravery in battle, which leads them to expose themselves needlessly. General news says the largest army in France that has ever been put upon foreign soil. It is estimated that more than a million British soldiers are on French soil, but all of them are not on the firing line yet. The Germans have evacuated some territory they held between Ypres and Dixmude in Belgium.

BELGIAN GAINS.

PARIS, March 17. The enemy is again furiously bombarding Nieuport, this time with howitzers, says an undated message from the Petit Parisien's war correspondent, who adds that thirty shells have fallen in the town, making enormous holes and demolishing several buildings, but no one is hurt. The Belgian troops, profiting by the slight recession of the waters in the district they occupy, carried two German advanced positions. The first was on Keesterhoek farm, near Stuvakenek, while the second was a line of trenches on the road from Perste to Schoorbankke. Warships and monitors of the Allies vigorously bombarded Westende. The Germans replied feebly, but none of the shells took effect. Torpedo boat destroyers protecting the bombarding ships, shelling a German submarine which attempted to approach.

HAMMERING THE ENEMY.

LONDON, March 17. A Daily News correspondent telegraphs from Petrograd that the rearguard of General von Fichera's army has been beaten repeatedly in the last few days, in attempting to protect the transport as it withdraws from Suwalki, across the frontier, into East Prussia. General von Buelow's troops are also being punished by raiding expeditions from Osowitz, where the garrison has crushed the enemy's siege artillery, and now uses the fortress as a base for aggressive tactics. All letters from the front confirm the impression that the new army is not equal to the task Field Marshal von Hindenburg has imposed upon it. He is now trying to protect his weakness in the north by the introduction of a number of new batteries on Bzura, in Central Poland, but even there he fears to test his infantry against the Russians.

SUCCESS ON EAST AND WEST.

LONDON, March 17. The Governor, Newfoundland: General French reports German losses between the 10th and 13th on the Neuve Chapelle front cannot well be less than 17,000 to 18,000.

The French Government reports that the British army has retaken St. Eloi, recaptured trenches southwest and compelled the enemy to evacuate trenches southeast.

The Russian Government reports progress on the northern front. In the Carpathians, Russian success in the centre of the chief Austrian offensive, is causing a partial retreat; 2,400 prisoners, 47 machine guns, were captured. In Eastern Galicia 10,000 prisoners and 7 mitrailleuses were captured.

HARCOURT.

HEAVY CASUALTY LIST.

LONDON, March 17. The British casualty list for five days from March 10th to 14th, during which the battles of Neuve Chapelle and St. Eloi were fought, show 112 officers killed or died of wounds, and 198 officers wounded or missing. The list of casualties among the men has not been published nor have any figures been given out, but some competent critics estimate them at about two-thirds of those suffered by the

ITALIAN DEMONSTRATION.

PARIS, March 17. The Havas Agency has received the following despatch from its correspondent at Milan: There was a great demonstration here last night in favor of intervention by Italy on the side of the Allies. Crowds of man-

stantis marched through the streets and gathered in front of the Cathedral. The police charged and dispersed the crowds which were shouting: "Down with Austria. Down with Germany."

H.M.S. AMETHYST WRETS MIS-FORTUNE.

LONDON, March 17. A Tenedos despatch dated March 15, says, the British cruiser Amethyst was fired upon by field artillery, brought to bear from an unexpected spot. She was hit by several shells at close range, and had nineteen men killed and several wounded. The vessel is damaged, but her fighting efficiency is unimpaired. An Athens despatch to the Telegraph says, twenty-two men were killed on the Amethyst and thirty were wounded.

ATLANTA TORPEDOED.

LONDON, March 17. The Atlanta was badly damaged and towed to port. Her captain said there was no doubt his vessel was struck by a torpedo. The crew of six men were driven from the Atlanta by fire which started after the explosion. The men took to the boats and were picked up.

WAR MATERIALS MEASURE.

LONDON, March 17. Factory owners, labor leaders, and representatives of engineering, transport and other industries had a meeting to-day with Lloyd George, members of the Committee on Industrial Defense, naval and military officers of high rank, and other Government officials, to discuss the problems arising from the decision of the Government to assume control of factories in England and thus increase the production of war materials. The conference was unique in history, at the same time being one of the most important meetings held since the beginning of the war. The first step decided on was the appointment of a committee of seven composed of labor officials and representatives of all industries concerned to act in an advisory capacity to the Government. Selecting a man to lead this great or-

ganization was discussed, as was the remuneration workmen should receive under the new arrangement.

