Destructive Fire To-Day

THREE HOUSES AND A LOT OF SHEDS BURNED.

The Fire Spreads from Douglas to Quebec Street.

A very destructive fire broke out this forenoon on Douglas street. Dense volumes of smoke were seen issuing from Hoover's Livery Stables, in rear of his dwelling house, about 11 o'clock. The alarm was at once given, and hundreds flocked to the scene of the fire. Meantime the stables and sheds being of wood, the fire spread rapidly, and in a short time communicated with the house in front, and with Coffee's stables and sheds, in the rear of his hotel. The horses, buggies, waggons, &c., in these sheds, were got out as quickly as possible. Still the devouring element kept spreading and extending. Hundreds of willing hands were now engaged getting out the furniture and other effects in Coffee's Hotel and Hoover's house, which is of wood, as also the paint shop of D. Gouck, which stood between the two. From this the fire communicated to the adjoining shop, tenanted by Thos. Breadon, painter, and in the upper flat of which H. Medcalf, the saddler, had a quantity of saddlery and other harness stock stowed away.

As soon as the alarm was given the firemen were early at their posts. The steam fire engine was run down to Mr. Allan's dam, and the hose, 1500 feet in length, run up to the scene of the fire. In twenty minutes sufficient steam was up to force the water that distance, and a strong stream of water began to play on the burning mass. The firemen, under the direction of their chief, Mr. J. Davidson, worked manfully and well, and they were greatly aided by the many volunteers who came forward to assist them. Before the water began to play all the furniture was got out of Coffee's Hotel, though much of it is in rather a damaged condition. The wooden buildings adjoining being now beyond all chance of saving, the efforts of the firemen were directed to the Hotel, which is of stone. Several times the fire had got inside the house, but was soon extinguished before much harm was done.

By this time the paint shop was one mass of flames, as also some sheds in the rear. The cottage next to it, occupied by Mr. John Mitchell, stood in great danger, and efforts were at once directed to save it. A lot of blankets were procured, several men got on the roof, and manfully remained there, throwing water on the roof, though they had to wrap themselves in blankets to ward off the intense heat to which they were subjected. The furniture was removed, and happily through the exertions of those who stood at their post, the building was saved. Mr. Guthrie's office was in considerable danger for some time from its proximity to the burning shed in the rear. All the furniture, books, paper &c., had been removed. The sashes of the rear windows were once or twice in flames, but a little water kept the fire down till the shed had burned out, and all danger was over.

From Coffee's stables the fire soon spread to the house on Quebec-st., belonging to Mrs. James Tovell, and at present unoccupied. The efforts of the firemen were now directed to this quarter, and a heavy stream of water soon quenched the flames, and prevented them from spreading to R. Rutherford warehouse, in rear of his store. By this time the old fire engine had been got out, and being supplied with water from the tank at St. George's Church, it did good service in quenching the flames, which were still raging in the frame buildings on Douglas Street. Indeed, had it not been for this timely supply of water, it is hard to say how far the fire would have spread, for Brownlow's carpenter shop and the other frame buildings on the opposite side of the street were in great danger of catching fire from the intense heat. By twelve o'clock the fire had spent itself or been put out, but in one short hour it had done great damage. Had the fire spread to Mimmack's shop and the Post Office next door, the loss would have been much more serious. The mail matter in the Post Office was well taken care of however, as all letters and papers was put away into bags and carried to the Town Hall for safe keeping. Boul's Lumber Yard and Shops in rear of the burning buildings were in great danger, but by constant watchfulness, the material, which is of a very ignitable character, was prevented from catching fire.

We can hardly speak as yet in definite terms with regard to the loss sustained. Coffee's Hotel, belonging to the Hefferman estate, is not much damaged. It is insured in the Wellington Mutual for \$1,200, and in the Phoenix for \$1,000.—The stables and sheds are completely burned. We have not been able to learn whether there was any insurance on Mrs. Tovell's house, but it is believed there is none. Hoover's house and the paint shops belonged to Mr. F. Maroon, and were insured for \$750 in the Wellington Mutual. They are a total loss. Hoover had no insurance on his furniture or stock. He lost 4 cutters, one sleigh, a lot of harness, buffalo robes, and 4 fine pigs. Mr. Coffee had his furniture insured in the Provincial for \$1,200, and \$200 on his stables in the Canada Western. The furniture is very much damaged. Mr. Medcalf and Mr. Breadon saved the most of their stock, but Mr. Gouck was not quite so fortunate, though a considerable portion of his stock was got out. Mr. Rutherford had a lot of goods removed out of the storehouse, but they sustained little or no damage.

The fire originated in Hoover's stable, but how is at present a mystery. When first seen the smoke was issuing from

London, June 19th.—In the House of Lords this evening, the Earl of Malmesbury, in some remarks on the Abyssinian expedition, suggested that the course of the unusual character of service performed by the troops, honours be paid to them upon their return from the scene of their exploits.

The Earl of Malmesbury, Lord of the Privy Seal, in reply, said that the Government had not yet considered the point. The Duke of Cambridge, commander-in-chief of the army, expressed the opinion that the award of unusual honours to the members of the Abyssinian expedition would be a bad precedent. The subject was then dropped.

