MEXICO CITY, (Associated Press) -Conceived in jest and at first accepted by the nation in the same spirit the Fascisti movement in Mexico has made such rapid strides during the past few weeks that it is now reckoned as an important political factor which doubtless will figure largely in the presidential elections two years hence. Starting in the small city of Jalana, capital of the state of Veracruz, it was declared even by its founders to be a mere local society without definite aim and certainly not Fascisti was adopted more because of its present popularity than because of the ideals sponsored by the Italian organization. But certain persons who have suffered at the hands of a government which has pressed down rather harshly on property owners during the past ten years, grasped at the movement as a safe and effective justice. 

not visible in northern lati des. A large number of these were nown on the screen, including the lagellanic cloud. The pictures also uded the Andromeda and Orion nebulae, many clusters, spiral nebulae and ring nebulae, with stars ally so numerous that it had been pes ible to photograph as many as half a million on a single plate.

"There are many giant stars in the sky, vastly greater than our sun," said the speaker. "Many of the stars are double stars, and hundreds of the double stars are variable. By study-ing the variations of light we get the distance, and from that get the distance of the whole cloud or cluster. By thus using the variables for an astimate of distance we have been enabled to increase greatly the dimensions of the whole system of stars As to the nebula of Orion we now helieve that it does not shine by its own radiance. but that the heat from the very hot stars in the trapezium goes out into the nebulous mass and excites it to radiation.

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"Our sun," continued the speaker. 'is running down and growing colder all the time, and with the rest of the stellar system before them astronom ers see no reason why the sun should be picked out for a special mission in the universe. The nebulae are probably the ancestors of the stars. There is progress from chaotic nebulae to stars, and from them to planetary systems.

"Altogether, as I have tried to show, there is justification for the idealistic outlook in astronomy. The astronomer is quite beyond temptation as far as money goes. There is a spiritual appeal for help, and the appeal comes from the whole of the universe. Biology and chemistry deal with only one part of our planet. When we build observatories we do it in the hope of getting to know something about our planet and its relation to the universe. And we construct great telescopes and direct them to the heavens to find out what it is all about."

The Newest Rich.

A few fortunes of a million, and a great many in six figures are in the making, with some of our most raspected citizens helping. The large sums which accrued to those who were "in right" on the market during the inflationary war and afterwar days are being duplicated by the winnings-it is difficult to call them "earnings"-of our latest industrial adventurers, the bootleggers. While a totally inadequate force of men is trying to enforce the Velstead measure, a more than adequate army of bootleggers, large and small, afoot, in metors, and affeat, is making profits which are not small compared with those of the war babies.

Is there a class of society which is not contributing to these gains? The rich are apparently getting all the liquor they need, without exposing themselves to any great danger of arrest. The poor manage to find men with pints and quarts. There are no licenses to pay, except to dis-



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