Lloyd George delivered a brief address, and the Labor delegates promised the Government their whole support.

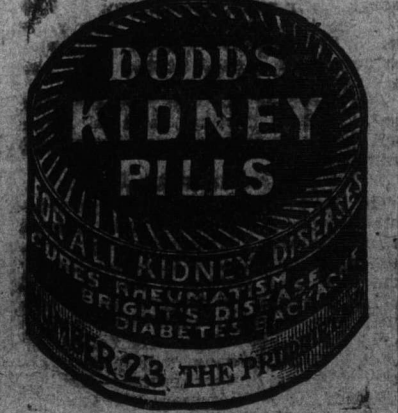
COAL STRIKE SETTLED.

NEW YORK, March 17. T. P. O'Connor settled the coal strike of coal passers on the Liverpool docks, which tied up the trans-Atlantic liners for more than a week, in 24 hours, by agreeing to have the strikers each advance a shilling a day for beer, according to passengers on the steamer Philadelphia, which reached here to-day.

ALLIES WARN JAPAN.

PEKING, March 17. Official information reached Peking to-day that the Russian and British Ambassadors at Tokio, called on the Japanese Foreign Minister on Saturday and informed him that if Japan persisted in pressing upon China demands beyond those contained in her original communication to the Powers, it would be difficult for Japan's allies to negotiate diplomatically with her in future. **The Gallant 12.**

There seems to be now no room for reasonable doubt that there were twelve Newfoundlanders aboard the ill-fated auxiliary cruiser H.M.S. Bayano, at the time she was torpedoed, and that eleven of the twelve have found a watery grave. The name of the man saved is Stephen Kestles, of Barr'd Island, Pogo. He and his wife are to be congratulated on his good luck. The other eleven Newfoundlanders were among the 200 or so who were lost. The total number saved was 26, eighteen men and eight officers. The Bayano was torpedoed last Thursday morning and the survivors rescued by a cutter from two rafts and an upturned ship's boat.

"Two of the men," said the captain "had no other clothing than shirts, and others only their sleeping garments. One had an ugly wound on his head and was covered with blood, while nearly all of them were bruised and bleeding."

"They were more dead than alive from wet, cold and exposure, but cheered us as we neared them. Boats were promptly lowered and the men were transferred, which took a long time, owing to the difficulty of moving the wounded and fainted members of the group."

The captain said that two of the rescued men were so far gone that in another half hour, he believed, they would have perished. Eighteen of the men on the raft, including two doctors, were removed to the Balmorino. After these were safely got aboard, a boat was making a second journey to the raft when the armed merchantman Tara arrived on the scene and took off the remaining eight survivors.

"The men were given warm clothing and restoratives," continued the captain. "They were overjoyed at their rescue."

"They said the Bayano sank within a few minutes after being torpedoed. There was a terrific explosion and the vessel went down by the bows. The explosion created a great amount of damage and some of the lifeboats were smashed and rendered useless."

"The men were left struggling in the water in the darkness, clutching for any piece of wreckage to which they could cling. Heartrending tales

**LATEST From the Front.**

**U-28 SINKS STEAMER.**

LONDON, To-day. The British steamer Leewardland, from London for Harlingen, Holland, was torpedoed by the German submarine U-28, four miles southeast of Meas Holland Lightship. The crew of seventeen men were given five minutes to take to small boats which the submarine towed until a pilot steamer was met. The men were then transferred to a pilot boat and landed at the Hook of Holland.

**ESCAPED STEAMER CAPTURED.**

LONDON, To-day. The interned German liner Macedonia, which escaped from Las Palmas, Canary Islands, on Monday, has been captured by a British cruiser, according to the Daily Mail's Madrid correspondent.

**REAR ADMIRAL DROWNED.**

LONDON, To-day. Rear Admiral Grogan has fallen overboard from his ship and been drowned, according to an announcement made by the Admiralty. The name of the ship is not given.

**KARLSRUHE SAID TO BE SUNK.**

LONDON, To-day. Reuter's Copenhagen correspondent sends a story of the sinking of the Karlsruhe taken from Stiff's Tidende, which asserts that it obtained the story from an authoritative source. According to the story the crew of the Karlsruhe were having tea one evening, when a sudden explosion broke the cruiser in two, one half of the vessel sank immediately, carrying part of the crew down with it, and the other half floated for some time which enabled between 150 and 200 men to be rescued by an accompanying steamer, which reached a German port with the survivors who were sworn to secrecy concerning the sinking of the cruiser.

