Underseas Sensations.

Submarines of Other Times.

The prophet who declared that there was nothing new under the sun might, with equal propriety, have added that there was nothing new un-

Many people, for instance, are un-der the delusion that the submarine is a modern invention. As a matter of fact it is nothing of the sort

The submarine-or something very like it-appears to have been in existence as long ago as the middle of the sixteenth century, if we may trust the testimony of Olaus Magnus, Bishop of Upsala. This right reverend prelate has it that such vessels were used by pirates in Gruntland for the purpose of "making great holes in passing merchant vessels." He asserts that he had seen two of them exhibited in the western porch of the cathedral of St. Asloe.

To come to slightly more recent times, there are records of a submarine having been designed in 1578. Its inventor is an Englishman one William Bourne

A writer, referring to the earlier types of submarine, notes the interesting fact that they "were intended to sink by decreasing their actual bulk and thus making them relatively heavier than water, instead of increasing their weight by the use of ballast tanks. To cause them to rise some kind of screw was provided which would expand a flexible portion of the boat, in this way increasing the bulk again and consequently the buoyancy."

"Old Nick" Suspected.

In the early part of the seventeenth century a submarine was successfully navigated from Westminster to

The inventor and navigator-Cornelius Drebel, a Dutchman-enjoyed the patronage of James I., and the credulous King was only prevented from taking part in a submarine trip by the assurance of some of his courtiers that Drebel was "in league with Old Nick."

The boat was so constructed that "a person could see under the surface of the water, and without candle light, as much as he needed to read in the Bible, or any other book."

It was also propelled by oars. Plymouth Sound was the scene of the first recorded submarine disaster. It was there, in 1774, that an experimenter named Day made a descent in a vessel of fifty tons. He was never seen again.

At a time when Britain and the States are allies, it is interesting to ful use of submarines in warfare is believed to have been made during the American War of Independence.

A submersible craft was built by an American named Bushnell with the object of blowing up ships in the British blockading fleet. Bushnell was so far successful that he did actually explode a torpedo under a British frigate, without, however, inflicting any damage more serious than the smashing of the cabin win-

The Kaiser and God.

I have come across an interesting estimate of the Kaiser in his relation to the "good old German God." in a book by an American correspondent Mr. Edward Lyell Fox, who has done journalistic duty both with the German armies and in Berlin since the beginning of the war. In "Wilhelm Hohenzollern and Co.," which Messrs. Hurst and Blackett publish, Mr. Fox writes: "Intensely religious, ever calling upon God in his hour of trial, Wilhelm II. is religious to the point of madness. One might almost say that his whole life is held together by his belief that God is on the side of Germany in this war. . . . In considering the Kaiser to-day one must grasp the intensity of this religious obsession. If he were acting, if his God ranting were mere mummery, the task of the world would be easier. . . . Impelled by this religious hysteria, he will continue the war until he meets an end like that of the old German gods, and the whole fabric of his Empire is rent asunder. Either that, or the world fighting him will become too Christian and end humanity's anguish by substituting the thought of 'punishment' with one of charity. But if the world should do that the Kaiser would believe 'our old German God' had saved him, and on the Linden the Imperial fanfares would sound, and from the gray stone balcony of the Schloss one of those 'with God' speeches would stir the Berlin soul."

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
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