Lieutenant-Governorship.
 The organs of John Sandfield Macdonald are moving heaven and earth to prevent the appointment of the Hon. John A. Macdonald as Lieutenant Governor. The Hon. John A. Macdonald has more than once entered his solemn protest against any such arrangement. The Toronto Standard has taken this matter so deeply to heart that scarcely a day passes without a reference to the subject. It attacks, cajoles and entreats alternately, and these are so earnest and persistent that one is forced to the conclusion that the Premier of Ontario himself inspires those articles which day after day appear in its columns. John Sandfield evidently considers himself the victim of deceitful tactics. At the earnest request of Mr. A. Macdonald, he came forward and started the machinery of our Government—he gave up the principle of a lifetime and 'fraternized' with the Conservatives—he brought together both parties together and formed his government, and by the exercise of good management, together with a more than ordinary share of good luck, he gave it a sort of cohesive force. He gave up his old Reform principles, he lost their sympathy and support because he had acted a traitor's part towards them. And all that? For the Lieutenant-Governorship which John A. Macdonald is hanging before his eyes. During the last year most people were of the belief that this was the great object which John Sandfield had in view in forming his government. John A. Macdonald, how late events have afforded conclusive evidence that such is the case. It is no wonder then that the Ontario Premier should now be indignant when he finds that the Hon. John A. Macdonald is holding out to him a year ago as a reward of his recreancy to his friends should be rudely snatched from his grasp, and given to another man. Mr. Sandfield's Reformers are Reformers for payment for his services. It is no wonder Mr. John A. Macdonald is indignant—he threatens dire revenge on his namesake, and a speedy rupture between the Dominion and Ontario governments. No one can blame Mr. Sandfield for doing all this and more, and for making John Sandfield's temper such if he will not carry out his threats to the very letter. He has used as the veriest tool in the hands of the cunning Dominion Premier and after faithfully carrying out his plans for the purpose of thwarting the Western Reformers, he is now thrust aside like an old horse of no further use to his master. At the least of it, the trick is a successful though characteristic one. The whole affair forms a fitting counterpoise to the evil nature of such unscrupulous political compacts, and the punishment which awaits all who become parties to it. Mr. J. A. Macdonald did very wrong, but he was badly treated, and we suspect that he will now show his unscrupulous friends that he has at the spirit to quickly and efficiently resent such a studied insult. He has received at the hands of his leaders.

THE NEW TURRET SHIP.—The London Times says of the new turret ship, "The Admiralty at last produced their conception of a turret ship, and a finer target for the M. A. R. C. than the first turret ship constructed in the Queen's dock— for an enemy's artillery, was designed. Rising out of the water with a freeboard of fourteen feet extends her long side, unbroken by a single porthole, for more than a hundred yards, two-thirds of which are unarmored, except a water-line, and the rest is protected by seven-inch armor, which the Russian, Prussian, French and American navies would be able to pierce. She combines the great offensive weakness with the small defensive power. She is 5,000 tons and only carries 7 guns. At sea her armored hull will generally be able to stand, and she will rarely be able to do so with any accurate aim. She will cost less than £400,000, and in the most essential portions of Admiralty's definition, it is safely predicted the Moharch will be the coming Handel Festival in London.—The Pall Mall Gazette has made arrangements for the Handel Festival in London are nearly complete. Crop Prospects in England.
 Mr. James Sanderson writes to the Pall Mall Gazette, under date of June 1: "With respect to the wheat crop there has not been the slightest cause for misgivings, as the season throughout has been unprecedentedly favorable. Suitable preparatory tillage labor, an excellent seed bed, a rapid and regular braird, an unusually mild winter, and a dry and early spring, are one and all favorable conditions which have this season been singularly prominent. There has also been an absence of those checks of vegetation which not unusually give rise to the farmer's fears. No drowned crops on flooded lowlands, nor rotted seed from a rainy autumn, nor decimated plants from spring frosts have been experienced. Hence, in the first week of June the prospects of the wheat crop, for earliness and abundance, have not for many years been equalled; indeed, if existing appearances are maintained, the enormous wheat yield of 1863 will be reproduced in 1868, while by the third week of July new wheat will be in the market. Plants are numerous, vigorous in stem, luxuriant in hue, and already on a large breadth of land the ears issuing from the sheaths. The wireworm, favored by the dry season, has committed serious ravages on the weaker 'fen' soils, but the area thus damaged is comparatively trifling, and the soil generally crops are magnificent. Indeed, in many instances they are over-luxuriant, and not a few farmers have adopted the process of 'flagging'—cutting off the top blade to check a too rapid growth and give strength to the succulent stems. On light as well as on undrained clays, and especially in the midland and eastern counties, barley and oats have suffered from the want of a sufficient quantity of rain, and it is to be feared that all the spring sown cereals, from rushing prematurely into ear, will be short in straw and deficient in 'head.' Beans, especially winter-sown, vie with the wheat crop in luxuriance. Potatoes are thickly planted, vigorous in stem and very forward. The area under grain crops is unusually large, and I have no doubt that coming statistics will show an excess under wheat alone of 100,000 acres over that of last year. Excepting on light soils, the yield of artificial grasses will be heavy. The yield of meadow hay will not exceed an average. As with corn, so also with stock husbandry are prospects singularly cheering. Altogether the food produce of 1868, judging from present prospects, promises great abundance."

There is a report in circulation that Mr. McDougall is to be driven out of the Cabinet at an early day. The Upper Canada Conservatives are rejoicing in the prospect of a purely Tory Government.

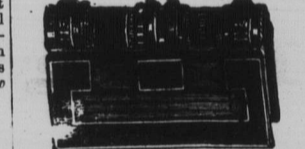