**DEFINED RANGE OF BLOCKADE.**

WASHINGTON, To-day. Six diplomatic notes were made public last night by the State Dept. The communications revealed that the State Government is realizing the difficulties of maintaining an effective blockade by a close guard of an enemies coast on account of the newly developed activities of submarines which make it difficult to define. Great Britain and France replied with the announcement that the operations of blockade would not be conducted outside of European waters, including the Mediterranean.

**PIERCE FIGHTING IN CHAMPAGNE DISTRICT.**

PARIS, To-day. The British warships which bombarded Westende in Belgium have been shelled by the Germans with their 34 inch guns. It was these guns which bombarded the trenches of the Belgians and Indians at Neuport. Wounded French soldiers declare that meagre laconic official bulletins fail to give any idea of the fierceness of the fighting in the Champagne district. Nearly a quarter million men have been engaged there in a mighty conflict on the Les Mesnie, Perthes, Beaunejour line between Rheims and the Argonne forest. Thousands of big guns have been thundering night and day for weeks. The fields are covered with rotting corpses. The ground is torn with shell fire and the explosion of mines. The horror of the long fight, the tension of battle and the ghastly stench of decaying flesh and burning gun powder, together with fumes, have driven hundreds of soldiers into stark madness. Fighting is again in progress near Arras and Albert where the Germans are trying to win back some of the ground they have previously lost.

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

#### LLOYD GEORGE'S APPEAL FOR CO-OPERATION IN AMMUNITION OUTPUT.

LONDON, Mar. 17. The British Government intends to take over the control of factories for the production of war material. This announcement was made to-day by David Lloyd George, Chancellor of the Exchequer, at a conference of Labor leaders and representatives of various industries and the committee of Imperial Defence. In his address, appealing for an increase in the output of war material, the Chancellor said:

Recent battles have shown the tremendous concentration of artillery fire, the greatest which has been witnessed upon any given point during the whole war. It not only has ensured success but has saved lives of soldiers who made the attacks. Then it workmen and factory owners desire to see the country win and are anxious to save the lives of men, they must accelerate the output of munitions. To assist in this the Government has decided to take over the works. In doing so the Government proposes to impose a limitation on production, to ask men to relax trade union restrictions and to put their whole strength into the work. Before doing this, the Chancellor suggested that a complete understanding was desirable between employers and workers. The latter proposed that with a view of preventing diminution of production by disputes, no stoppage of work by strike or lockout should take place with respect to work for Government purposes. In the event of difficulties existing which could not be settled directly by employers and men, the matter should be referred to an impartial tribunal appointed by the Government in which labor should be equally represented with employers. Clyde workers, he said, had already taken a ballot in favor of accepting the Government's proposal that their disputes should be referred to arbitration, and in the meantime had returned to work. As to trade union restriction, which tended to diminish the output, the Chancellor asked that while the war lasted they should be suspended so far as they concerned semi-skilled and female labor, which had been usually employed in French munition factories. In conclusion he asked for the co-operation of labor leaders in dealing with the drink question, which was a most difficult one. In some districts this was very serious and, he declared, it was gravely interfering with the amount of output. Another conference will be held to-morrow.

NAVAL CASUALTIES IN THE DARDANELLES. LONDON, March 17. A casualty list issued by the Admiralty to-night, discloses that in the fighting in the Dardanelles on Saturday night, the light cruiser Amethyst, which, according to an Athens despatch, made a dash through the Strait as far as Nagara, had 23 men killed and 19 wounded severely, and 18 slightly wounded. The battleship Ocean had two men killed, and the battleship Prince George 2 men wounded, while two trawlers between them had 3 men killed and 2 wounded.

THE WHOLE TRUTH. LONDON, March 17. Regarding Sir Edward Grey's replies to America's notes, the Express says: "We are determined to cut off Germany's supplies from America and all other neutral countries. America will, of course, protest. We shall consider her protest with all courtesy, but we shall not change our purpose. It is surely better to tell the truth."

