



The "Atlantic" is Off.

THE GREAT FLIGHT BEGUN.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARRSBORO, N.S., Yesterday. At last the giant bomber, "Atlantic," after months of bad luck, disappointment and disaster, is on her great flight to New York! The beginning of this wonderful air-voyage, which, it is hoped, will extend to New York, Chicago and St. Louis, back to New York, Toronto and other Canadian cities, was made at five minutes to twelve to-day. The giant bomber, the biggest biplane in the world, was hauled out onto the starting ground by the little steam tractor, "Clayton," and the engines turned up. Admiral Kerr and his crew soon appeared, clad in the air clothing that was worn on the flight from Hr. Grace to here, and, after wishing various friends good-bye, climbed up the ladder that extended from the ground into the cabin, and the "Atlantic" was sent taxying down the aerodrome. As she rose, taking off most beautifully, and with more grace than a bird, a great and swelling cheer—more like a vibrating roar—rose from the throngs of the vast concourse of people assembled at the spacious grounds, and the noise was equalled only by the indescribable roar of the four powerful motors of the plane. Circling round in the air above for a short while she soon set her course away, and within a few minutes had passed from the sight of the eager and enthused watchers. There were present people from all parts of Canada, among them many of prominence and note. The weather was favorable for the flight, and the last words of Admiral Kerr, as he chatted to me before climbing into the cockpit of the beautiful plane, were: "Well, boy, we're going to do it this time! In Hr. Grace, Newfoundland, we had plenty of luck, alright, but were balked upon arriving over Canadian territory. They show them we have had luck, but we'll show that is unusual, even to aerial pilots. The mechanics, most of whom were at Hr. Grace, hold the little bird in the greatest veneration, almost, and their great determination was that, this time, the flight would be made!"


A Miserable Little Loophole.



As those which happily you wear.



Our General Prosperity.

The newspapers supporting the Squires-Coaker combination, prophesy speedy ruin, if the Government is elected. The condition of the country's finances is such to-day that the voters need a far greater amount of logic and reason to convince them of the truth of this prophecy than is given them by those who foretell the direful tidings. In 1913 the amount of deposits in the banks in this country was about one million dollars, while to-day the deposits total over twenty millions. Squires Must Walk the Plank.

COAKER ADMITS HIS DEFEAT IN LATEST CIRCULAR.

The "Wordy" President has put his foot in it again, and, as usual, his latest break has been caused by what is usually termed the "exuberance of his own verbosity." He has been writing circulars again, and every one knows that when Mr. Coaker sits down to write he puts on paper a lot of things which were better left unwritten in his own interests. Ink acts like wine, so to speak, with Mr. Coaker. An Amazing Story.

ABOUT MR. SQUIRES' ELECTRIC LIGHT BILL.
Last night in a leading club of the city, several parties were discussing the latest exposure in relation to Mr. Squires, namely, that in addition to having his own regular annual pass on the railway lines he used to have a book of passage tickets for his family, and that according as it was used up he had to go to the Reid offices and get another one, and one of those engaged in the conversation remarked that he would not be surprised if the next thing to come up about Mr. Squires was that the Reids were putting in his provisions, to which comment a third party made the retort that he understood that Mr. Squires, in the Fall of 1916, owed the Reid Company a bill for \$1,098.00 for electric fittings and lighting, and that it was when he was asked by one of the Reid accountants to pay this amount that he produced a bill for legal expenses for \$1,500.00, and that when a final adjustment of this account was made about a year later the electric light bill had been increased by some \$400.00, and that to square Mr. Squires' account for \$1,500.00 the Reid Company handed him a receipt for \$1,482.00 and a cheque for \$18.00 as an unpaid balance. Of course this transaction may be perfectly proper and above board, and Mr. Squires may be able to give an absolutely complete explanation, but we do think that at the public meeting to-night he ought to make such an explanation, particularly when he is asking the intelligent electors of the city of St. John's to accept as genuine his declarations that his policy in seeking the suffrages of the people is, as he himself has phrased it already, to put the Reids in their place and to see that they carry out their contractual obligations to the country in the matter of the operating of the railroad and other services which they are obligated to do. Mr. Squires has already been charged with the following peculiar proceedings:

- Getting \$5,000.00 in Bank of Montreal notes from the Reids in the autumn of 1917 at a time when he was chairman of a sub-committee of the Executive Council inquiring into some claims of the Reids in connection with railway work.
- Drawing a letter to be signed by Mr. H. D. Reid for publication in the newspapers denying that he ever received this amount, and presenting this letter to Mr. Reid who refused to sign it on the ground that it contained statements that were not true.
- Attempting to practise a barefaced deception on the public by this means, and to prevent their realizing the truth of these statements.
- Obtaining from the Reids the money to start the Daily Star newspaper which is now proclaiming in every issue that his purpose is to see that the country gets justice from the Reids.
- Getting books of mileage tickets from the Reids for his family in addition to his own regular annual pass.
- Owing the Reids \$1,098.00 for electrical fittings and an electric light bill, and presenting a bill to the Reids for \$1,500.00 for alleged legal services to square the account.

We think that before Mr. Squires asks the people of this country to accept him as a political leader on an anti-Reid policy, he owes it to himself as well as to them to make some explanation with regard to these matters.