PARTIDGE BERRIES ON THE FREE LIST. OTTAWA, March 17. The House went into Committee on Ways and Means to-day, and took up Hon. W. T. White's resolution to increase the customs duties in accordance with the announcement made in his budget. The Finance Minister said that at the request of the Newfoundland Government, the Canadian Government has consented to admit free of duty, wild edible berries, known as partridge berries. The Finance Minister explained that bananas were added to the list of exemptions at the request of the Government of Jamaica.

POTS DAM IN MEXICO. WASHINGTON, March 17. General Almanza Carranza, commander, and his entire staff have been court-martialed for treason and executed at Torreon by Villa authorities.

WHO IS THIS DOCTOR? SEATTLE, March 17. Dr. Wm. Mulloy, Imperial General Consul at Seattle, with his Secretary were served with notice of arrest to-day at the Consulate. The flowers looked lovely but the shade behind them was crooked; she straightened it and then passed about the room picking up a soiled glass, straightening a crooked picture, smoothing out a disorderly pile of newspapers and magazines, and putting a fresh towel on the bureau. In a few minutes she had the room looking like quite another place.

The patient, responding to the flowers and to the new sense of order in the room, roused herself from her listless indifference to appearances to ask for a comb and mirror and other toilet appurtenances.

Half an hour after the flowers entered the room they looked down upon a patient who was taking an interest in her personal appearance for the first time since her illness, a smiling homemaker nurse who had forgotten how tired she was, and a tidy, pleasant-looking room.

It changed suddenly to interest and attention when he greeted two or three of their number and greeted them not curiously or patronizingly but with the same cordiality and courtesy he would have extended to a friend of his own age. He passed on, but the group did not go back to its former slouching. An electric change seemed to have passed through them. They stood more erect; several of them took their hands out of their pockets; one half smoked cigarette was thrown away; even the conversation took on a rather different tone.

When the Little Boy Forgets to Whine. Once more, I know a little boy who is very difficult to manage. When his nursemaid scolds him in her high pitched, nervous voice he seems to grow more stubborn and more ugly. His own voice rises and he snarls and frets and often has to be sent to bed. ## O'Leary Family Burnt Out.

**ESCAPE IN NIGHT CLOTHES.**  
While the community was sleeping the house of Mr. Frank O'Leary was in the clutches of a blast of fire which took the members of two of our fire brigades upwards of two hours to extinguish, but not before the building was badly gutted and the greater part of the contents destroyed. The family retired. The last to come was Mr. O'Leary's second son, Frank, who had been to a party. He went to bed about 2 o'clock this morning, but did not see any smoke or notice anything wrong. Shortly after 4 a.m. Mrs. O'Leary, who was sleeping on the second flat, smelled smoke and aroused her husband, who heard the crackling of wood whilst the rooms in the house were beginning to fill with smoke. He immediately alarmed the rest of the occupants, ordering them to get out as quickly as possible, and then ran to Cochrane Street and sent in an alarm over box 34. Mrs. O'Leary, her sons and daughters escaped in their night clothes. It was only after a strenuous effort that they got out at all, with flames issuing from a great doorway. The smoke was rapidly getting dense and the two sons who were sleeping on the top flat of the house had a trying time beating their way over two flights of stairs and to the street. By the time the Central and Eastern fire companies arrived on the scene the blaze was then well under way, with flames issuing from all parts of the house and very difficult for the firemen to get at. At about 6 a.m. the "all-out" signal was sent in. The origin of the fire is unknown, though it is supposed to have been started in the basement or cellar. A peculiar feature is that the fire must have been eating up through the ceilings for several hours and not discovered. The house is wrecked while the contents are practically all destroyed either by fire, smoke or water. The loss to Mr. O'Leary is great as he is only partially insured.

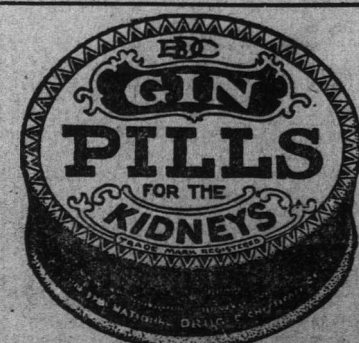

## B. I. S. Parade.

Yesterday, the Feast of St. Patrick the Apostle of Ireland, was duly celebrated by the Benevolent Irish Society which held the most successful parades in the history of that organization.

Over two hundred members of this time-honored institution, accompanied by the Roman Catholic Volunteers of the Second Contingent under command of Sergt-Major Moore, a true blooded Irishman from the County of Connaught, and attended by the C. C. C. and T. A. Bands, took part in the parade.

The route of march was along Queen's Road, Theatre Hill, New Government, Hamilton, Patrick, Water and Cochrane Streets to Government House where His Excellency the Governor addressed the members in a congratulatory manner.

The parade then proceeded by way of Military Road to the R. C. Cathedral where Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Rev. J. J. O'Connell, P.P., assisted by Revs. Frs. Sheehan and Doyle, as Deacon and Sub-Deacon, respectively. The Throne was occupied by His Grace the Archbishop, presided attended by Rev. Fr. Cox, S. J. and Rev. Fr. MacDermott, Adm., and Rev. Dr. Greene acted as Master of Ceremonies.

**THE SERMON.** The sermon was preached by Rev. Fr. Cox, S. J., who took his text from Tobias, Chap. 2, 17th and 18th verses:—"Speak not so, for we are the children of the Saints, and look for that life which God will give to those that never change their faith from Him."

The rev. Father in eloquent language drew beautiful parallels from the words of Tobias, showing clearly their fitness to Ireland and Irishmen. After reviewing the story of Tobias, he showed that Ireland had like him been stricken in the height of her prosperity. For over one thousand years she had served God faithfully and well. From the death of her saintly Apostle her faith and hope and charity had been spreading their odor of sweetness until they had permeated the very atmosphere that her children were made to breathe. Her daughters in cloister or in home, in singleness or in wedlock, had shone out to the world as peerless models of untarnished chastity, or better still, of spotless virginity. Her sons adame with the fire that knows no quenching had scattered far and wide, bearing tidings of peace and gladness to the nations that sat in darkness. Ireland, for ten centuries had been winning for herself, and now had won the glorious title of Island of Saints. Then a sudden the Hand of God, who spared not His Own Beloved Son, but ever chastens those whom He loves descended upon her with the full weight of its relentless power. For now well nigh five hundred years she seemed on the point of sinking into the grave under the heel of tyranny, the scourge of famine, and the sword of decimating emigration. When Ireland was in the throes of prolonged agony, her relatives and kinsmen who had now become her enemies crowded around her and with jeers and mockery shrieked into her ears:—"Where is thy hope for which thou remainedst pure and better still, and gavest the best blood of thy veins to God and sovereigns?" Ireland, crippled though she was and almost annihilated, Irishmen at every stage of their life long "passion," Irishmen plunging away in the land of their birth or toiling in exile in far off India, Australia, Africa and here in our own America, Irishmen have ever flung back that magnanimous reply:—"Speak not so, for we are the children of the Saints, and look for that Life which God will give to those that never change their faith from Him."

Continuing the reverend preacher reviewed the sixty years of St. Patrick's apostleship during which he laboured until his spirit went to God, returning again to the sons and daughters of Ireland who have shed the light of Faith in all the European countries, the United States, Canada, and last but not least in our own dear Newfoundland. He mentioned the names of the Howleys, the Roches, the O'Donnells, the O'Garas and many others who have perpetuated the faith of Patrick throughout the land.

Turning to the volunteers he said:—"You soldier boys are the children of the Saints. In your veins is coursing the rich blood of the heroes and Saints of Ireland, the blood which ever led the Irish to deeds of greatest honor and loyalty. Be true to the honor of your ancestors, and go forward to battle holding high the honor of your faith and loyalty, and if you must die in battle, die as heroes, as Irishmen, and as Catholics."

After mass the society called on the Archbishop elect, at the Palace, after which music was made to their hall by way of Military and Queen's Roads.

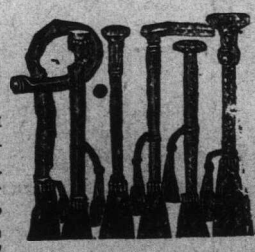

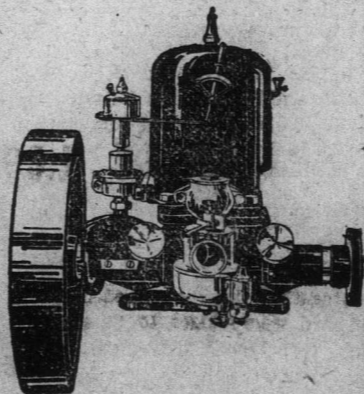
